Ireland Goes All Out After Increase In Canadian Trade

By ROBERT RICE Canadian Press Staff Writer MONTREAL (CP) — The Emerald Isle is trying hard in Canada for a new shade of green—Canadian dollars.

The feeling is that Irish goods—linen, chocolates, footwear, wool, knitwear, glassware and even Irish-made cars—have got a foothold in the North American market. The need now, say Irish trade officials here, is to turn the silver tongue of the Old Sod to promoting the products.

In the latest survey of Ireland-Canadian trade, the Irish export promotion board six exports jumped in the 12-month period to March 31 to \$2,346,000 from \$1,255,900. In terms of international trade, that isn't much. But for tiny Ireland—so small they give its area in acres, 17,000,000 acres—the gain is exciting.

FEWER LEAVE HOME—For the 2,900,000 population—living on an island that would fit 25 times into Quebec province—the export gain means more work at home, less unemployment, and fewer Irishmen going abroad for jobs. The majority—almost 40 per cent—still works on farms, but factory skills are being developed.

Ireland is sitting on the outside looking in at the Commonwealth economic trade talks under way in Montreal. Aloo and alone in its relationship with the United Kingdom and the Commonwealth, the little island nevertheless shares benefits of the Commonwealth preferential tariffs.

Ireland has no role in establishing the Commonwealth rates, and therefore is not participating in the current 11-nation conference, which continues to Sept. 26.

HAPPY WITH TRADE "Sure we're happy with the increase in trade," said an Irish export spokesman in Montreal, where a trade office is maintained. "And you can be sure we're going to go even harder ourselves for a greater increase."

The 1957-58 year set a record for Irish exports, reaching \$363,300,000—a higher level than for any previous comparable period. A spectacular increase—to almost \$1,000,000 from less than \$200,000—was shown in confectionary and chocolate sales in Canada and the U.S.
