Quit Kicking, Gardiner Tells Junior Members In Redistribution Debate

OTTAWA, July 1—(CP)—Agriculture Minister Gardiner, recalling experiences during 38 years in politics, today advised members of the Commons that they will not get anywhere by "kicking" about what has been done to the boundaries of their constituencies.

The 60-year-old former Premier of Saskatchewan spoke during continued debate on a bill reshaping the boundaries of Federal constituencies in line with population shifts recorded in the 1951 census. The bill increases membership in the Commons to 265 from 262 and changes the boundaries of 125 constituencies.

Never Complained — Mr. Gardiner said June 25 marked the 38th anniversary of his entry into politics. In all that time "I have never once complained about how my constituency was drawn up, no matter who drew it up." He had won despite Opposition efforts to defeat him.

"I say that in order to give a little advice to young members of the House," said Mr. Gardiner. "I do not think you get anywhere kicking about the seat you have got."

Mr. Gardiner made clear that many of his remarks were directed at John Diefenbaker (PC—Lake Centre) whose Saskatchewan constituency is being extended to take in Liberal and C.C.F. territory.

Mr. Diefenbaker complained that the redistribution committee, made up of a majority of Liberal members, had removed Conservative voters from his riding and replaced them with Liberal and C.C.F. supporters.

George Nowlan (PC—Annapolis-Kings) termed as "unfair" a proposal to make his riding the largest rural constituency of Nova Scotia. Resources Minister Winters who represents the neighboring constituency of Lunenburg, said that Nova Scotia is losing one seat and is returning to the boundaries fixed by a Conservative government in 1933.

J.M. Macdonnell (PC—Toronto Greenwood) made a new appeal for an independent commission to handle the redistribution of seats in the Commons. There was no indication of an early end of the debate, now in its third day. The redistribution bill and the estimates of a few departments must be passed before the session can adjourn.

Before starting to work on the extraordinary Dominion Day sitting, members stood and sang "O Canada" and "God Save The Queen." They adjourned later for four hours to attend a garden party at Rideau Hall, home of the Governor-General, Rt. Hon. Vincent Massey.

Communist comment may be forthcoming at today's top-level meeting at Panmunjom at 11 a. m. (10 p. m. EDT, Tuesday). The Communists Tuesday clung to their demand for forced repatriation of prisoners but made no direct reply to the Allied proposal.

MUNSAN, Korea, July 2—(Wednesday)—(AP)—Communist truce negotiators today asked for a surprise one-day postponement of the Korean armistice talks. The United Nations command agreed.
