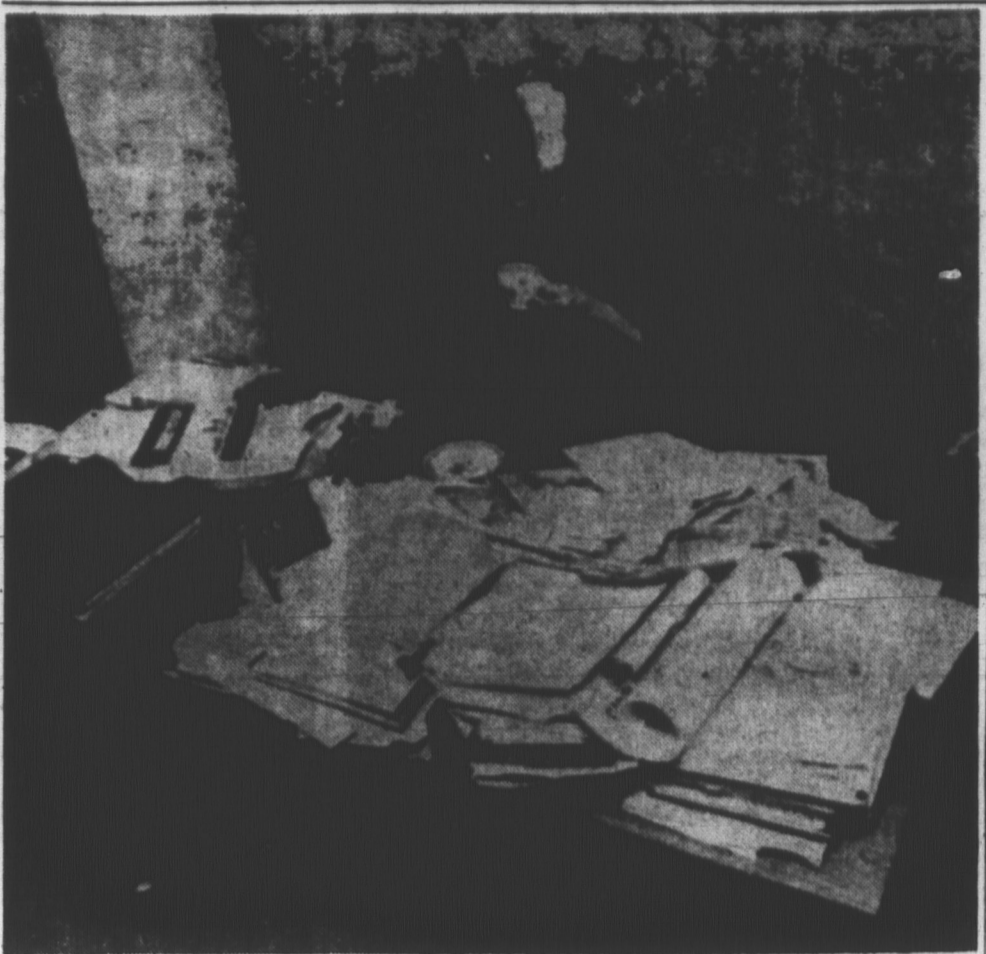

Sweet Pickled Oranges Exciting Entree Relish

With the last week of holiday well underway, what are you doing to try to outwit the "cold" sniffles that often plague the whole family? Obviously extra rest is needed. The food for the week should be comparatively simple, with an extra quantity of oranges and/or orange juice, containing a high percentage of Vitamin C that is important in building up resistance to infection. **Minimum Daily Aunts** Six ounces of orange juice insure a minimum daily quota of Vitamin C. Two big juice-oranges make about 6 oz. of juice. Or prepare frozen orange concentrate or chilled canned orange juice as directed on the package. Or use orange juice in preparing vegetables for desserts. This year frozen orange juice concentrate is abundant and lower in price at many supermarkets. A good way to snatch a quick rest when you feel "run-down" is to sit quietly for five minutes, relax, "empty" your mind of problems and sip a cupful of heated orange juice. Throughout this week, we are columning recipes, calling for oranges or orange juice, that

are different, delicious and never boring.

Measurements level; recipes for 6

SWEET-PICKLED ORANGES
6 Florida oranges
1 tsp. salt
2½ c. sugar
¼ c. white corn syrup
½ c. water
1 c. cider vinegar
12 whole cloves and
1-3 stick of cinnamon tied in
4" square of cheesecloth
Wash oranges; cover with boiling water; add salt and slow-boil 20 min. Drain. Cover again with boiling water; boil 20 min. Drain. Cut each orange into quarters; remove seeds. In saucepan, combine sugar, corn syrup, water and vinegar. Cook-stir until sugar dissolves. Add spices; boil 10 min. to make a syrup. Remove spices. Arrange orange sections in casserole; pour over syrup;

cover. Bake 1½ hrs. in a slow oven or until the slices are translucent. Cool and serve as relish, with meat, poultry or game.
