LATEST IRISH NEWS.

DEUBLIN, Oct. 31. A disorderly meeting of the Dublin Corporation took place to-day. A number of resignations of members of the council was received in consequence of the rejection of E. Dwyer Grey's recent motion to confer the freedom of the city upon Parnell and Dillon.

The reported arrest of Capt. Dugmore, of the 64th Regt., is untrue. Rev. Mr. Conway, priest of Skreen, County Sligo, has been suspended by his bishop for his advanced Land League views. The people of the parish have built up the doors and windows of his chapel, and declare that no priest but Father Conway shall officiate there.

DUBLIN, Oct. 31. The pastoral of Archbishop McCabe was read in all the Catholic churches of the Dublin diocese on Sunday, and created considerable sensation. Passages from the pastoral were printed last night, and demonstrations against it, to be made to-day, were at once organized. At the pro-Cathedral one hundred and fifty young men rose at the moment when the priest began his references to the League, and drowned the speaker's voice in noisy demonstrations, which they made on leaving the building. At Aronway Chapel a similar incident occurred, and in other chapels dissenting noises and gestures were made.

UNITED STATES.

CINCINNATI, Oct. 31.

Reports from up the Ohio tell of brisk rains, causing a rise in the rivers, tributary to the Ohio, and a rapid rise in the Upper Ohio, with a prospect of bringing out the supply of coal.

COLUMBIA, S. C., Oct. 31.

The fire in Edgefield is believed to have been set by a man named Malloy, who fled, and a party has gone in search of him. The first house burned was the Tillman House, belonging to Congressman Tillman. There was no water and only three houses escaped.

CONTOCOOK, N. H., Oct. 31.

At 1.40 this morning there was a slight shock of earthquake here and at Hillsboro'; and it was quite severe at Henniker.

BOSTON, Oct. 31.

The following has been received by the Ancient and Honorable Artillery company of this city from the Honorable Artillery company of London, of which the Prince of Wales is commander:—

Resolved, Unanimously that the court of assistants of this company, at the first meeting since recess, desire to record their heartfelt sorrow at the death of General Garfield, President of the United States of America, and offer their commiseration to the Ancient and Honorable Artillery company of Boston their deep sympathy they and the whole nation have sustained in being deprived of the services of a soldier so renowned, a scholar so ripe, and a statesman so calculated to command the love and respect of his own people and the admiration of all the civilized nations.

EUROPEAN.

LONDON, Oct. 31.

The Prince of Wales, who is in Paris, lunched yesterday with Sir Charles Dilke and Gambetta.

BERNE, Oct. 31.

Elections for the National Council show but little change in the position of parties. Fifty Conservatives and Ultramontanes, and ninety-eight Liberals and Radicals were elected, against forty-five and thirty-three respectively in the former Council. The increase in the population gives the Council ten additional members.

LONDON, Oct. 30.

Alexander Macdonald, Liberal member for Stafford, is dead. The Post says that the Government have resolved to enter upon more direct relations with the Vatican.

The Anchor Line steamer Assyria, before reported at Avonmouth from New York, was seriously damaged on the passage and jettisoned part of her cargo. The master was disabled.

PARIS, Oct. 31.

The Chamber of Deputies, to-day, validated a great number of elections, including that of Gambetta for Belleville.

Summerside Notes.

(From the Pioneer.)

Capt Richards' new schooner is lying at Queen's wharf, with her three iron masts in position. She is being rigged and will soon be ready to take in oats for Great Britain.

On Friday and Saturday last the rush of produce into market was just tremendous. The wharves were almost closely packed with teams all day, while there was not much room to spare along the whole length of Water street. The travelling was fair, prices good and people wisely took advantage of those conditions. It is probable that never in the history of Summerside was there so much money paid out for produce. On Monday business was very good, but by no means equal to the days mentioned.

We understand that Calhoun & Newman have sold out their lumber business to Mr. Theo. Clark, who has for many years been in Mr. Calhoun's employ. Mr. Clark has also purchased from Mr. Calhoun his soils, lumber yard, warehouses, wharf property and machine shops. We heartily wish our friend much success in his new enterprise.

A gentleman informed us that last Wednesday, being in a settlement some 16 or 17 miles from here, he saw two farmers hauling in the last of their hay of the field. The parties were by no means slow or improvident, but their harvest coming on, they had to leave haymaking and attend to the more important branch. It was therefore not till the last week in October they got an opportunity of cutting and gathering the last of the hay crop.
