Some changes will have to be made in our present policies of allotting line extensions. These changes will be based on the knowledge and experience gained from this year's work. The problem of districts not living up to their applications is a serious one and has got to be handled in a manner which will result in more equity to other areas.

Establishing this sub-station now makes it possible to serve this whole area, and as this is one of the largest extensions under construction this year, a big step has already been taken in that direction. You have my assurance that the whole program for this year will be completed with at the most rapid rate possible, which should result in it being completed well ahead of schedule.

Mr. Matheson also revealed that up to Wednesday, September 20th, the Maritime Electric Company was serving 368 new customers since the turn of the year. For the same period, he said, the Summerside Electric Light Company was serving 109 customers.

Other statistics released by the Premier which show the rapid progress of the rural electrification program are as follows: Up to Sept. 29th, miles of line completed and energized, Maritime Electric 10.8; Summerside Electric Light Company 17. Miles of wire strung Maritime Electric, 28.6; Summerside Electric, 19. Miles of poles placed; Maritime Electric 42.8; Summerside 20. Miles approved, Maritime Electric 112.2; Summerside 20.

Transfer Polio Victim To Tug In English Ch.

SOUTHAMPTON, Eng. (Reuters)—The British tug Paladin battled against heavy seas and gale winds this afternoon in a desperate race to save the life of a young American boy seriously ill with polio.

The tug took the boy, four-year-old David Lee Olive, off an American ship some miles out from the English coast. With two hours steaming ahead, the fight to keep the boy alive began on board.

The tug was making for Southampton, where an ambulance waited to rush the boy to hospital. It was the trickiest marine rescue operation attempted in the English channel in years. The boy had to be taken from his iron lung for transfer, and it was a desperate three-minute battle against death until he was safely aboard the Paladin.

Sport Echoes From Prince County

Holman's lived up to their reputation of coming from behind to make plenty of trouble at Queen's Amherst on Friday afternoon. Down 11-2 at one stage of the game, they roared back into contention, and finished up in a dead-heat with the Bluejays 13-13.

Whatever their weaknesses may be, no one can deny that they are a mighty potent outfit with the bat. In most of their games since they have been reorganized, their hits have run into double figures. Wednesday, they got 15 hits. And miraculously enough, not one of these was banded out by the heavy hitting family, the Grady-Jimmie was having his old trouble against Amherst, and both Benny and Grant were having a day off as far as the shillelagh was concerned.

As a matter of fact the airforce quartet were pretty nearly the whole show when it came to cracking out base bingles. Messrs. Cox, Jones, Pittman and Hunter accounted for nine of the fifteen hits. Paul Schurman went on a batting rampage and polled out four, one of each kind, and the other two were belted out by Joe Bernard and Dee Lefurgy.

It's easy to second-guess the coaches, but it seemed to us, and a lot of other people, that Paul Schurman was left on the mound much too long. When it was quite obvious that the boy had lost his effectiveness he was left in and base hits were cracked off his delivery with dismay regularly. If Lefurgy had come in earlier in that fourth inning, Holman's might have won the ball game.

Lefurgy was clobbered for twelve runs in an exhibition game at Amherst earlier this season. Coke Grady relieved and stopped the Bluejays cold. Now certainly Grady is not a better hurler than Lefurgy, but changing a pitcher often has the effect of stopping a batting spread. Of course, in Amherst, it was only an exhibition game and didn't matter much, but Wednesday was different.

We say the Holman team have a pretty good chance against the Amherst team if their available pitchers are jockeyed in a smart out of the pitching position with skill. They have the batters, but very little depth in pitching, so that is where they are going to stand or fall.

Joe Dalton, Holman centerfielder, has shown all summer, and last year too, for that matter, that he is one of the best in the business when it comes to running in for a fly. He has made shoe-string catches that would amaze you. He doesn't seem to be able to go back with equal facility. He's had a lot of tough luck on balls he's over his head in recent games. He gets under the ball, but doesn't seem to be able to make the grab. Maybe just a case of needing more practice on that type of fly.
