A new Cricket and Athletic Grounds have been opened in St. John.

Apples, Oranges, Lemons, Onions, etc., by Auction, Wednesday, July 23rd, at eleven o'clock, ex Carroll from Boston.

The Scott Act has been carried in the County of Athabaska by a majority of twelve hundred.

Mr. A. J. Dawes, the well-known brewer of Montreal, and family, arrived on the Cuban last evening.

At the Stipendiary Magistrate's Court, this forenoon, Stephen Carroll was fined \$50 and costs for a breach of the Scott Act.

The DesBrisay property, situated on Fitzroy and Easton Streets, comprising two town lots, was sold by William Dodd yesterday.

The United States Secretary of the Treasury has ordered all vessels in the revenue marine service to patrol the coasts of the United States as a precautionary measure against the introduction of cholera and yellow fever.

The receipts of the Canada Pacific railway for the week ending July 14th, was \$153,000 against \$118,000 for the corresponding period last year.

The Dominion Patent Office fees for the twelve months past amount to \$74,250, the largest year yet; 1,341 patents were issued in the six months past, while in 1880 the number of patents granted for the whole year was only 1,252.

The large excursion steamer Empire State ran on the rock off Thatcher's Island, on the 20th inst., staving a hole in her bottom. She was run rapidly to Gloucester, Mass., and the passengers, 1200 in number, sent back to Boston in a special train. The steamer sank at the wharf shortly after arrival.

A LARGE party of members of the British Association, with their wives, daughters and other ladies, left London for Liverpool on the 17th inst., on their way to Canada to attend the annual meeting of the Association, which is to be held at Montreal.

PAUL MORPHY, the great chess player, has died lately, after being for years helplessly insane. His insanity arose chiefly, if not exclusively, from the great mental strain required in what he had at first taken up as an amusement, and latterly turned into a business. To take to chess-playing as a relaxation is just about as absurd as anything well can be.

INFORMATION has been received from close friends of Ben Butler, by B. L. Shively, secretary of the anti-monopolist committee, dispelling all doubts regarding Butler's candidacy for the presidency on the independent ticket, and stating definitely and positively that he will run.

During the month of June there were 167 fires in the United States and Canada, the aggregate loss of which was in the neighborhood of \$5,800,000, while the smaller fires which have escaped notice would probably increase this total by many thousands.

NEARLY twenty mass meetings were held on the 20th inst. in various towns throughout England to denounce the action of the house of lords in regard to the franchise bill.
