DOMINION PARLIAMENT

Opening of the Session.
A BRILLIANT SCENE

Speech from the Vice-Royal Throne.
Good Wholesome Bill of Fare.

OTTAWA, Feb. 24.
His Excellency, the Governor-General, came down to the Senate Chamber—which was crowded with the wealth and beauty of the country—at 3 o'clock this afternoon, and the Commons being in attendance, delivered the following

SPEECH:
Honorable Gentlemen of the Senate:
Gentlemen of the House of Commons:
On meeting you again, I have the pleasing duty to perform of congratulating you on the sufficient harvest of last year, and on the prosperous condition and substantial progress of the country.

Since the suppression of the insurrection in the Northwest Territory, peace and order have been restored, and are now prevailing. After so serious an outbreak, some disquiet and apprehension of the recurrence of these disorders may naturally be expected to linger, and it will be the duty of my government to make such precautionary arrangements as will assure the present as well as intending settlers of efficient protection against all disturbances.

I heartily congratulate you on the practical completion of the Canadian Pacific Railway, and on the announcement that it will be open for the daily carriage of passengers and freight from ocean to ocean, the mouth of June next.

Should the negotiations between Her Majesty's Government and that of the United States for the appointment of a joint commission to adjust what is known as the fishery question and to consider the best means of developing our international commerce, fail to secure any satisfactory results, you will be asked to make provision for the protection of our in-shore fisheries by the extension of our present system of marine police.
