THERE was a large meeting of the shareholders of the Light and Power Company held last evening which passed off without any discussion of the increased rates. The following directors were elected: Messrs. L. L. Beer, George D. Longworth, F. W. Hyndman, S. W. Crabbe and A. E. Ings. At a subsequent meeting of the directors Mr. G. D. Longworth was unanimously elected President. Mr. S. W. Crabbe, Vice President and Mr. A. E. Ings, Secretary-Treasurer. The officials will be appointed at the first meeting of the new board. The new directors say they are now prepared to sign the contract for the street lighting in accordance with the Full Company's tender.

A CORRESPONDENT of the GUARDIAN who has been looking into the latest scheme to solve the domestic problem sends the following: Thos. Southworth, director of colonization, Ottawa, has a new scheme for getting over the servant girl trouble. Everybody who will advance about thirty dollars to pay passage money will receive an able-bodied Swedish girl, who cannot speak a word of English, but who comes under government guarantee of staying with a family until she has worked out her passage. This is the plan which the department of interior is trying and as the director of colonization, Mr. Southworth will give information about it. Some time ago the interior department tried to solve the servant girl problem by bringing out a number of bonnie Scotch lassies, but the plan was a dead failure, as the servant provided for young farmers of Manitoba picked up the girls like hot cakes and married them out of hand. In less than three years all of them were wedded and if the drops had turned out well, were waiving servants themselves. The government, not having a matrimonial agency department, gave up the attempt until the plan of getting Swedish girls to come over was suggested.
