Canadian Club Hears Talk On Arab Politics

Western involvement in Arab disputes would be "the greatest fault we could be found guilty of," Brigadier Stephen Longrigg, OBE., Litt, told a Charlottetown audience, speaking at the monthly Canadian Club dinner last night.

The guest speaker, who is now retired, served for a number of years as a government official and later as a member of an Iraq oil company, was in the Middle East about 18 months ago. He has just completed an extensive speaking tour in the United States and from Vancouver to Charlottetown in Canada.

Taking as his subject, "Oil, Power Politics and the Arab Awakening," Brigadier Longrigg said he did not think the Arab nations would ever accept a position of subservience to Russia. "They will not be interfered with," he said, "because their real devotion is to themselves."

He felt that Russian attempts to penetrate the Middle East would not succeed in establishing a dominant position. "Although the Arabs are prepared to accept support from the Communists, as in Iraq,"

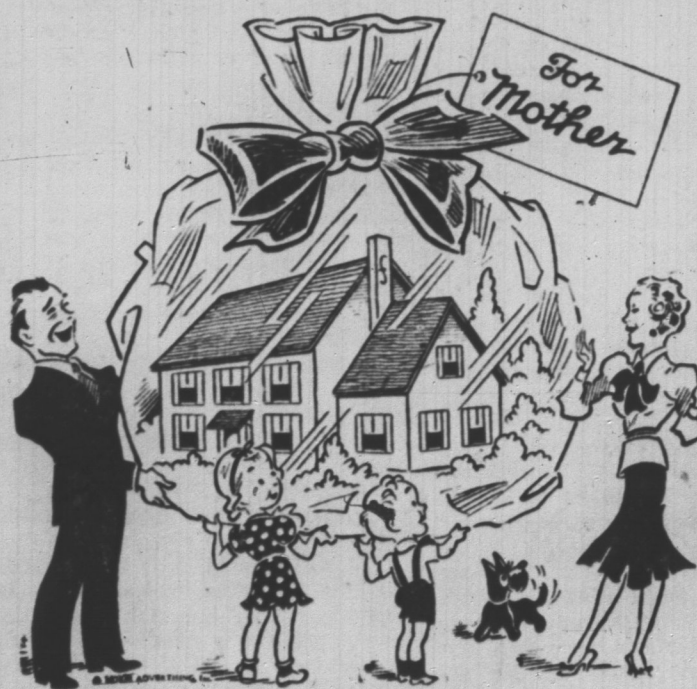

SUPREME COURT SITS
Appeals Heard At Georgetown

MONTAGUE BUREAU OF THE GUARDIAN
The Kings County Supreme Court for the hearing of summary conviction appeals continued in Georgetown on Wednesday, with Justice Mark R. MacGuigan presiding.

The first case was that of the Queen as respondent represented by J.B. Johnston vs. Lester B. Leco as appellant represented by J.O.C. Campbell, Q.C. was adjourned to July 6th at Charlottetown.

This appeal is from a conviction by Stipendiary Magistrate under the Excise Act in which the appellant was sentenced to six months in jail and ordered to pay a fine of 500 or in default, to serve a further six months.

The next case was that of the Queen respondent represented by Ian M. MacLeod and Louis R. Porter, appellant, represented by J.O.C. Campbell. This was an appeal from the Magistrate's Court where the appellant was sentenced to serve 30 days in jail on a charge of causing a disturbance by being drunk. At Wednesday's proceedings, the appellant pleaded guilty and was fined \$25 and costs or 10 days.

The case of the Queen, respondent, represented by Ian M. MacLeod vs. George H. Higginbotham, appellant, represented by J.O.C. Campbell, was also an appeal from the 30 day jail sentence for causing a disturbance and for being drunk. The appellant pleaded guilty and was fined \$25 and costs or 10 days.

Three appeals were disposed of, in all three the Queen was respondent and was represented by Ian M. MacLeod.

The three appellants were George H. Higginbotham, Louis R. Porter, and "Buddy" John Osborne, all represented by J.O.C. Campbell. All three appeals were from convictions in the lower court and sentences of 60 days in jail in each case, for escaping the lawful custody of a peace officer.

Mr. Campbell moved leave to appeal be granted in each case, then withdrew his appeal and asked for modification of the sentence of the court below to a reasonable fine.

Each appellant was fined \$25 and cost or 10 days in default.

Mrs. Boudreault Dies In Hospital

Left to mourn her passing are her husband, Fabian Boudreault of Georgetown; three sons, Peter of Panmure Island; Walter of Georgetown and Edgar of Montreal and three daughters: Eva (Mrs. John Wallace) of George-Martell of Georgetown and Emily, (Mrs. George McQuillan) also of Georgetown; also two brothers, Joseph Gallant and Jerome Gallant, both of Oyster Bed Bridge and two sisters: Barbara of Oyster Bed Bridge and Veronica (Mrs. Alec Gallant) of St. Charles.

The funeral was held from St. James Roman Catholic Church, Georgetown, with Rev. O. Kiggins celebrating Requiem Mass.

The pallbearers were: Henry Sampson, George White, Wilfred McQuillan, Edward Easton, Michael Burke, Sr., and Edwin MacDonald.

Interment was in St. James Church cemetery.
