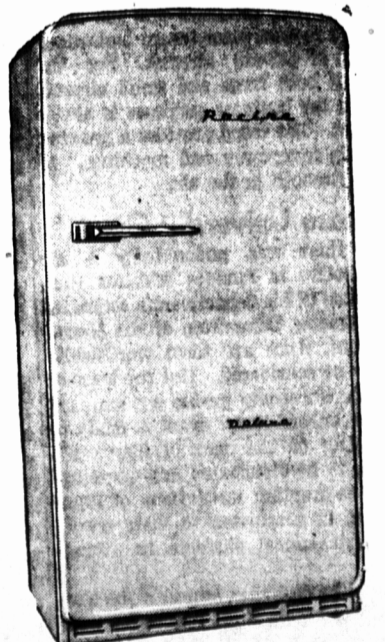

Many friends and relatives were saddened to hear of the sudden passing of Joseph A. MacDonald, of St. Peter's Lake, in the City Hospital on Friday, May 27, 1955. As he was never in robust health, it became apparent to his family that his worsened condition necessitated his removal to hospital, where he spent ten days, and preparations were in progress for his removal home when news of his sudden death was received.
