Monument in Memory of an Indian

Quebec Chronicle: The Minister of the
Interior has given orders that a monu-
ment be erected over the grave of Crow-
foot, which is situated on the high bank
of the Bow river. The monument will
probably be of granite and suitably in-
scribed. It is to show the appreciation
in which Crowfoot was held for his loyalty
during the rebellion, and in always assist-
ing Government officials in their different
dealings with the Indians.

An Amusing Incident

OTTAWA, May 6.—A funny incident oc-
curred outside at half past eight, the hour
fixed of His Excellency's arrival. A car-
riage and pair, with two footmen, drove
rapidly up to the entrance, where a guard
of honor from the Foot Guards was
dawn up. The order was given, "pre-
sent arms," and the band played "God
Save the Queen," when it was discovered,
too late, that the carriage only contained
some ordinary but rich citizens of Ottawa.
Ten minutes later His Excellency drove
up and for the second time the strains of
the National Anthem floated on the even-
ing air, this time falling on vice-regal ears.

A Use for Mosquitoes.

The practice of inoculating new resi-
dents of Cuba with yellow fever conveyed
by mosquito bites has been continued by
Mrs. Finlay and Dolgado, of Havana, for
ten years. They now report completed
observations on fifty-two cases of mosquito
inoculation, in only 8 per cent. of which
was yellow fever contracted in a well
marked form, with a virality of less than
2 per cent. Of 65 monks, who arrived in
Havana and lived there under similar
conditions, 33 were inoculated on 1 3/4
were not, only two of the former having
inoculation, in none following in which
well marked attacks, in neither case fatal,
while there were 11 severe cases among
the uninoculated, and not less than five
deaths.—Ex.

Italians Still Coming.

ROME, May 4.—America is draining
Italy with remarkable rapidity. The
exodus is most marked in the Polesine
regions, where 400 out of 2000 families
have emigrated this year. Ninety-five
families left Crespino together last week.
Gavullo, which a year ago had 5000 in-
habitants, now has but 300. Pollesella
has lost 37 families, who all departed at
one time. The fugitives from Rovigo is so
extensive that special trains are run from
there to Genoa daily to accommodate the
emigrants. The government are about
to adopt some method to stop emigra-
tion.

The Chignecto Ship Railway.

AMHERST, May 1.—As previously stated,
the financial situation of the Chignecto
ship railway is in no precarious state
whatever, and large sums of money are at
work to-day and additional men are be-
ing employed as fast as the condition of
the ground owing to the frost will pre-
mit. The work at the Amherst terminus
for the season has already begun. Three
weeks ago the stone cutting was resumed
and on the 24th ult., the laying of masonry
was begun for the season on the lifting
dock. The structure is already two-fifths
completed, and in the course of a few
months will be ready to receive the
hydraulic machinery that will be employ-
ed in lifting the vessels from the water to
the level of the track and afterwards re-
placing them in the water.

Jonah and the Whale.

In its explanation of the Sunday school
Bible lesson on the Book of Jonah, "The
Baptist Teacher" took the following
ordinary position:—"If it had pleased God so
God so to order, it would have been
entirely possible even for an oyster to
swallow Jonah—quite as easy as for Jonah
to have swallowed the oyster." Upon
which "The Congregationalist," thus
commenting:—"If it had pleased God so
order, it would have been entirely possi-
ble for Him to have made an oyster a
Sunday school teacher; and would hardly
have been more remarkable than that one
who could write such nonsense as the
comment quoted should be chosen for that
purpose. But the oyster, if allowed to fol-
low its natural instincts, would have kept
his mouth closed."

An Octogenarian Oyster.

Oysters frequently reach a great old
age. The ridges or water lines on the
shell indicate the number of years they
are beyond forty, and indicate a period of ten years
wider and indicate a period of ten years
ago. It was caught in Delaware Bay four
years ago. That oyster had intelligence. I
put it in a tank of salt water and it open-
ed and shut itself up, as if enjoying a
bath. One day I put the oyster on a
plank by itself in order to study its shell
and a microscope. It lay there dead
and dumb-like. I stepped aside to wait
on a customer who wanted Blue Points.
The oyster walked up to the oyster and
began to turn it over with its paw. Sud-
denly the bivalve opened its shell and
off like a rocket, bumping the oyster
against the pavement. The octogenari-
an clung to the cat's tail. I never saw
the cat or the oyster again.—St. Louis
Globe-Democrat.

Toads' Lives.

Some toads have a peculiar gift of long
life without sustenance of any kind, and
with a very small supply of air; but the
alleged instances of their being found im-
bedded in solid stone in the heart of a
tree, with no possible communication
with the external world, are declared
upon good scientific authority to have
undoubtedly arisen from error of observa-
tion. Experiments in connection with
the so-called antediluvian toad's show that
toads cannot usually survive even a year
when deprived of food and air. The
toad has been known to live thirty-five or
forty years, and it is thought to attain a
considerably greater age; it has been so
far famed as to come and feed from the
hand, and it seems to be capable of at-
tachment to man. From their fondness
for insects toads make excellent traps for
use by the entomologists, who may thus
procure rare beetles and nocturnal insects
which they could not otherwise get, as
the toads can easily be made to gorge
them. Gardeners of toads and other in-
sect-houses to destroy ants and other in-
sects and larvae.—St. Louis Republic.

The New Orleans Trouble.

NEW ORLEANS, May 6.—The Grand
Jury in the Hennessy case and the killing
of the Italians at the parish prison re-
ported to-day. It says evidence was present-
ed showing the jury that the grand jury
case had been tampered with; that at least
three jurors were influenced by money,
that Detective O'Malley participated in
most, if not all, the unlawful acts in con-
nection with the case. The grand jury
did not include Thomas McCrystal, John Conroy,
K. C. O'Malley, Bernard Glandi, Charles
Granger, Fernand Armas for attempt-
ing to bribe toadsmen. The researchers of
the jury developed the existence of the
Mafia, composed largely of Italian and
Sicilian criminals, who were the upring-
ing of the masses making it difficult
to fix the guilt upon any number of par-
ticipants; that the act seemed to involve the
entire people of the parish and city of
New Orleans; that a thorough examina-
tion failed to justify the grand jury in
presenting indictments.

Of Interest to the Baptists.

OTTAWA, May 7.—The following is the
report of the minister of justice on the
Nova Scotia act: "An act to amend
chapter 60 of the acts of 1890, entitled
"An act to incorporate the foreign mis-
sionary board of the Baptist convention
of Nova Scotia, New Brunswick and
Prince Edward Island." This act deals
with a corporation created in 1895, by
legislation of Nova Scotia for the purpose
of missionary work in connection with
the Baptist convention of Nova Scotia,
New Brunswick and Prince Edward
Island. The original corporation
was not provincial in its character. Upon
the passing of the British North Amer-
ican act it therefore ceased to be
within the legislative authority of the
province. In the case of Dobie
versus the board for the manage-
ment of the temporalities of Scotland
the Presbyterian church of Canada, not
in connection with the church of Scotland
(7 appeal cases, 136) the judicial committee
of the privy council held that an act of
the province of Quebec, similar in its
aim to the act now under review, and dealing
with a corporation created before the
union by the legislature of the province
of Canada, was ultra vires of a provincial
legislature. The undersigned is there-
fore, of the opinion that this act is invalid.
Its constitutionality, however, may be
determined, as other acts similar in aim
have been, by appeal to the courts, having
undergone, appear to be any public
necessity for its disallowance. He there-
fore recommends that the same be left to
its operation.

To Deprive a Senator of His Seat.

Although the sitting of the Senate the
other afternoon last d only a few minutes,
it saw the initial steps taken in the
procedure to declare the seat of a Senator
vacant. According to the thirty-third
section of the British North America Act,
any Senator who fails to attend any sitting
of the Upper Chamber for two consecu-
tive sessions of Parliament is ipso facto
deprived of his seat and his adherent
rights. Hon. George W. Alexander, of
Woodstock, has not been in Ottawa dur-
ing the past two sessions, having
been incapacitated by illness, and conse-
quently has constitutionally forfeited all
claim to his senatorship. The clerk of
the Senate, Mr. E. J. Langvign, reported
these facts to Hon. Speaker Lacoste to-
day, and he in turn communicated them
to the Chamber.
