

United Church Minister Dies At His Home In Summerside



IS GRADUATE

Miss Dolly G. Matthew, daughter of Vernon Matthew and the late Mrs. Matthew, of Summerside East, was awarded the degree of Bachelor of Arts at the autumn convocation of the University of Western Ontario, London, Ontario. The degree was conferred in absentia as Miss Matthew is, at present, on the teaching staff of the Summerside elementary school. Miss Matthew is also a graduate of Toronto Teachers' College.

SUMMERSIDE—Widely known among United Church people in the Maritime Provinces where he held pastorates in the Presbyterian and later (1925) the United Church of Canada, Prince Edward Island born Rev. Theodore Ross died February 19 at the Prince County Hospital. For the past three years he and Mrs. Ross, by whom he is survived, have been living in retirement in Summerside. Immediately prior to his retirement on June 30, 1956, he held a pastorate at Lot 16. Born at North Bedeque in 1876, one of nine children of Mr. and Mrs. Murdoch Ross, Mr. Ross attended Prince of Wales College, the Agricultural College at Guelph, Ontario; graduated from Dalhousie in 1899 and following several short courses in education in the United States, spent some time on the staff of Prince of Wales College, and from 1906-1914 was secretary of agriculture for Prince Edward Island. In 1908 he married Miss Florence Anear of Lower Montague. He attended Pine Hill College in Halifax, and immediately upon graduation in 1919 became pastor of the Presbyterian church at River Herbert, Cumberland County, N.S. Mr. Ross held pastorates at Elgin, Sussex Corner, Douglas-town and Bayfield in New Brunswick and at Kingston, N.S. In each of these communities he took an active part in many of the community organizations and affairs. In addition to his wife, he is survived by a son, two daughters and eight grand-children. Kenneth, general manager, Halifax Board of Trade; Mrs. Mrs. Vernon de Lancey, Winnipeg, Manitoba; Margaret, Mrs. Thomas Lamb, Jr., Sechart, B.C. Also surviving is one sister, Lottie, Mrs. David MacCuthcheon, Vancouver; two brothers, Hon.

New Annan Landmark Is Destroyed By Blaze

NEW ANNAN—An unoccupied house in this district, about seven miles from Summerside, was destroyed by fire early last evening. It was owned by Francis MacKay, who resides in Summerside. Firemen with a pumper truck from Summerside and St. Eleanor's succeeded in saving a shed housing farm machinery, a potato warehouse filled with potatoes, and a large barn housing about 30 head of cattle and a few pigs. Mr. MacKay had completed the day's farm work at the property and had returned to Summerside where he resides with

his mother, Emily MacKay, when the fire was noticed shortly after 5 p.m. Neighbors John Marchbank, his son Robert and Harold Moase, who live nearby noticed smoke coming out of a cellar way and from the eaves. The large residence, built 135 years ago, was a landmark in the community. Despite its age it had been maintained in good condition. A coating of snow and ice on roofs was said to have aided firemen in saving the nearby buildings from the fire. They were directly in the path of wind-blown embers.

The proposed amendments will be presented to the House next week. Although various subsequent amendments have been made in the 1903 act by councils since that time, they have generally dealt only with individual sections and sub-sections. The proposed revision of the 56-year-old act while retaining much of the present Incorporation Act, will bring the governing by-laws in line with present day requirements of the town and will be in conformity with modern municipal administrations.

(Continued from Page 1) round but our cold weather conditions in Canada are bound to produce seasonal employment depressions," he observed.

The pattern of unemployment showing the percentage of working force unemployed in brackets was quoted by Dr. Dewar. They were: 1945 (5); 1950 (6.1); 1955 (7.4); 1956 (5.3); 1958 (8.1). At the same time he noted that in USA during the depression the unemployment figure rose to 33-1-3 per cent.

AGRICULTURE

Dr. Dewar said he was worried about agriculture, not because farmers could not produce enough but, "I am concerned with integration, spiralling costs and tight farm credit. What is this going to do to the small farmer?" he asked.

"He said the increase of 21 per cent in farm income for the island did not tell the whole story. There was a decrease of 26 per cent from 1956-57. Net farm income on the island during 1956 was \$12 million; in 1957 it was \$8 and in 1958 it was \$10 million.

The West Prince member said cattle were bringing the highest price in five years. Exports to the States were up. "But I will say that the farmer suffers more from inflation than anyone else."

EXPRESSED REGRET

Dr. Dewar expressed regret at the illness of the two government ministers, Hon. Mr. MacKay and Hon. Mr. MacIsaac. He complimented Hon. Mr. Arsenault upon his being selected for a cabinet post and at the same time regretted that his colleague in the 2nd district, Mr. Forrest Phillips was obliged to relinquish his duties as Minister of Welfare and Labour due to indifferent health.

He expressed the appreciation for the desk given party leader Shaw. "It is a tribute to our form of government that even those who oppose are given recognition," he observed.

Dr. Dewar felt that if the speech from the Throne was "gloomy and pessimistic," it was "characteristic of valetudinary addresses which tend to be that way."

LEVEL OF DEBATE

He felt that the ministers of the government were in a "vicious mood—rising in indignation and scorn at the least criticism offered." He did not think the level of debate came up to former years and noted that the minister of agriculture "who usually conducts his debate on a high, indulged in political discussion."

Turning to his own district, Dr. Dewar said that considerable improvement had been effected. He was high in his praise for the rural electrification program stating that, "No other service has improved the lot of our people to such an extent."

He noted that electrical workers in the western area were making better progress under winter conditions than in the summer time.

Mr. Acorn: "You people are getting used fairly well." Speaking of roads, the O'Leary member said he was pleased with the paving done in his village and roads surfaced from Tignish to Alberton as well as those to St. Louis and into Coleman.

WESTERN ROAD

He strongly urged the government to pave the Western Road. He predicted that when the frost goes out this spring, cars will be getting bogged down in the middle of it.

There are many places in Prince County that would be very suitable for roadside parks and picnic grounds, Dr. Dewar declared. He recalled making a trip to Strathgartney last summer and was very much impressed with the picnic site there. "We should have a similar area set aside here," he added.

The doctor would like also to see more tourist development in Prince County claiming that the scenery in that area was among the finest in the province.

Mr. MacDonald: "You haven't many who can qualify for a loan."

FISHERIES

The O'Leary member said he would like to see more extensive development in the fisheries of Prince County. He said the shores around the county were the most productive in the country and in no other part of the Maritimes were lobstermen more productive.

Mr. Acorn: "No wonder you

fish them twelve months of the year.

Dr. Dewar: "The waters can stand it. In spite of any illegal fishing the catch remains the same."

He would like to see more cold storage facilities and dragger fishing started.

TRANSPORTATION

The 2nd Prince member said he agreed that there is a real transportation problem with the island and the mainland. He felt that the facilities at Borden were not being utilized to the extent they should.

He was informed, he said, that during the summer the old car ferry steamed up and down the strait "on a moonlight cruise" while the new ferry made the gas trip.

He related what he termed "a distressing incident" which happened this winter at Tormentine. He said a family arrived at Tormentine in sub-zero weather, only to be held up for three hours while the car ferry left with empty box cars.

Doctor Dewar said a causeway would mean a doubling of the tourist trade but a boat was needed while waiting for the causeway to be built.

He could not understand why there were so many surveys needed in connection with the causeway. "Polaroid built the Pyramids which remain until this day wonder how many surveys he had made before he started—and they did it with their hands and their backs," he said.

Mr. MacDonald: "It would be pretty tough swimming out to the causeway with a load of concrete on your back."

EDUCATION

Dr. Dewar said he was happy to learn that the Minister of Education was taking steps to eliminate discrimination in education, but he did not agree with the method he was using.

He said it was all right to take grades nine and ten out of the public schools but in many cases they should take seven and eight as well. He pointed out that some of the schools affected were two roomed and when 9-10 were taken out it left too many for one teacher and not enough for two teachers.

Hon. Mr. Clark assured Dr. Dewar that these special cases were being considered.

Dr. Dewar described it as a black mark on the province to have the highest rate of moonshining in Canada. He stated that he had walked on 14-year-old boys who had been lying on the road drunk from consuming moonshine. When the doctor asked where in the world he got it, he was told he could get it at ten different places.

Speaking briefly on labour, Dr. Dewar said there should be a minimum wage law in effect in the province. He could not see why labourers in P.E.I. should receive less than in other parts of Canada.

Mr. MacDonald: "There's one coming in."

BAN MISLEADING ADS

LONDON (Reuters)—Britain's commercial television chiefs have decided to get tough with toothpaste ads which tout misleading claims. Such slogans as "brush before breakfast and fight tooth decay—all day" will henceforth be banned, the commercial network has decreed.
