taining all your favourite flowers, where you can spend many of the summer hours.

Every dollar invested in good nursery stock will increase the value of a property at least six times the cost of the trees and plants you purchase, and bring an added intangible value to your home life that cannot be measured in mere dollars and cents.

There is no experience productive of greater, more whole hearted pleasure than that of exhibiting a well-planned and well-cared-for garden to your friends, when they have occasion to visit you during the spring and summer months. Alas! I have shown my garden many times when there was nothing in it of which to be very proud, but it is impossible to have a perfect garden from May to November in the very same spot, and usually the garden visitor was an understanding person.

Your garden represents an entirely original creation, that has sprung into healthful maturity under the sole guidance of your own knowledge and original ideas. Who does not love "An old fashioned flower garden" that gives a riot of color, profusion of bloom, and cut flowers from April to late fall, and general brightness in the yard. Every woman yearns for the pleasure of going into her own backyard and picking a bouquet to brighten the interior of her home.

A perennial bed of flowers is one of the simplest forms of planting, and plans are given in these booklets for the planting of these perennials. The varieties of perennials needed are given and the arrangement of them in the border for the best effect.

As I write I can see the perennials growing into large clumps of green in the April showers and there is some color from the daffodils and very soon the blue forget-me-not will be showing its lovely blue that lasts for weeks.

Nepeta was fragrant last week and is now a trimmied mound of green. This task is always left until spring so that the old leaves will act as a protection for the winter months. Pansies are blooming and more seed of violas will be sown one of these days.

Showing my colored garden slides the other week to a group of bright young people I was pleased when one said "I like the way your garden looks because there is not any cover of soil showing. It is all covered with flowers." That was a nice compliment, and shows the value of a ground cover, such as pansies, violas, forget-me-nots, arabis, aubretia nepeta and all these low growing plants.

Many rhododendrons have been planted on this island since the Cotton Memorial Nursery has been established, and the one in the garden here has wintered for two seasons. The richness of color is the theme of rhododendrons and the hybrids with their showy flower clusters make a lively display above their rich and luxuriant foliage, rivaling the roses. Indeed, the color range of these plants is even greater. Moreover, their character and branching habit, and their appearance in the landscape either formal or naturalistic, is such as to make them superior shrubs and small trees at any season of the year.

Despite the fact that many unadapted to northern gardens among their 90-odd species are there are still plenty of gorgeous kinds available to growers in the

**\$2,877,708 Contributed To European Flood Relief**

Ottawa, April 28th—Individually and through their governments, Canadians have contributed \$2,877,708 to the Canadian National European Flood Relief Fund for relief and rehabilitation in the flood-damaged areas of England, Holland and Belgium, it was announced today from Government House.

More than \$1,000,000 worth of relief and rehabilitation supplies have been shipped or are en route to the flood-damaged areas, and additional supplies will be provided as they are needed.

His Excellency the Governor-General, the Right Hon. Vincent Massey, who is chairman of the Relief Fund Committee, expressed extreme gratification at the generous response of his fellow-Canadians to the appeal to help the thousands of victims of the disaster which struck from the North Sea on February 1st. He also extended thanks to the Canadian Red Cross Society for its invaluable services, to Dr. W. S. Stanbury, the National Commissioner of the Red Cross Society, to Mr. Charles La Perle, the Honorary Secretary of the Committee, to colder regions. The true rhododendrons are thick-leaved evergreen shrubs while the azaleas are deciduous, or thin-leaved and in this way we can decide on the sorts growable in the colder regions of America.

In the gardens of the Peace Palace at The Hague, Holland, the hybrid rhododendrons are used within strictly clipped yew hedges surrounding a series of square, architectural beds and they are very beautiful used in this way.

Reading in "Flowering Plants and Ferns of Prince Edward Island," written by Blithe Hurst, we find that there is one, Rhododendron Canadense, listed and not far from this garden, there is a wonderful acre or two of rosy purple bloom in early spring.

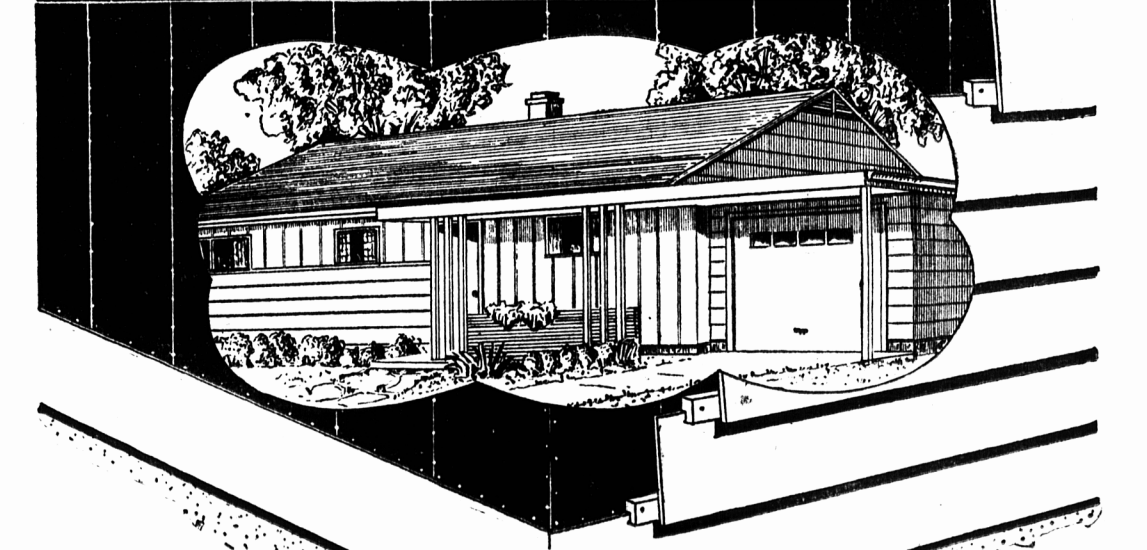
