In the evening a large number of decorated cakes and some food that remained from the supper, were obtained from Robert Bradley of Charlottetown. **N.B. Resident Is Fined \$75**

SUMMERSIDE — A fine of \$75 and costs was levied against GUMBERT Jones, Fredericton, N.B., by Magistrate W. Chester S. MacDonald in Prince County magistrate's court yesterday.  
Mr. Jones was charged with driving while his abilities were impaired by alcohol, as the result of a collision at North Tryon, June 28.  
Mr. Jones had originally pleaded not guilty to the charge but changed his plea in court yesterday. The magistrate ordered the accused to pay an additional \$29 for the payment of witnesses who were to be called in the case.  
Winston Churchill MacKay, Charlottetown, was remanded in custody to July 30 on a charge of failing to stop at the scene of an accident resulting in bodily injury and driving on without rendering assistance.  
The offence is alleged to have taken place in West Devon, July 22, at approximately 7:30 in the evening and is an indictable charge. Mr. MacKay did not plead as he has not yet retained his lawyer. He was placed on bail for \$2,000, plus a surety of \$2,000 or two sureties of \$1,000 each or \$500 cash bail.

**Alberton To See Circus Saturday**

ALBERTON — Residents of Alberton who are in their sixties recall the thrills they experienced when the last circus visited Alberton some 50 years ago.  
Boys and girls of today are looking forward to a similar experience on Saturday when the Al G. Kelly and Miller Bros. circus, now on tour, is scheduled to visit the West Prince County town under sponsorship of the Alberton fire department.  
It will be recalled that the converted freighter "Fleurus" which was carrying this circus burned and sank off Yarmouth, N.S. one month ago today. Fortunately all the animals, except one zebra, were saved. The smaller animals were carried off the ship by a dolly and construction cranes lifted the others off in their cages.  
It is the circus tradition that "the show must go on," so misfortune in the loss of some \$200,000 worth of equipment and personal property of the performers and the loss of their ship did not stop the show folks. Some 11 trucks are now being used to transport the circus, while a bus and several cars are being used to convey the performers and crew.
