Russians Budget For Guns, Butter

MOSCOW (Reuters) — Russia announced Monday a "guns and butter" budget with a record spending for both defence and consumer goods.

Finance Minister Vasily Garbuzov gave details of the multi-billion rouble budget to about 1,400 deputies at a Kremlin meeting of the Supreme Soviet parliament here.

Garbuzov disclosed the 1963 budget called for revenue of 57,500,000 rubles and an expenditure of 86,100,000 rubles—about four per cent more than last year's record figure.

Defence spending, rising at about the same rate as the overall budget, was set for 12,900,000,000 rubles—an increase of 200,000,000 rubles. This represents 16 per cent of the total budget.

Garbuzov also announced an increase in agricultural investments to a record 9,700,000,000 rubles. This was seen as an indication of Premier Khrushchev's concern to improve the country's economy.

Chairman Veniamin Dymshits of the Soviet Economic Council told deputies increased investments were planned for the chemical and consumer goods sections of the economy.

Dymshits said foreign aid would be increased by 24 per cent and trade with capitalist countries also would be increased, especially with Italy, France, Japan, Finland and Denmark.

Third Car Is Recovered

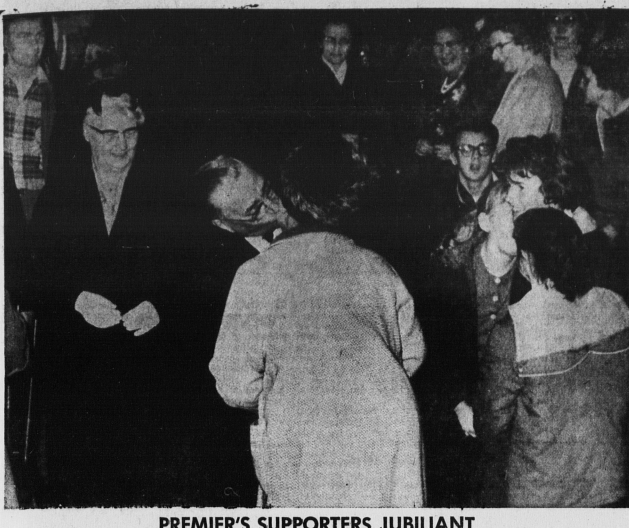

GAULISET GETS JOB
PARIS (Reuters) — Prominent Gaullist politician Jacques Chaban-Delmas Thursday was overwhelmingly elected president of the new French National Assembly as it met for the first time in Brussels over the week-end.

Delmas, mayor of Bordeaux and a prominent supporter of President de Gaulle, received 237 votes from the 482-member assembly to win over two opposition candidates.

S'ide Postal Employees Giro For Christmas Rush

SUMMERSIDE — Postal employees this year are breathing a sigh of relief that Dec. 25 falls on a Tuesday, permitting them to make last-minute deliveries on the day before. Last year the Christmas holiday fell on a Monday which meant final mail deliveries were made on the Saturday before and tardy parcels were in some cases undelivered by the 25th.

A letter from postal headquarters to all Dominion post offices, points out the importance of early mailing. Dec. 25 was deadline for mails to distant points, with Dec. 13 (Thursday) the closing day for all mail to U.S.A. and distant points in Canada.

The letter also states in reference to parcel posting, "a parcel worth sending is a parcel worth receiving", and notes the great importance of proper wrapping and packing of every parcel sent, to ensure safe delivery of the contents.

The Canada Post office this year has sent out brochures with perforated labels attached so citizens may send their cards and letters to the same general areas in bundles with the labels denoting "distant" or "local" points. This saves valuable time and effort for postal workers and speeds deliveries.

W. F. Griffith, Summerside postmaster, said yesterday that people are using the labels quite well and it saves the post office people a considerable amount of work. He noted that the Summerside post office will remain open until 9 p.m. every evening from now until Christmas. Two extra workers are expected to be added today to the postal staff at the Summerside office as the rush slowly begins.

MAIL LIGHT YET
Many post offices across the province report that the large majority of Christmas mails have not yet been posted. The absence of snow and lack of cold weather appears to have made people fail to realize that Christmas is exactly two weeks away today.

The MV Confederation will leave today for drydock in Halifax, leaving the MV Abegweit to maintain crossings between Charlottetown and Toronto. It is a short time ago when it remained on anchored last night by Graham Rogers, provincial transportation director.

As extensive changes are slated to the bow and stern loading doors as well as the MV Confederation, it is expected the replacement will be away a few days in full after the MV Confederation will be away.

Mr. Rogers said that as a result of the Confederation being away, the normal schedule of 10 ferries per day will be cut in half. The SS Prince Edward Island which returned from refit Borden and Toronto, will be replaced by B. stand-by duty, he said.

Shark Kills Aussie Boy

ADELAIDE, Australia (AP) — A mother and father watched a desperate but futile fight to save their son Sunday from a shark off Normanville Beach, 47 miles south of Adelaide.

Gregory Martin Corner, 16, was taking part in a spear-fishing competition when he was pulled into the water by a shark. He was rescued by his father and brother.

Phillips got Corner into shallow water but the boy was dead.

Corner's parents watched the fight from the shore 150 yards away, along with Phillips' wife and child. The spear became stuck in Corner's leg as he struggled with the shark.
