Cedric Ballem, fastballing right-hander hurled the Sunshine Island Dairy to a 2-0 victory over the Basilio Youth Club in a pitchers' duel with "Sonny" Stull yesterday evening in a City League Softball game played on the Parkdale Diamond.

The Guardian Angels and Bruce Stewart's played to a 6-6 tie in another league game played on the Knights of Columbus diamond.

Ballem struck out seven men and did not issue a free pass in pitching his best game of the season. Stull struck out two and walked five.

Rollie MacEachern preserved the tie for Bruce Stewart's in their game with the Guardian with a sensational over-the-shoulder catch of Elmer Ward's fly ball into deep right field with two men on base in the last of the seventh.

Ward's clout came after Harry Poulton had opened the last half of the inning with a single and Manny Kays reached on an error. Dick Doyle started on the mound for the Guardian and retired after two innings in favor of Ray Stull. In the last five innings Stull gave up five hits, two walks and

struck out three.

Leeman Murphy went the distance for Bruce Stewart's. Murphy was touched for twelve hits but top notch support by his team-mates cut off several Guardian rallies.

Johnny Bradley of Bruce Stewart's with a triple obtained the longest hit of the game. Harry Poulton got two doubles and a single in four trips to the plate to lead all batters.

Ernie Trainor, Bruce Stewart's third baseman turned in a sparkling game in the field.

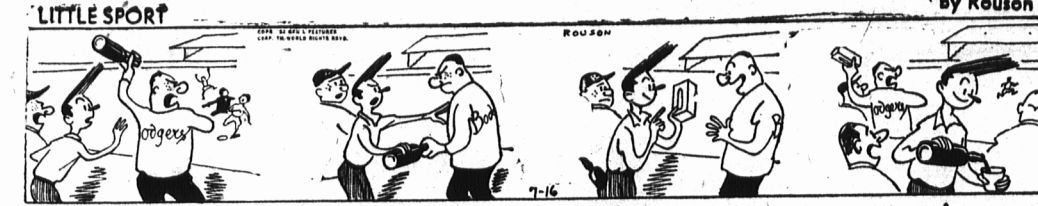

IN THIS CORNER!

Harry Poulton's hopes of regaining his Maritime welterweight title may have been side-tracked for the time being with the defeat of Tommy "Gun" Spencer, the defending champion, at the hands of "Kid" Adshade Monday night. Poulton was hoping to get a crack at the winner of the fight but the fact that Adshade won may necessitate a re-match. However, should Spencer's eye injury prevent him from fighting in the near future or should Adshade not have a contract to give Spencer the first crack at his newly won crown then Harry should be given the opportunity to fight Adshade. We believe that Poulton would take Adshade and that the fight would be a tizzer. In the meantime Poulton will keep in trim by fighting Arnold Flegher of Chatham in Dartmouth next Monday night. The Flegher-Poulton scrap will be an eight round semi-final go.

If Harry is not given the opportunity of fighting Adshade then it is likely that the Grace Bay fight promoter Gusie MacLean will be lining up "Gramps" Kiley for a title bout with Adshade. Poulton of course has more right to a title fight than Kiley. Harry held the title for a year until he lost it last summer to Spencer. Kiley, by the way, fought Adshade earlier this year but lost out to his heavier hitting opponent.

Bit by bit the financial deficit of the North Sydney Victorias is being wiped out. According to a news report in the Sydney Post Record the deficit of the club for a three year period has been reduced by \$8,000. The club's total deficit for the period had been \$23,255 but by means of fund raising activities it has been cut down to \$15,138. The club holds a weekly Community Night program at the Northside Forum. Next year the Vics will probably be back in big time hockey.

Baseball may have received a shot in the arm last night by the decision of the Island League executive to abandon the rest of the league schedule and to start round robin series in Charlottetown and Summerside in the Intermediate and Junior leagues. The Junior Abbies and the Intermediate Abbies should produce some keenly contested and crowd pleasing ball games. So far all games between these teams, especially between the Junior Abbies and M.C.A. have been excellent contests.

It is rather a pity that the Island League schedule did not continue. Had Holman's being able to maintain a team in the league it is most certain that the schedule would have been played out. On the other hand the new schedule will provide more baseball and thus keep more interest in the game. Under the new system there will be two games on week-days and one on Sunday. Next Sunday may be an exception as it is possible that a junior team from Dartmouth will play an exhibition game with the Junior Abbies here.

Today at Montague athletes from the eastern part of the Province and a number from Charlottetown will take part in the track and field meet being held in connection with the Scotch gathering in that centre. This is the first in what is hoped will be a series of track and field meets throughout the province and it is quite likely that the meet will provide its share of top notch competition.

Golf Fever In Winnipeg As Canadian Open Nears

WINNIPEG, July 15 (CP)—Golf fever grips this open-hearted city today.

It rolled out the welcome mat with an enthusiastic flourish for the four-day, \$15,000 Canadian open golf championship which starts tomorrow over the St. Charles Golf and Country Club course. It will be the first Canadian open on a Prairie course.

Hundreds of fans were at the course today as most of the top-flight golfers from Canada and the United States—plus a lone entry from Argentina—played practice rounds in advance of the 72-hole classic.

Officials said about 2,000 persons had already purchased weekly spectator tickets at \$6 each. They expect thousands more to come out for single days, particularly on closing day Saturday.

The enthusiasm extends into the heart of the city. Almost every business place along busy Portage Avenue has window displays based on golf.

In the field of 147 entries for the championship, no player stood out as favorite. Many experts thought St. Charles' short, narrow airways and true greens should work to the advantage of Jim Ferrier from San Francisco, native of Australia who won the title in the last two years. But

Ferrier, who wins golf tournaments by sinking the long putts, hasn't been putting well this year, although he is hopeful now that he is getting back his touch.

Ferrier played nine holes today but shied off discussion of his score.

"It doesn't matter if you shoot 29 on nine holes today," he said. "It's what you shoot tomorrow that really counts."

Robert Di Vincenzo of Buenos Aires who dislikes the narrow fairways was around in 69—three under par. So did Harold Eidsvig, pro at the Winnipeg Nikawka course.

Several players shot 70's including Jim Turnesa, U. S. professional Golfer's Association champion; Ted Rhodes, Negro player from Chicago; and Smiley Quick, affable Texan who won the Ontario open in 1951.

Some prominent players sent word they wouldn't be on hand including Julius Boros, U. S. open champion; Frank Stranahan of Toledo, O., former Canadian amateur champion; and Walter McEroy of Vancouver, 1951 Canadian amateur champion.

Cleveland Indians Take First Of Five-Game Series From N. Y. Yankees 7-3

Cleveland Indians took the first game of an important five-game series with New York Yankees Tuesday night by tripping the American League leaders 7-3. The victory reduced the Yankees' lead over the Indians to 2-1-2 games.

The American League race tightened up generally as Boston Red Sox took over third place from Chicago White Sox by defeating the White Sox 7-5. Rookie Dick Gernert, former Halifax star, hit a pair of consecutive home runs and George Kell added another to account for all the Boston runs.

Pitchers Dick Brodowski and Al Benton gave the White Sox seven hits, including a three-run homer by Minnie Minoso in the seventh inning.

Early Wynn's five-hit pitching and home runs by Harry Simpson and Luke Easter gave the Indians their victory at Yankee Stadium. Home runs by Yogi Berra, Joe Collins and Mickey Mantle accounted for all the world championship runs.

A two-run first inning, highlighted by a triple steal with Al Rosen sliding safely across the plate, gave the Indians a lead they never relinquished.

Walt Dropp, Detroit first baseman, got eight hits, batted across six runs and tied the major league record by hitting safely 12 straight times, but the Tigers dropped a doubleheader to Washington Senators, 8-2 and 9-8.

Dropp fouled out on his try for number 13. The record of 12 straight was set by Pinky Higgins of Boston Red Sox in 1938.

Dropp clipped Walter Masterson of Washington for four successive singles in the first game. In the second, he slammed Bob Porterfield for a base-loaded triple and single, then tied the record with a booming double off Lou Slesater.

Philadelphia Athletics swept a two-night doubleheader from St. Louis Browns, 7-6 and 11-3.

Bob Newsum went the distance for the A's in the nightcap, allowing 10 hits but holding tight in every inning except the ninth when Jim Dyck clouted a two-run homer. Shortstop Eddie Joost of the Athletics hit homers in both games, a two-run blow in the second game and a ninth-inning, game-winning grand-slammer in the opener.

New York Giants gained a half game on Brooklyn Dodgers, National League leaders, by defeating St. Louis Cardinals 6-3 under the lights. The result left the Giants five games behind. The Cards all most shook off southpaw Dave Koslo's whammy but reliever Hoyt Wilhelm came in to protect the victory and save Koslo's eighth consecutive triumph over St. Louis in two seasons.

Brooklyn was rained out at Cincinnati.

Boston Braves fashioned a six-run fifth inning to rout Chicago Cubs 10-3 for their fifth straight National League victory in a day game. Right-hander Jim Wilson hurled his eighth victory, although he gave up 15 hits. Twelve Boston batters stepped to the plate in the fat fifth as starter Turk Lown, who suffered his sixth loss, Willard Ramsdell and Bob Kelly took turns trying to stem the Braves.

Sparked by rookie Mc Clark's grand-slam homer in the third inning, Philadelphia Phillies trounced Pittsburgh Pirates 10-3 in a night game. Willie Jones also homered for the Phils to help Curt Simmons coast to his eighth victory against three losses.
