HALIFAX (CP) — The Halifax weather office says a high pressure area centred over Northern New Brunswick and moving southeastward is causing clear skies in most sections of the Maritimes. Temperatures dropped below the zero mark at almost all localities Tuesday night. Yarmouth, N.S., reported four below zero, the lowest temperature ever recorded on Jan. 15.

When the high moves to the east of the district early today, winds will shift to southeasterly, giving somewhat milder weather along with some snowflurries. However, another surge of extremely cold air will push the mercury back down Thursday and is likely to last until the weekend.

Dr. Helen Abell Will Speak At Two Meetings In The City

Dr. Helen Abell of the Department of Agriculture, Ottawa, arrives in Charlottetown this evening. She will be guest speaker at the University Women's Club Wednesday evening and will address the Prince Edward Island Home Economics Association Friday evening.

Helen Caroline Abell was born January 28, 1917 in Medicine Hat, Alberta but grew up in Ontario where the family moved the same year.

She attended elementary and high school in Toronto. She graduated from the two year associate course at Macdonald Institute, Guelph in 1938 receiving the Jean Bradley Memorial Scholarship for leadership, character and scholastic ability. She served as class president during her senior year. The Bachelor of Household Science (Specialist) degree was received from the University of Toronto in 1941. Training as a student dietitian at Western Sanitarium was taken during 1940.

Three summers were spent in hotel work. Two of these in charge of the staff of a summer hotel.

She was employed at the beginning and just after World War II for approximately two years as a Nutrition Specialist with the Women's Institute Branch of the Ontario Department of Agriculture (Continued on page 13)

Evidence Concluded In Supreme Court Hearing

Edward Matthews, on trial in Supreme Court on two counts of criminal negligence in connection with the death of Joseph Frederick Steele, collapsed shortly after his first defence witness, yesterday and later, after the noon recess, failed to appear voluntarily for the sitting.

The counsel for the defense, J.A. MacDonald, Q.C., had just commenced to question the accused when he fell heavily to the floor beside the witness box.

The incident occurred shortly after noon and presiding Justice Mark R. MacGuigan because of the circumstances, recessed the court until 2:30 p.m. C.A. Coady was called and on examination of the witness indicated that he was fit both physically and mentally to proceed giving evidence.

When the court reconvened at 2:30, the defendant was not present in the court and was reported by his lawyer as being at the home of one of the key Crown witnesses, Mrs. Hilda Marshall, who as indicated by evidence, is a personal friend of the defendant's Justice MacGuigan advised the Crown to issue a warrant as quickly as possible and have the sheriff bring the prisoner to court. The reason given by the defense counsel for the non-appearance of the accused was that he was suffering head pains. The prisoner was returned to court within a half hour and hearing of the evidence of both sides of the case was completed.
