

Thomson British Open Winner

 HOYLAKE, Engand (AP)—Australia's Peter Thomson, a chunky powerhouse with a ready grin, casually hunched an international field Friday and won the British Open golf championship for the third straight year—a feat unequalled in the modern game. The Melbourne professional shot nearly flawless golf for his 72-hole total of 286, three strokes better than his nearest rival, Belgium's sombre Flori Van Donck. Long-hitting Roberto de Vicenzo, an Argentine now living in Mexico, finished third with 290 after shattering his own hopes for top money with a 79 this morning.

The 26-year-old Thomson became the first man to win this ancient crown three times in a row since Scotland's Bob Ferguson did it in 1890-91-92, and then the Open was a much less testing 36-hole affair.

Mike Souchak, the ex-football player from Berwick, Pa., was the closest American to the flying Aussie. Big Mike posted 294, eight strokes back, and finished in a tie for seventh place with Antonio Cerda of Argentina.

Frank Stranahan of Toledo, Ohio, who finished second in two British Opens as an amateur, came in ninth with 296.

He completely dominated 330 entries from 25 countries from the time qualifying play started Monday on the long, treacherous Hoylake course. He threw his shadow over his tournament as no man has done since Ben Hogan won at Carnoustie in 1953.

Thomson stacked up rounds of 70-70-72-74 for his 286. His poorest round was his last, when he knew he had the title won.

"I was lucky with my draw in this championship," he added. "I know I had the best of the weather. If I had had to play at the same time as Bobby Locke and Mike Souchak yesterday, I would not have won." Locke and Souchak played in a half and a full round on Thursday and Locke was eliminated.

The Australian made his only real mistake of the week at the sixth tee this morning. Bothered by a clicking of a photographer's shutter, he hit his drive out of bounds into an orchard. In spite of incurring a penalty, he managed to get a six.

Van Donck produced a round of 71-74-70-74 for 289. He lost one vital stroke at the 18th green this morning when he still was making a race of it. The Argentine left the flagstick in the hole while putting from 45 feet. The ball, dead on line, hit the stick and bounced back.

De Vicenzo played magnificent golf only to be frustrated by put-ting lapses this morning. He shot 71-70-79-70 for 290.

Back of the top three came Gary Player, a 29-year-old South African, at 291; John Pantan, a Scot, at 292; Enrique Bertolino of Argentina and England's old maestro Henry Cotton, tied at 293 and Souchak and Cerda at 294.

BALDING 17TH
 Al Balding of Toronto shot a 73 in the final 18 holes for a total of 300, good for a 17th place tie with five other players. Balding's other rounds were 70, 81 and 78. The other Canadian in the tournament, Stan Leonard of Vancouver and Lachute, Que., was eliminated Thursday.

Thomson picked up £1,000 first prize money with less than that most Sunday golfers experience.

Erskine Wins Pitchers' Duel With Roberts; Yankees Win

PHILADELPHIA (AP)—Randy Jackson smacked a two-run triple to back up Carl Erskine's neat five-inning Friday night as Brooklyn Dodgers defeated Robin Roberts and Philadelphia Phillies 2-1 before 19,372 at Connie Mack stadium.

Temperatures were in the 60s and the weather was threatening, but both pitchers remained warm enough to give up only five hits apiece. Jackson's clout provided the winning margin for Erskine, who gained his sixth victory.

Roberts was saddled with his 10th defeat against eight wins.

Woods Fails In Lake Try
 YOUNGSTOWN, N.Y. (CP)—Jim Woods, Lake Ontario's first 1956 challenger, failed Friday night in an attempt to swim the 32 miles from Youngstown to Toronto. He was beaten by cramps.

The 40-year-old swim veteran from Asheville, N.C., was taken out of the cold water after he had covered about 12 miles. The time was 9:55 p.m. EDT, six hours and 48 minutes after he plunged into the water.

CHICAGO (AP)—Southpaw Jack Harsman shut out Detroit on seven hits Friday night and belted out a three-run homer in pitching Chicago White Sox to a 14-0 triumph over the Tigers.

WASHINGTON (AP)—Bob Turley fast-balled New York Yankees to an 8-4 victory over Washington Friday night, gaining the American League leaders their 50th triumph of the season. Turley had to be rescued in the ninth after a spell of wildness but earned his fourth win against two defeats.

The Yankees, with injured Mickey Mantle sitting dejected on the bench, pounded two Washington pitchers for 11 hits and capitalized on some shoddy fielding to run up their margin.

Rain Halts Tennis Play At Quebec
 QUEBEC (CP)—The best match so far in the Eastern Canada tennis championships—a quarter-final contest between Lawrence Barclay of Vancouver and Val Harit of Montreal—was halted by rain in the fifth set Friday.

Harit had battled back from the edge of elimination to square the match, but was trailing one game to none in the final set when the rains came.

Barclay, a short, determined player, took the first two sets 6-4 and 6-3 before Harit took charge and won the next two 6-4, 6-4. The match will be picked up today with Barclay leading the fifth set 1-0.

Phillies Recall Duane Pilette
 PHILADELPHIA (AP)—The Philadelphia Phillies Friday recalled righthander Duane Pilette from Miami in the International League and optioned righthander Jim Owens to the same club.

Pilette worked in nine innings without decision for the Phillies this year before going to Miami. Owens, the International League rookie of 1954 at Syracuse, has a 1956 record of 8-4 with the Phils.

BEATS ROSEWALL Hoad Captures Wimbledon Title

LONDON (REUTERS)—Law Hoad of Australia Friday won the Wimbledon men's singles title, the most honored prize in amateur lawn tennis, with a splendid exhibition of power play to overcome his friend and doubles partner Ken Rosewall 6-2, 4-6, 7-5, 6-4.

It was the first all-Australian final in 37 years.

The 21-year-old Hoad thus became the youngest holder of the title since the Second World War and confirmed his ranking as the world's No. 1 amateur.

But 21-year-old Rosewall, who finished runnerup for the second time in three years, fought magnificently in a great match of thrust, sound defence and counter-thrust which lasted nearly two hours.

CHANCE FOR SWEET
 Hoad, who earlier this year won the Australian and French titles, now has a great chance in the United States championships next month to match the unique feat of American Don Budge who won the world's four major titles in 1938.

Friday's match had all the drama of warring fortunes between a man of hammer blows and a stroke artist. It ended in victory for power.

Hoad triumphantly battled through seven rounds of the toughest of all tennis tournaments. His features, which had remained impassive throughout the long duel, broke into a wide grin as he advanced to the net to receive Rosewall's congratulations.

Hoad and Rosewall later joined forces to defeat Art Larsen, Stan Leandro, Calif., and Bob Howe, Australia, 4-6, 6-2, 7-5, 6-3 and advanced to the finals.

BREWER EQUALS RECORD

Brewer And Mayer Tied For Lead After 36 Holes

 POINTE CLAIRE, Que. (CP)—Gay Brewer, 24-year-old newcomer to the pro golf circuit from Cincinnati, fired a course-equaling 65 Friday to pull into a tie at 135 with durable Dick Mayer of St. Petersburg, Fla., for leadership at the halfway mark of the Canadian Open golf championship.

The second round of the chase for 15,000 prize money, with Brewer eligible for the first time for a share of it, turned out to be a day of swiftly changing leads while the field struggled through rain showers in cool weather.

BEACONSFIELD COURSE
 Brewer's 65 equalled the record that has stood for 10 years and was tied in Thursday's first round by Bo Winger of Odessa, Texas. Winger took a par 72 Friday and dropped back two strokes off the leader into a 137 tie with Mike Fetschik of Mahopac, N.Y.

One stroke behind Brewer and Mayer, at 136, were Dow Finsterwald of Bedford Heights, Ohio, and Doug Swisher, 22-year-old amateur from Miami Beach, Fla. Finsterwald shot a three-under-par 69 Friday and Sanders, former national U.S. Junior champion, fired a 67.

At 138 were Marty Furgol of Lemont, Ill., with a second-round 70, and Bill Casper, Jr., of Mahopac, N.Y., who shot a 67.

KAY LOW CANADIAN
 Jack Kay, pro at the Montreal Mount Bruno Club, shot a 68 Friday to become low Canadian with 138 after two rounds. In the same bracket were Bill Casper, Jr., of Chula Vista, Calif., Bob Roubing of San Francisco, and Freddie Hawkins of El Paso.

Brewer became the sensation of the day and the galleries started to slog through the rain to catch a glimpse of him when he learned he was six under par several hours before the start.

Mayer was in the threesome up front, going steadily about his second sub-par round. Winger had finished earlier with his 137 and Finsterwald and Sanders had come along to clip a stroke off the Texan's lead.

Brewer's putting was remarkable on the rain-soaked greens. After three birdies and two pars on the first nine he played a No. 4 iron at the long sixth with his second shot and ran down a 20-foot putt for his eighth birdie.

Starting the back nine he birdied the 10th and went par at the short 15th where he sank a birdie putt.

He stalled momentarily at the 16th, where a par ultimately would have given him the lead alone. He took a par at the 17th and birdied the 18th. His nine were 31-34 against Beaconsfield's par of 36-36.

Mayer went over par once on each nine and he, too, missed a chance on the home stretch to take the lead for himself. After a one-under-par 35 for the first nine he hit for birdies at the 10th, 11th and 14th. At the par-three 17th he put his tee shot into a trap, blasted out past the pin and missed his putt, but he finished off his round at the 18th with a birdie for 100.

There were a few non-starters and withdrawals Friday from the first-round 136 finishers. Scores of 154 and better for the two rounds qualified for today's third round. An even 100 players were left.

Winger ran into putting difficulties early in his round. He mixed pars with birdies and over-par play through both nines and was far off the confident form he showed Thursday.

Finsterwald, working on a first-round 67, took a par 36 going out.

He birdied the 12th, lost a stroke to par at the 13th and finished out the round with three birdies in the remaining five holes.

Sanders was out in 35 and tossed in three birdies on the back nine where he never deviated from par. Like Brewer, he is a former U.S. national junior champion, having won the title in 1940. He has played in half a dozen open tournaments.

Brewer joined the pro circuit this year and has just served his six-month probationary period. He is eligible to collect prize money for the first time in the current Canadian Open.

Canada's Entry Earns Right To Enter Wyford Cup Finals

HENLEY-ON-THAMES, Eng. (CP)—Canada's entry in the Royal Henley regatta, after starting in elimination heats, has earned the right to enter today's finals in Wyford Challenge Cup competition.

The four-man crew from Brockville, Ont. came precariously close to disaster in Friday's semi-finals when choppy water caused it to veer near log booms which line the .8-mile, 850-yard course.

The bumpy Canadians took a slight lead at the start but ran into trouble several times, ending within 100 yards of the finish were wobbling near the booms. But they held their shell firm to defeat a Thames Rowing Club four by 1 1/4 lengths.

The Brockville crew will race a Royal Engineers four today for the right to carry home the Wyford Cup, one of 10 prizes awarded annually in Henley competition.
