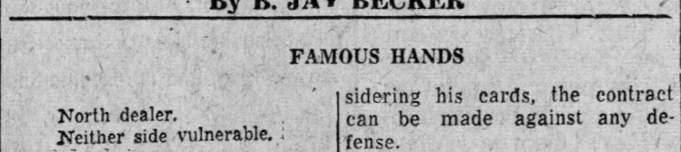

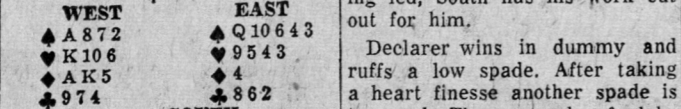

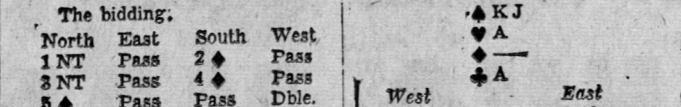

Opening lead—king of diamonds.

This hand was played in the annual Intercollegiate Bridge Tournament in 1949. In comparatively few cases was a final contract of five diamonds reached, the usual contract being three no trump or a part score in diamonds.

The no trump game contract can be defeated by careful defense, but the chief interest in the hand lies in the play at a contract of five diamonds. The bidding sequence shown is hypothetical, the purpose being to reach the eleven trick contract.

Assuming a reverberating double of five diamonds by West, not a surprising action at all, considering his cards, the contract can be made against any defense.

If West does not open a trump it becomes relatively easy to make eleven tricks. But with the king, ace, and another trump being led, South has his work cut out for him.

Declarer wins in dummy and ruffs a low spade. After taking a heart finesse another spade is trumped. Three rounds of clubs are then taken, bringing about this position:

U. S. Gov't Proposes Subsidies For Copper, Lead And Zinc

WASHINGTON (AP)—The Eisenhower administration Monday proposed federal subsidies for domestic producers of copper, lead, zinc, acid-grade fluorspar and tungsten.

Interior Secretary Fred Seaton told a Senate interior mining subcommittee President Eisenhower has endorsed the stabilization payment plan for depressed mining industries. He said proposed legislation to carry out the five-year plan will be sent to Congress soon.

Domestic lead and zinc producers have been calling for higher tariffs on imports, and the U.S. tariff commission last week recommended that duties be increased. Canada exports some 25 per cent of her lead production and 68 per cent of her zinc production to the U.S.

The payment program would cost \$161,090,000 the first year, Seaton estimated. Under the plan the government would pay producers the differences between the domestic market price and a stabilization price specified for each mineral.

WELCOME NEWS
Candaian sources here welcomed the Seaton announcement as an indication that the Eisenhower administration is considering alternative methods to high tariffs as a means of assisting U.S. industry.

However, they said the value of subsidies versus high tariffs would depend on a study of the seize of the payments proposed, and the rate of U.S. consumption of the metals over the next five years. If the subsidies were too high, they could produce a glut of domestically-produced metals which would freeze out imports and be worse than a moderate tariff increase.

Seaton told the senate interior mining subcommittee, called to develop a long-range mineral program for the U.S., that there will be annual limitations on the proposed payments.

Under the plan, the government would pay producers the difference between the domestic market price and a stabilization price to be established for each of the five metals.

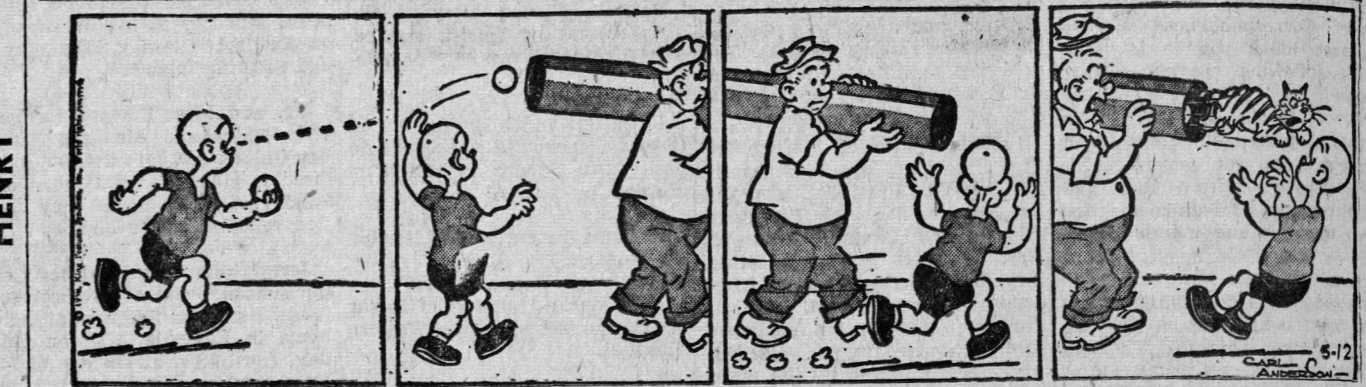
