

Grave Photos Are Suggested Without Cost

OTTAWA (CP)—Parents may be able to get photos of the grave of their war dead without charge.

Jack McIntosh (PC—Swift Current-Maple Creek) has urged in the Commons that the photos be supplied without cost, and with the gratitude of the Canadian people.

He noted that parents who request photos now have their request referred to the Commonwealth War Graves Commission and are charged 75 cents a photo.

Bandits Shatter Old Man's Dream

MONTREAL (CP)—The old man nursed a great dream but bandits apparently shattered it when they made off with his life savings.

Long Wong, 74, had saved \$3,450 over the years in Montreal to pay for a trip that would have reunited him with his wife and family after 38 years.

The family lives in the British colony of Hong Kong on the coast of his native China. Wong had last seen them there six years after he first left for Canada in 1921.

Over the years he has worked in Montreal as a laundryman, slowly saving enough money for a return journey to Hong Kong.

Last summer, Long Wong became ill and he decided to keep at home the travel money he had been accumulating in a local bank.

He was at home Monday when he was turned up at the house he shares with another man.

They identified themselves as employees of a public utility. Once inside, they slugged Wong and took the savings as well as the old man's television set and a watch.

Job Figures Said Better

OTTAWA (CP)—Labor Minister MacEachen said Tuesday Canada's employment figures are better than they have been for years, despite a January upswing in unemployment.

But he drew protests from opposition members when he postponed answers to questions about employment problems on Cape Breton Island.

Mr. MacEachen said it was incorrect to refer to the unemployed as numbering 500,000. The number unemployed in January was 408,000—50,000 fewer than a year earlier. Employment was up 211,000 from January, 1964. All regions showed improvement.

He also said that December's figure of four per cent of the working force unemployed was the lowest since 1957.

Donald MacInnis (PC—Cape Breton South) asked how many jobs the government had found for several hundred workers left without work when the government closed the Point Edward naval base in Cape Breton.

Mr. MacEachen said he would make a statement later. It was too detailed a question to deal with in the daily question period.

Mr. MacInnis pounded his desk, complaining that he and other opposition members can't get replies to their detailed questions and that government members set up a hubbub whenever they ask.

Winter Ore Shipments Made From Sept Iles

SEPTILES, Que. (CP)—Iron ore of Canada has made winter shipments this season for the first time since it began operations in 1964.

Company sources said Wednesday 500,000 tons of pelletized iron ore were shipped from this port 330 miles northeast of Quebec City in January, and another 100,000 tons in February.

In previous years, shipping stopped during the four winter months but company sources said there will be no obstacle from now on in normal winters.

The principal obstacle was humidity that caused the ore to freeze during shipment by train from Labrador City to this port.

A new process of treating the ore at high temperatures has overcome this obstacle. Iron ore of Canada began its pelletizing process in 1963 and last year shipped a record 14,000,000 tons of concentrate, 5,000,000 tons in the form of pellets.

No Date Fixed In Minerals Case

OTTAWA (CP)—No date has been fixed for a request to the Supreme Court of Canada to determine legal jurisdiction over off-shore minerals. Prime Minister Pearson said Monday in the Commons.

Mr. Pearson said the justice department is preparing the documents for such a reference and they will be sent to the provincial premiers when ready.

He said the federal government is anxious that the question be settled as soon as possible.
