Makes Plea For Island Of Malta

Canadian Press Staff Writer LONDON (CP)—Mabel Strickland, forthright leader of Malta's Progressive Constitutional party, says it is time Britain explained how her defence cuts will affect the George Cross island.

If employment on the island is hard hit by reductions in British military expenditure, Miss Strickland told a London press conference, it will mean complete economic collapse, perhaps starvation.

The only remedy would be to reduce the population by 100,000—about one third—by emigration to Commonwealth countries. In this connection, Miss Strickland issued a shaft at Canada.

CANUCKS CRITICIZED

Canada, she said, has yet to understand Malta—she doesn't help to any extent. There now are about 3,400 Maltese in Canada, and Canada doesn't encourage Maltese to immigrate.

Malta's problem is not a constitutional one but an economic one, said Miss Strickland, since the island will always be dependent on someone. Therefore, added the 57-year-old Empire Loyalist, the word "equivalence" with Britain, suggested by Malta's present Labor party leader, Dom Mintoff, is "downright silly." And "independence would mean starvation."

Miss Strickland is a director of the Times of Malta, founded by her late father, a former prime minister of Malta, Sir Gerald Strickland.

As chief spokesman for the Progressive Constitutional party, which has no official recognition because it isn't in the assembly, Miss Strickland is keen to retain links with the Commonwealth.

The Labor party's immediate opposition is the Nationalist party, led by Dr. George Borg-Olivier.

Miss Strickland, a grey-haired, comfortably-built woman, told the conference Britain is keeping everyone in the dark about its future defence intentions and there is an urgent need for a declaration of policy.
