## Saints Tie Abbies 2-2 To Win Intermediate Semi-Finals Series 7-5

A. J. McAdam's Saint Dunstan's University pucksters roared back from behind a two goal lead to battle Jackie Kan's Abbeys to a 2-2 tie at the Forum last night in the smartest game of hockey to be witnessed in Intermediate A competition this season, and advance into the playoff finals for the Island Intermediate Hockey championship.

The Saints took the two-game, total goal series by a 7-5 count, having won the opening game here Monday by a 3-3 score, and will now meet Summerside Crystals in a best of three series for the title, which may get underway at Summerside tomorrow night.

With both teams coming up with a wide-open, fast, breaking and passing attack right from the opening whistle, Abbies garnered the only goal in the first frame and repeated the performance in the second to whittle down the Saints two goal advantage they carried into the game with them, and tie up the series. Battling every inch of the way, however, Saints were not to be denied, and coming up with a terrific third period spree, chalked up the only two goals in the frame to deadlock the game and retain their two goal lead on the series.

Although there were only four goals scored in the game, both teams hit a breakneck pace all the way and produced many smart scoring attempts that were only turned aside by some brilliant goal-tending by Hooper of Abbies and Strain of Saints, who both turned in standout performances all through the contest.

The game was particularly clean for the first two periods, and throughout most of the third, with only three penalties being handed out up to that time, when Joe Mahar and Ralph Josey just about blew the lid off the rink for a few minutes when they tangled in a bit of brawl that started on the ice and was continued on in the penalty box, that gave witnessing fans a few hectic minutes of rousing action. We don't know what started the action on the ice. All we saw were the two boys at it hammer and tongs well out of the play back by the Abbies blue-line.

After being waved to "sinners row" for five minutes each, the ruckus broke out again in the penalty box, and after carrying the battle right down between the boards and the seats, were broken up again with considerable effort and were both sent to the dressing rooms with misconducts.

The fracas started with only two minutes and twenty seconds left in the game, and was probably the reason why referees Jay and Hogan didn't hand out match-misconducts.

"Roach" MacGregor snared the Abbies first tally at 7:21 of the first period on a three-man attack with Joey LeClair and Ralph Sheppard. LeClair carried in, passed to Sheppard who took a shot with MacGregor banging in the rebound. At 4:08 of the second period Art Perry came up with the smartest effort of the night to send Abbies two in front and deadlock the series. Winding up from behind his own net, Perry stick-handled his way down the boards through the opposition, and going in over the blue-line, cut in on net to beat Strain cleanly with a hard shot that caught the far, upper corner of the net.

Will Houde broke the ice for Saints when he teamed up with Jerry McQuaid during a power attack around the net, Houde banging in the latter's pass from close in, while Cliff Bernard clinched the series for Saints at 13:09 after Mahar had broke loose from centre ice to carry in and slip the payoff pass to Bernard close in for a smart effort.

Although the game was a rousing affair for the remaining part of the game and both came up with some flashing plays, neither team could dent the armour of the opposing net custodians, who were really on their job.

Montreal butter was unchanged at 60 1/4c for No. 1 Solids f.o.b. Montreal with Toronto unchanged at 60 1/4c.

Creamery butter prices were steady on all markets in New Brunswick during the past week with creameries to wholesalers 62 1/2c—wholesale to retail stores 64c.

The official report of butter on the Charlottetown market is 60c wholesale—local jobbing 61c. It is reported that butter is selling for a lower price than this but there is no reason for it as this is the time of year when production is much below consumption and our present stock of butter is almost completely eliminated. During the past week there was no butter from the Island for points in New Brunswick, but orders are expected again soon.

Creameries in the Province whose production does not meet the local demands at the present time are purchasing butter in solids from those whose production is above their local requirements. This is a good policy to follow at any time in order to prevent the cutting of prices by creameries with accumulating stocks.

The stocks of creamery butter on March 1, 1950, in Canada amounted to thirty-six and one-half (36 1/2) million pounds. The summary total was higher than last year by 17.8 million pounds, and the five-year average of March 1st stocks is 18 1/2 million pounds.

The February, 1950, out of storage movement was 9.7 million pounds as compared with a similar movement of 8.9 million pounds last year. According to reliable information a portion of the butter in storage at the first of the month is being exported, which will considerably reduce our present holdings. Last year, if we remember rightly, about fifteen million pounds of butter were imported into Canada. The exportation of ten million pounds

The official report of butter on the Charlottetown market is 60c wholesale—local jobbing 61c. It is reported that butter is selling for a lower price than this but there is no reason for it as this is the time of year when production is much below consumption and our present stock of butter is almost completely eliminated. During the past week there was no butter from the Island for points in New Brunswick, but orders are expected again soon.

Creameries in the Province whose production does not meet the local demands at the present time are purchasing butter in solids from those whose production is above their local requirements. This is a good policy to follow at any time in order to prevent the cutting of prices by creameries with accumulating stocks.

The stocks of creamery butter on March 1, 1950, in Canada amounted to thirty-six and one-half (36 1/2) million pounds. The summary total was higher than last year by 17.8 million pounds, and the five-year average of March 1st stocks is 18 1/2 million pounds.

The February, 1950, out of storage movement was 9.7 million pounds as compared with a similar movement of 8.9 million pounds last year. According to reliable information a portion of the butter in storage at the first of the month is being exported, which will considerably reduce our present holdings. Last year, if we remember rightly, about fifteen million pounds of butter were imported into Canada. The exportation of ten million pounds
