INCREASED USE OF SERVICE

Director Stresses Need For More Blood Donors

Dr. George W. Miller of Toronto, national director of the Blood Transfusion Service of the Canadian Red Cross Society, who is making an official tour of Red Cross blood depots in Quebec, New Brunswick, and P.E.I., yesterday conferred with Dr. John Craig, provincial pathologist and director of the P.E.I. Red Cross Blood Transfusion Depot, Mrs. O.W. Campbell and Mrs. Bruce MacPherson, the two Red Cross laboratory technicians, and Miss I. Arsenault, provincial Red Cross commissioner.

Today, Dr. Miller will meet with Dr. O.W. Curtis, deputy minister of health, and F.A.S. Jones, provincial chairman of the P.E.I. Red Cross blood donor committee.

Dr. Miller, who is recognized internationally as an authority on blood transfusion, in an interview yesterday, congratulated the blood donors of P.E.I., as well as the committees who sponsor the various clinics, on the splendid results obtained in this province. In view of the increasing demand for blood and its by-products, he stressed the necessity of even larger numbers attending the clinics.

Dr. Miller mentioned the fact that although five per cent of the residents of P. E. I. attend clinics as donors — which is equal to the best response in other parts of Canada, that this is a far cry from the 30 per cent who are known to be eligible as donors. He attributed fear and indifference as the prime factors which keep the other 25 per cent from playing their part in the Red Cross Blood Transfusion service which is available for all.

Father Carries On Show When Son Dies Suddenly

"The show must go on" is a phrase aptly applied to show business but the significance of this simple statement was never brought home more forcibly than this week when Keith Boswell, veteran showman of Victoria, was faced with a decision to show his cattle after his son and partner, Edward passed away suddenly at the Prince Edward Island Hospital last Monday.

Edward, although young in years was a familiar figure at all Charlottetown Exhibitions since he was a boy and his death at the age of 35 brought sorrow not only to all cattle exhibitors at the Fair but to members of the Ayrshire breeders in particular. At the time of his passing he was vice-president of the local organization.

Never was he in higher spirits than when he was in the show ring, an experience which took him to all provincial shows, the Maritime Winter Fair and the Royal Winter fair at Toronto. He was a showman of the highest calibre and was highly respected by all his competitors in the ring.

His father yesterday, working under a trying strain said, "I believe I am doing what Edward would want me to do—go on with the show".

Edward was stricken with a very serious illness two years ago and while he did not fully recover from surgery in Halifax, he was able to lead a very active life.

His interest in the Ayrshire breed in Prince Edward Island was recognized by his appointment to the board of directors of the P.E. Island Ayrshire Breeders' Association and was in line to be their president.

Former S'side Teacher Dies

SUMMERSIDE—News of the death of George Henry Campbell, a former principal of Summerside High School, and later, for 37 years, principal of the elementary school in Ladner, B.C., was received this week by Mrs. M.E. Atkey, Fern Roblee) who is a guest of Mrs. L.G. Lewis of Summerside.

The late Mr. Campbell died in Ladner, and is survived by his wife, the former Rubie Sanderson of Summerside, and by four children.

His father was the late Colonel R.H. Campbell, a former superintendent of education for P.E.I.

An editorial from the Ladner Optimist commenting on his contributions to the educational and community life of Ladner in the many years he lived there, remarked that: "He would have said his ability as a teacher was due to the fact that he came from P.E.I., a province which is noted for the fine teachers it has sent out to other parts of Canada. The day-by-day dairy of his life which he kept conscientiously since 1910 may some day provide valuable information about this community. We will miss George Campbell in this community but we are glad that he was a part of it so long to make the valuable contribution to it that he did."
