CANADA FOR LONG LIFE.—The Manitoba Colonist remarks: "The whole Dominion is famous for the great ages reached by its residents, and for the wonderful vitality and splendid physical being as well as mental. A recent issue of a journal, the Charlottetown Prince Edward Island EXAMINER contains five death notices ranging from 73 to 98 years.

MAILS.—The mails will be transferred to the Stanley on Monday next. At midnight on Sunday a special train will leave here for Georgetown, taking mails and passengers; each subsequent evening this special train will leave at ten o'clock. The foreign mail will close half an hour before the departure of this train. The incoming mail will be received by the Capes route on Monday.

NEW FEED BOX.—We understand that Mr. Joseph Sanders, of Belle Creek, has just obtained a patent from the Dominion Government for a regulating feed box for horses. Mr. Sanders claims that this feed box is what has long been needed, as it causes the horse to thoroughly grind his oats or other feed, and prevents him from bolting, wasting or choking. The feed-box in question will, we understand, shortly be placed on the market.

HAS TWO MAYORS.—The town of St. George, W. Va., has two Mayors, and in consequence municipal matters are in great confusion. Mayor Miller was elected at the last election, but failed to qualify. The council then appointed D. S. Minear mayor. Miller almost immediately afterwards took the oath of office. Each gentleman is now trying to run the town, and the result is that no laws are enforced and the tough element are having things all their own way.

Sutherland by Mr. Anthony Collett, of Westmoreland; and against Donald Ferguson by Mr. Patrick Mooney, of Fort Augustus. The petition against Mr. Ferguson was not filed until five o'clock yesterday afternoon.

English, 12; Scotch, 6; Irish, 8; French, 1; African, 2. Males, 15; females, 14.

TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

SPECIAL DESPATCHES TO THE EXAMINER.

DOMINION PARLIAMENT

Summary of Proceedings.

OTTAWA, March 7.

In the House of Commons to-day, Mr. Brien introduced a bill to amend the franchise Act, providing that notices of revision should be published in the newspapers of the adjoining county, in case none were published in the riding.

When the motion was made to go into supply, Mr. Fisher moved an amendment that corn be placed on the free list. He contended that farmers required cheap corn to enable them to compete for the meat markets of the world. He quoted a resolution of the Central Farmers' Institute in favor of free corn.

Mr. Pope argued that the market of Canada should be reserved for the Canadian corn-growers. He had confidence in Canada.

After some discussion, the resolution was declared lost on division.

The House went into committee of supply, taking the public works appropriations into consideration.

The House adjourned at 1.25.

A Deadlock

PROVIDENCE, March 7.

By the action of the House of Representatives in tabling the appropriation bill because it contained an appropriation to a state home and school, the superintendent of which is charged with cruelty to children, and obnoxious to the Democratic majority of the House, the state is left without money to pay the running expenses and is not responsible for any expense since Feb. 28. Where weekly payments are the custom this will be felt to-morrow as a hardship. Over \$600,000 is involved in the deadlock. The matter cannot be passed until next week.

A Bishop Deposed.

CHICAGO, March 7.

Bishop Bowrin, of the Methodist Episcopal church, was deposed from his position and expelled from the church at the session of the trial committee this morning, charged with unchristian conduct in uttering falsehoods and speaking ill of his brethren in the ministry. All the charges were sustained.

A Threatening Attitude.

LONDON, March 7.

It is stated that the Portuguese Minister here has failed in negotiations with Lord Salisbury for a settlement of the Africa territorial dispute and that he will return to Lisbon immediately. The people in Lisbon are assuming a threatening attitude.

A Serious Difficulty.

MOZAMBEQUE, March 7.

There is serious difficulty existing between the Portuguese officials here and 400 imported Gou soldiers. The soldiers who are British subjects, refuse to drill or perform any military service for the Portuguese.

Steam Navigation Company.

OTTAWA, March 7.

The Charlottetown Steam Navigation Company (Limited) has been incorporated by letters patent. The capital stock is placed at \$400,000. The stockholders are all leading P. E. Islanders, with the exception of Israel Longworth, of Truro.

To Make an Attack.

ZANZIBAR, March 7.

The German expedition, under command of Major Wissmann, has started for Swahili, the strongest position held by Bwanaheri's forces. It is the intention of Wissmann to make an attack up the place.

Personal.

The St. John Sun says: A. A. Bartlett, of Charlottetown, formerly of St. John, Dr. Blanchard, of Charlottetown, G. F. Fair, of Moncton, and Fred. S. White, of Montreal, will start this week on a trans-continental tour, taking the Intercolonial and C. P. R. to Vancouver; thence down the Pacific coast, passing through Oregon and Washington State to San Francisco, returning by United States railroads to the seaboard, stopping off at Omaha, Salt Lake City, Kansas City, Chicago and other points along the route. They will cover in all about 9,000 miles, and will be absent about seven weeks. The Sun wishes the party a pleasant journey, fine weather, a good rail and immunity from sickness and accident.

It is Cold and Very Cold.

CATTLE DYING BY HUNDREDS IN THE SOUTHWEST.

SAVANNAH, Ga., March 2.—The first hard freeze of the winter occurred here this morning. Vegetables were killed. The damage to truck crops cannot be estimated. Light snow fell in the forenoon, the first for years.

ST. LOUIS, Mo., March 2.—Reports from Northern Texas say hundreds of range cattle have been frozen to death during the present cold spell, and unless the weather speedily moderates the loss will be very severe.

GENESSEE, Idaho, March 2.—On Wednesday morning the thermometer fell to 42 degrees below zero here. Stock are dying by the hundreds.

NEW YORK, March 2.—A blinding snow storm, reminding New York of the famous blizzard of two years ago, set in about 9 o'clock to-night. At midnight the snow was still falling. A Chatham, Mass., despatch says: A heavy northwest snow storm prevails here. The three masted schooner B. Courtney, laden with phosphate, is ashore at Kilpond bar. The storm is so severe that no steamers will attempt to weather the cape to-night.
