## IN MEMORIAM

MR. MILLER FIFE

The death of Mr. Miller Fife occurred at the P. E. Island Hospital where he had been a patient for seventeen months, in the early hours of Monday, May 12th, 1952. He was 84 years of age and had lived all his life in Stanley, with the exception of about five years spent with his sister, Mrs. John Gillispie, Long River.

He was known and respected by a wide circle of friends and acquaintances, by whom he will be affectionately remembered.

Although in failing health for a number of years and confined in hospital for seventeen months, he was never known to murmur or complain amid the many days of suffering and weariness.

The eldest son of the late Mr. and Mrs. Robert Fife, Stanley, he is survived by the following brothers and sisters: Mr. James Fife, Penoka, Alberta; Mr. Arthur Fife, Sea View, P.E.I.; Mrs. Jane Herbert, Yuma, Arizona; Mrs. Margaret Clark, Santa Barbara, California; Mrs. Alice Ward, Mission, B.C.; Mrs. Myles Doherty, Niagara Falls, Ont.; Mrs. Preston MacLeod, Park Corner, P.E.I., and Mrs. John Gillispie, Long River, P.E.I. Two sisters, Gertrude and Elizabeth, predeceased him.

The funeral was held on Wednesday, May 14th, with a short service at the home of Gordon Fife, thence to Stanley Church. A portion of the 8th chapter of Romans, 28 to 39, was read by the Rev. D. A. Campbell.

The Rev. W. I. Green spoke fittingly of the deceased as he knew him to be, and told of visiting him many times while laid aside in the hospital and in his home. The Rev. D. A. Campbell led in prayer and the Rev. George Gough pronounced the benediction.

The hymns chosen were: "The Lord's My Shepherd," "Rock of Ages," and "Abide With Me." A solo, "Will the Circle Be Unbroken" was sung by special request, by Mrs. J. A. Fleming of Stanley.

## Measures To Protect This Year's Tuber Crop

Although it will be some time before sprays or dusts will be required to protect the potato plantings against blight and insects, it is not too early to take steps to insure the heavy investments in this year's crop, states the weekly potato bulletin prepared by the Laboratory of Plant Pathology.

Surveys conducted for several years have shown that the cull

or dump pile is the principal source of field infection with late blight disease. Late blight can develop on sprouts from diseased tubers discarded in the spring and spread from there by wind-borne spores to nearby potato fields. The earliest late blight infections observed in potato fields have been traced to such sources. Many discarded tubers will be infected with virus diseases such as mosaic, leaf roll and spindle tuber and, because the plants produced in the cull piles are ideal breeding places for potato insects, including the virus-carrying aphids, they are serious threats to the health

of commercial plantings. A neglected heap of discarded tubers anywhere in the vicinity of a seed field may mean the difference between success and failure in securing certification of the crop.

As soon as planting has been completed all discarded tubers should be disposed of in such a way that they will not produce plants. They may be destroyed by burning or deep burial.
