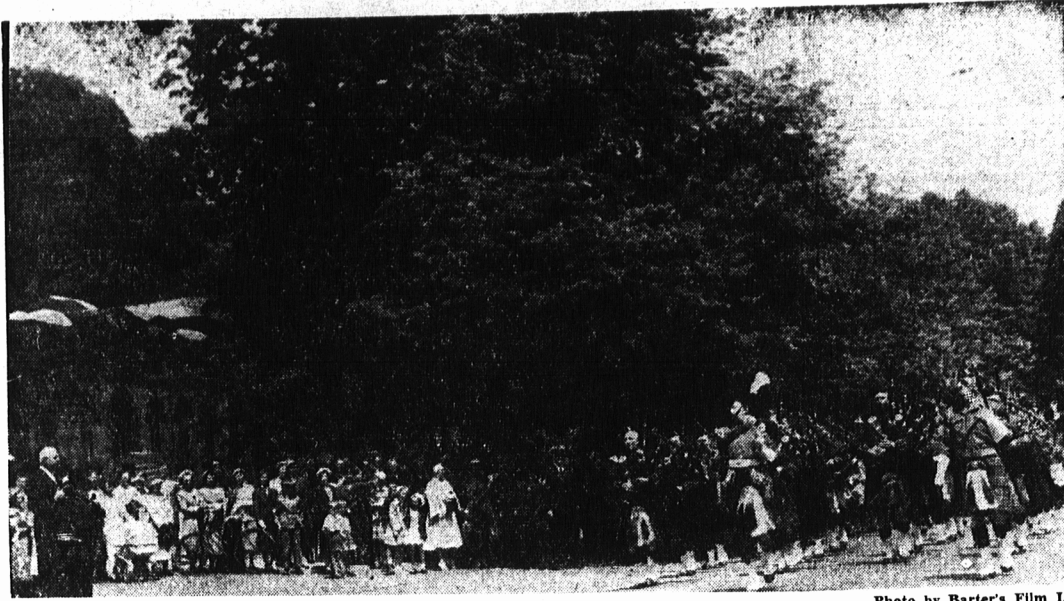

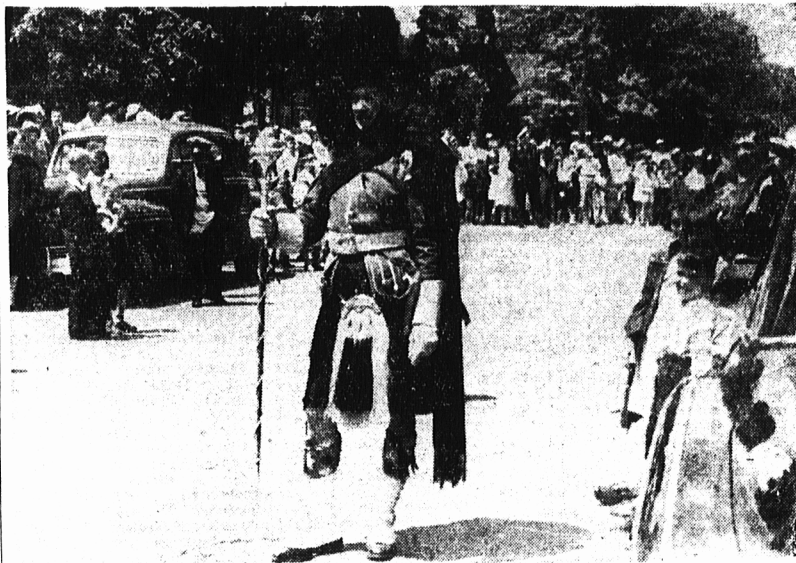

Big Winner In Jaycee Raffle

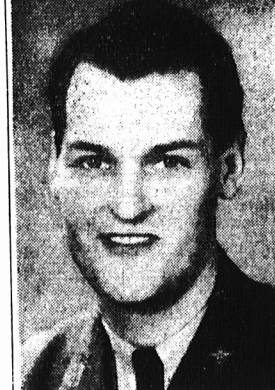
