**SUPREME COURT.**  
WEDNESDAY, Jan. 17.

The Manufacturers Insurance Company vs. George Dixon.—This case began on Tuesday, and was not concluded until this afternoon, when a verdict in favor of the defendant was returned. Motion for the plaintiff's Attorney-General Peters and H. C. McDonald for the defendant.

The evidence in the case against Donald McKinnon was all in when the Court adjourned at one o'clock today. After recess the counsel on both sides and the Judge addressed the jury.

Quite a sensation was created this forenoon when Judge Hodgson brought to the notice of the court the fact that he had received a letter from a Miss Clara L'Hevehinen, the complainant in a suit against Dr. George Warburton, now pending in the course of which she asked that the Judge use his influence in her favor in the suit. The Judge handed the letter to the Attorney-General to take such action as he deemed advisable. Subsequently Mr. Blanchard, counsel for Miss L'Hevehinen, brought her into court, and she made ample apology. Judge Healey reminded Miss L'Hevehinen that she had made a similar application to him personally, and he had told her she would be likely to get into trouble if she persisted in such conduct.
