

# Dodgers In Second Place; Yankees Dump Cleveland

CHICAGO (AP)—Substitute Ted Lepcio's three-run homer and a solo shot by Ted Williams carried Boston Red Sox to a 5-2 victory over Chicago White Sox Friday night before a crowd of 36,113. Lepcio, subbing for Billy Klaus who injured his back on a fielding play in the second, slammed one of Billy Pierce's fast balls into the left field stands with two on and two out in the third inning. Williams' clutch homer his 27th home run and his seventh in nine games into the right field stands off reliever Paul Lapalme in the eighth.

The loss dropped the second-place White Sox six games behind New York Yankees and left them six games ahead of the third-place Red Sox.

NEW YORK (AP)—Andy Pafko belted a pair of home runs, breaking a 1-1 tie with a two-run shot in the ninth inning, as Milwaukee Braves hung onto first place in the National League race Thursday night with a 3-1 victory over the New York Giants.

A pair of ex-Braves, southpaw Johnny Antonelli and outfielder Bobby Thomson, had held Milwaukee even until the ninth, with Thomson smacking his 10th home run to tie it in the fifth and Antonelli blanking the leaders on four singles after Pafko's second home run of the season in the second inning.

CLEVELAND (AP)—New York Yankees breezed to a 3-1 victory Friday night as they shelled Cleveland Indians with 13 hits, including a three-run homer by Moose Kluzner.

Lefty Whitey Ford shut out the Indians for six innings but left the game in the seventh with a sore shoulder after giving up a home run in the seventh.

PHILADELPHIA (AP)—Joe Nuxhall pitched Cincinnati back into the first division Friday night with a four-hit, 7-2 victory over Philadelphia, backed by his teammates' 14 singles and one home run off league-leading pitcher Jack Sanford and three other Phil hur-

The Phillies dropped to fifth place as the National League's first five teams continued to battle around in the standings like dice in a box.

The Redlegs hardly needed to flex their vaunted muscles in spoiling rookie Sanford's bid for his 13th victory of the season and his first over them. Instead they chased him to his third defeat with nine singles, many of the scratch variety, and George Crowe's 21st home run, a two-run smash over

the right field wall in the third inning to open the Cincinnati scoring.

DETROIT — Detroit Tigers got all their runs early Friday night off righthander Pedro Ramos and went on to defeat Washington Senators 4-1 before 13,768 spectators, smallest night crowd of the season at Briggs Stadium.

The Tigers, winning the first of a three-game series against the Nationals after dropping three straight to the first-place New York Yankees, scored four times

in the four innings Ramos worked. Then they were held to one safety by relievers Dick Hyde and Jim Heise.

PITTSBURGH (AP)—Pittsburgh Pirates treated rookie bonus pitcher Von McDaniel like a country cousin Friday night as they defeated St. Louis Cardinals 7-0.

Vernon Law, chalking up his sixth victory in 10 decisions, gave up nine hits—all singles—but never was in serious trouble as the Cardinals dropped two full games back of league-leading Milwaukee.

FLINT, Mich. (AP)—Matches were struck simultaneously in Flint and The Hague, Holland, Thursday to light the pipes of two smokers competing for the international goodwill pipemaking championship.

As Robert Rudl' of Flint and Bouke Dijkstra of The Hague puffed tensely, officials observed both smokers and kept in touch by cable to see how the race was going.

Rudl kept the 3.3 grams of tobacco in his pipe going for 66 minutes and 30 seconds before his pipe flickered and went out. Dijkstra kept his small portion of tobacco alight for 10 minutes and 10 seconds to win the championship.

Bob Clark of Berwick won the Summerside Lobster Carnival Trophy for amassing the most points in yesterday's Maritime Championship Track and Field meet held at Queen Elizabeth Park in Summerside. Clark had a total of 15 points.

Alfred Groom of Summerside and Peter Watson of R.C.N. Halifax, were tied for second with 13 points each, and Neville Manderson, also of R.C.N., placed fourth with 10 points.

The Navy team from Halifax distanced all competitors with a total of 58 points to win the J.B. MacNair Trophy awarded to the winning team. Summerside had 13 points, Antigonish Highland Society 12, St. Mary's in Halifax 8 and Amherst 5.

In the Ladies Division, Betty Lou MacLean made a clean sweep of the four events, with an aggregate of 20 points.

Peter Watson of R.C.N. clipped two seconds off the Maritime record for the 800 yard run. Pushed hard by Lloyd Robertson of St. Mary's, Watson went the half-mile route in 1 minute and 57 seconds. The former Maritime record was 1 min. 59 sec.

Joe Richards of Lancaster, N. B. won the feature 5-mile run in 28 min. and 54 seconds.

Alfred Groom of Summerside broke his own Maritime (Native) record for the pole vault, clearing the bar at 12 ft. 7 1/8 inches to better his former mark made at Antigonish last year by 8 1/4 ins.

Saddle Hill referred to by Mr. Kelly extends across the back country for miles. It is high and rounded and consists of a bed of shore sand and round stones — stones worn smooth by the action of water. It was formed in some distant age long before white settlers reached this island shores. In the old days Ruffed Grouse — native partridge to Mr. Kelly — sunned and dusted themselves on its slopes or rose with a thunder of its wings from its wooded fringe.

When Mr. Kelly mentioned wading west nest material for wading in his old muzzle loader I also conjured up a memory for me — one of the late Alex Weatherbie, an old time fox and partridge hunter, lamping a section of heavy iron ramrod, that filled into wasp nest down the muzzle with a slots under the barrels when not in use, and remarking: "You can't beat this for wadding — the Old Game Anne will sure reach out for the wildgeese when you have this in her." Mr. Kelly evidently found that out too.

**PROBABLE PITCHERS**

Quite frequently I receive letters from readers of Hunter's Corner in Canada and the United States but one I received this week from California rates re-printing in my Column it reads as follows: Dear Sir: Your stories in Hunter's Corner take me back those years when you tell of finding partridge after the first snowfall, and how they roost low in the trees and scare the daylight out of you when you surprise them, then later in the season maybe a cotton tail or two.

"When you mentioned Keeffe's lake it was like a letter from home for Keeffe's lake played an important part in the lives of most of the young folks around that part of the Island. For it was there we had our first bath in the spring time, and through having and harvest time, at the end of the day we would pile into the old truck wagon and on the east shore of the lake where there was fine beach sand and plenty of trees to change clothes in.

"I came from Elliotvale near Gil's Blacksmith Shop. It has been there for a long time. The owner, Mr. John Gil, passed on just a short time ago. He was a nearly one hundred years old and a very fine gentleman. We used to hang in saddle hill and the woods on either side. I had an old double barreled muzzle loader, used wasps nest for wadding a horn for the powder and shot and a ramrod and as I remember you look your life in your hands when you fooled around with that old blunderbuss.

"But I envy you sometimes when you tell about fishing along a shady brook where the willows grow along the edge of the stream. (I must stop) so let me wish continued success to your paper and the same to Hunter's Corner. Thanks for the memories. Yours respectfully, W. J. Kelly, 1640 Olympus Ave, La Puente, California.

There have been times of late when I have felt like discontinuing my Column but after reading a letter like the above I feel that all they say 'once an Islander always an Islander' — meaning Spud Island naturally, and I don't blame Mr. Kelly feeling homesick for a glimpse of the old home haunts. I had the same feeling when I was overseas. My home is only about six miles from Keeffe's Lake and that area always held an attraction for me. I was born and raised in Mount Albion with the districts of Lake Verde and Avondale between Mr. Kelly's Elliotvale.

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## DOWN THE BACK STRETCH

The eyes of horsemen throughout the Maritimes were turned towards Moncton Monday night, where the season's biggest purse, the \$2,000 Monctonian, was raced.

Many opinions were held as to the probable winner, with Conivar, the favorite because of his mile in 2:07 1/5 at Fredericton, which was the fastest performance of this season.

Very few were expecting that Newport Chief's owner would be collecting the largest sum of the purse, evidently forgetting that in the free-for-all race at Old Home Week, Charlottetown, August 17, 1956, he won all three dashes for owner B. C. Cruikshank, Halifax, and driver R. D. Cruikshank, times 2:05 3/5, 2:05 3/5 and 2:05 3/5, the former winning out the id trot race of 2:05 1/2, made by Bud Wenger on August 20, 1936, driven by Earl Avery.

**MANY RECORDS**  
It was also a new Maritime record for three heats, wiping out the previous record made by Walter Dale at Fredericton, N. B., on September 15, 1936, times 2:07 1/2, 2:02 1/2 and 2:06 3/4. The middle mile was a new Canadian pacing record, he was driven by Conivar, the former winning out the id trot race of 2:05 1/2, made by Bud Wenger on August 20, 1936, driven by Earl Avery.

**TOP MARKS**  
Last week the season's track record was set at Saint John Raceway at 2:10 3/5 by Sep Hanover (Scoville) . . . The fastest mile last Saturday night at Sackville Downs Raceway was paced by Frenchman, owned and driven by James Given—time 2:11 3/5; Black Majesty (Turner) 2 . . . Jolly Lad, driven by Len O'Meara won dash 3 with the same field in 2:14 . . . The C trot was won by Scotland's Ace, owned and driven by James MacGregor; Watchin' Lissie (L. O'Meara) 2, time 2:16 1/5. (At Truro last Saturday night, Pepper boy, owned and driven by George Turner, trotted the season's fastest mile in the Maritimes, winning the fourth race in 2:11 2/5, which is a new record. He also won Race 1.

These same night, WMX, owned by Thompson and MacNeill, Southport, P. E. I., won the sixth race in 2:15 4/5.

The \$10,000 Trotting Derby at Foxboro Raceway last week drew the fastest trotters in the United States, and proved a memorable contest. The favorite was Gallophone, owned by Earl Avery; Jean Laird, 1:59 1/5; Trader Horn, 2:00; and others with records close to two minutes. Singing Sword 2, owned by the L. and G. Stable (Halifax, and driven by Lloyd (Bunney) Walker, Halifax, wasn't considered as a factor, but he made the headlines by finishing third was Gallophone home in front and setting up a new trotting record for the track of 2:02. Trader Horn was second. The event was the highlight of the Grand Circuit meeting at Foxboro. Our congratulatory driver Walker, Singing Sword will be remembered as having trotted the fastest mile in the Maritimes in 1956 at Old Home Week, Charlottetown, August 18, 1956, time 2:06 4/5.
