ENTERPRISE EXTRAORDINARY.—The Patriot is to be congratulated on the wonderful spirit of enterprise which has marked its career since the distinguished change in its management last winter. But all along, there has been one drawback noticeable, and that is, the somewhat antiquated character of the telegrams filling up the telegraphic column. On Saturday last, however, a departure was made from the well worn groove, in which it seemed destined to run forever, and to our surprise and astonishment, we find a telegram from Ottawa only two days old. Incredible and astounding as this may appear, still the nature of the telegram is even more astounding. It deliberately states, that "Mr. Justice Fournier of the Exchequer Court of Canada, will shortly deliver judgment in the case of the Queen vs. Three Casks of Alcohol recently tried at Yarmouth, N. S." Every one who has had any acquaintance with Mr. Justice Fournier, must readily admit that His Lordship is not only a scholar, but also a gentleman, and now the Patriot seems determined to make him a good judge of whiskey as well.

The Patriot having tried in vain by gubbing his election card to exonerate Mr. Davies, proved the charge of promise-breaking in regard to the Fishery Award, endeavors now to direct attention from the subject by personal abuse of the Hon. Ferguson. Even if Mr. Ferguson should aspire "at some future time" to represent Queen's County in the House of Commons, of which he has given no sign, we fail to see how that acquits Mr. Davies of violating his promise with respect to the Fishery Award. Even if Mr. Ferguson did secure a seat in the House of Assembly by appointing Mr. L. H. Davies's Government which, if so, was no doubt very wicked in which, we do not understand how Mr. Ferguson's conduct in 1878, can exculpate Mr. Davies for opposing a refund of \$30,000.00 to our merchants in 1883. Even Mr. Ferguson is in "bad odor" with the people and Mr. D. Laird is universally beloved, (all of which the Patriot has no doubt learned from the result of the elections of 1882) we cannot admit that in these accounts Mr. L. H. Davies should escape from just criticism in regard to his parliamentary actions. THE EXAMINER has a plain duty to perform in the interests of the people, and it is not going to turn to the right hand or the left until that duty is discharged. The Grit representative for Queen's County obtained his seat by denouncing the inaction of his predecessors in regard to our share of the Fishery Award, and by promising to prevent our case to the Commons as it had never been done before. He has not fulfilled that promise. His injustice to our late representatives, as well as his promise breaking, demand exposure from an independent press.

The Howell Case begin to-morrow.

SUMMERSIDE JUNE 18. The Chief Justice charged the jury in the O'Connor vs. McDermid case to-day. From present appearance this case will not probably be finished before evening. A TERRIBLE ACCIDENT! One Hundred and Seventy-Eight Children CRUSHED TO DEATH.

LONDON, June 17. A panic occurred at a conjurer's performance, held at Victor's Hall, Sunderland. How it originated is not yet known; but over one hundred and seventy-eight children, from four to fourteen years old, who were attending the performance, were trampled to death in the crush that ensued. The only exit from the building was a narrow staircase, and it was there the unfortunate little ones met their sad fate.

They were regarded as one of the most reliable firms in Chicago.
