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## Base Metal Discoveries In N. B. Biggest In Canada's History

BATHURST, N. B. (CP)—Provincial authorities have backed up the claims of mining officials who said the base metal discoveries in the Bathurst area are among the biggest in Canada's history.

Since discovery of the deposits was announced 18 months ago, authorities have confirmed the original optimistic predictions and now these facts and statements from responsible sources stand out:

1. The two largest deposits are being prepared for production.  
 A pilot mill will be built this summer to determine the best method of ore treatment.  
 Production of the first base-metal concentrates is expected to start next fall. It was delayed six months when fire destroyed a new mining mill, first in the Bathurst area.

2. One company alone, Brunswick Mining and Smelting Corporation Limited, which operated in New Brunswick a single-year staking record unmatched by any other province, reports it will continue to spend a monthly average of \$100,000 in early development work.

Most of the potential wealth, however, will remain underground a considerable time.

"It is there and it is going to be big," said Mines Minister Norman B. Buchanan. He added that "some years" would pass before full development could become possible. Exploration had proven "tens of millions" of tons of lead, zinc, silver and copper-bearing sulphides.

"It is impossible to develop an industry of this size more rapidly than is now being done," said Mr. J. Boylen, Toronto, head of the Brunswick Corporation. Mr. Boylen and associates have 78 mining projects, mostly in New Brunswick.

Dr. A. L. McAllister of the University of New Brunswick geology department said gross value of the two biggest surveyed ore bodies, at current average market prices, would be roughly \$1,300,000,000. In last year's staking rush \$1,616

claims set a Canadian record. About 6,000 in the Bathurst area have been covered by geophysical methods at a cost of approximately \$1,000,000.

C. S. Clements, director of mines for New Brunswick, said the largest known deposit, 20 miles southwest of Bathurst, has been traced for a length of 1,400 feet. Reports indicated reserves of 27,440,000 tons to a depth of 1,000 feet averaging 5.28 per cent zinc, 1.88 per cent lead, 0.58 per cent copper and 1.79 ounces of silver per ton.

The other big ore body is in the same area, at Austin Brook. Reserves above 1,000 feet in both zones, excluding metals indicated below that level, total 49,970,000 tons, Mr. Clements reported. Geologists estimate the eventual total tonnage for the Bathurst area up to 100,000,000 or more.

The mines director said no base-metal company elsewhere in Canada had as impressive tonnage at such an early stage of development.

The ores contain about 40 per cent sulphur, Mr. Clements said, and this could lead to development of sulphur mines in which base metals, of lesser value, would be considered by-products.

The value of the ores was "beyond question" but the value to New Brunswick would depend to a large extent on the feasibility of producing, in the province, refined metals and sulphur products.

A Brunswick Corporation solicitor told the Gloucester county council the company is committed to spend nearly \$27,000,000 before mining starts on its holdings.

Great advantage of the mine fields' proximity to tidewater and main-line railways was pointed out by Prof. F. A. Milligan, of the UNB economics department.

Although the deposits can be mined easily and cheaply, Prof. Milligan said, New Brunswick will not reap full benefit unless a smelter is established in the province. This would result in a valuable chemical industry.

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
