



HON. PAUL MARTIN

Minister of National Health and Welfare, speaks at Summerside on Thursday evening, April 25.

In 1925, Mr. Martin took a B.A. (Honours) degree at St. Michael's College, University of Toronto, where he taught for the next three years while concurrently studying law in pursuing post-graduate work in the Faculty of Arts. In 1928 he received his M.A. from the University of Toronto and graduated in law from Osgoode Hall, Toronto. As Jones Scholar he attended Harvard University, where he received the Master of Laws degree in 1929. The following year, having won the Wilder Fellowship, he studied at Trinity College, Cambridge University, England. He then proceeded on a Zimmerman Scholarship to the School of International Studies, Geneva, Switzerland.

On his return to Canada in 1930, Mr. Martin joined a law firm in Windsor, Ontario. From 1931 to 1934 he was also a Lecturer in Political Science at Assumption College which was then a part of the University of Western Ontario. In 1934 he became senior partner of the law firm of Martin, Laird, Easton and Cowan and was appointed King's Counsel in 1937.

Mr. Martin's first election to the House of Commons was in 1935 for the federal riding of Essex East in Western Ontario, which he has represented continuously since that time. His majority has been increased in each succeeding election.

His early interest in international affairs found practical expression in 1936 when he was selected as Chairman of the Canadian Delegation to the World Youth Congress in Geneva. Two years later he became an official delegate to the Nineteenth Assembly of the League of Nations. In 1943 Mr. Martin was appointed Parliamentary Assistant to the Minister of Labour. In this capacity, he was Chairman of the Canadian Government dele-

gation to the International Labour Conference in Philadelphia in May, 1944, and delegate to the 94th Conference of the I.L.O. Governing Body in London, England, early in the following year. Mr. Martin was a government delegate to the first session of the General Assembly of the United Nations in London and in New York in 1946, and to the fourth, seventh and ninth sessions in New York in 1949, 1952, 1953 and 1954. He was designated first Canadian representative to the Economic and Social Council in London early in 1946, and was delegate to the third and fifth sessions of the Council in New York later that year and in 1947.

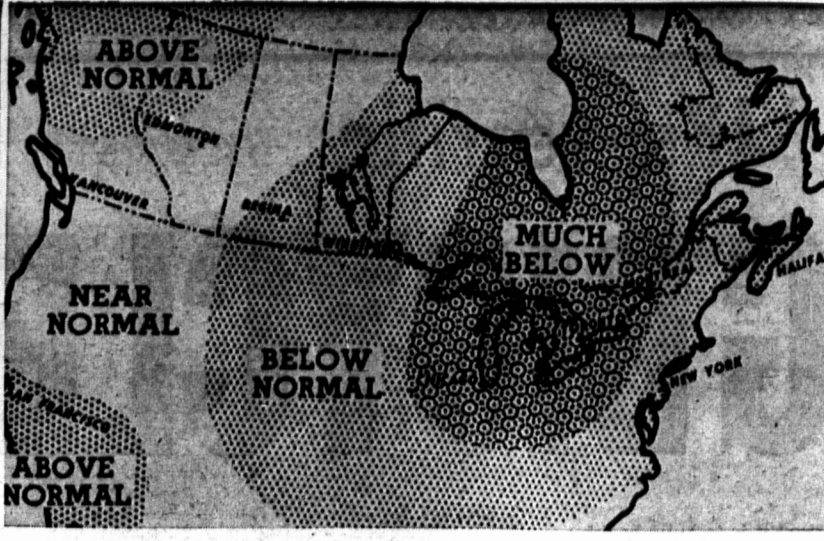
In August, 1955, he represented Canada at the five-power Disarmament Sub-Committee meetings in New York. In September of the same year he was named Chairman of the Canadian Delegation to the Tenth General Assembly of the United Nations where he played a leading part in the successful negotiations that resulted in the admission of sixteen new member nations to the United Nations.

On April 18, 1945, Mr. Martin assumed his first Cabinet post as Secretary of State. During his tenure of office he piloted the Canadian Citizenship Act through Parliament. On December 17, 1946, he became Minister of National Health and Welfare, a post he has held ever since. Outstanding events in the Department's history since he took office include the inauguration of the National Health Program in 1948, the development of the Federal Old Age Security Act in 1951, the introduction of disability allowances in 1954, and the direction of Canada's Salk polio vaccination program beginning in 1955. Early in 1951 the federal responsibility for Civil Defence was transferred to his Department. Mr. Martin has been instrumental in encouraging the establishment of a number of national bodies to provide leadership in certain health fields—namely the National Cancer Institute, the Canadian Arthritis and Rheumatism Society and, most recently, the National Heart Foundation of Canada.

The hon. member conferred on Mr. Martin by the following Universities—Michigan (1947); Dalhousie (1950); Toronto (1952); Ottawa (1952); Laval (1952); Assumption (1954); Queen's (1954); Montreal (1956); Dartmouth (1956); John Carroll (1956). In 1954 he received the honor of Doctor of Laws from the University of Western Ontario, and in 1956 he received the same degree from Bishop's University. In 1956 he also received the Brotherhood Award from the Canadian Council of Christians and Jews and the Christian Culture Award of Assumption University.
