SPORTS REVIEW 1951

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Lee Windsor of Ashburn, Nova Scotia won the Maritime junior championship. Cecil "Bubby" Dowling won the Maritime pro title. Art MacKenzie won the Charlottetown Club championship while Don MacDonald won the MacKinnon Cup. At Summerside Derwin Huettis won the men's title and Miss Blanche Hog the ladies crown. Marc Sandow and Cecil "Bubby" Dowling, the professionals at the Charlottetown and Green Gables courses respectively, capably looked after activities at both clubs.

The rink skipped by Frank Acon won the Island Curling championship and represented the Province in the Dominion competitions at Halifax. Other members of the rink were John Squarebriggs, Bill MacNeill and Mel Jenkins.

The Provincial school championships were won by a rink skipped by Doug Cameron of Charlottetown and this rink entered the Dominion championships at Nelson, B. C. where they made an outstanding showing. The other boys on the team were Frank Acon, Jr., Maurice Jenkins and Karl Roadman.

The Regal Flour Trophy was won by the rink skipped by Elmer MacDonald. Another feature of the curling activities was the trip of the flying curlers to Chicago for a week's play.

Rifle Shooting

The outstanding events in the year's rifle shooting was the showing of Lt. Mary MacLennan on Canada's Bisley team last summer. Major G. A. MacDonald was selected at the Ottawa shoot for a place on the Dominion's Bisley team next year.

Major A. F. Gormley had the highest aggregate at the Provincial Rifle Shoot held at Squaw Point in August. The MacKinnon Cup was won by Capt. A. J. McCabe while the City Rifle competition was won by Miss MacLennan.

At the Inter-Maritime shoot held in June, Nova Scotia placed first and Prince Edward Island second with 781 points. A team from the island also made an outstanding showing at the Ottawa meet.

O'Leary Opens Hockey Season With Victory

The O'Leary Maroons opened the hockey season auspiciously in the little town by defeating the Summerside High School Saturday night by the score of 4-3. The winning tally came with only enough time to face-off at centre before the bell which ended the game.

Both teams iced a flock of promising young players, the Maroons in the process of rebuilding after losing some of the veterans who carried them to the Island Intermediate "B" championship last year. The game was exceptionally fast for a season opener, but comparatively clean, only five penalties being handed out by referee Lloyd Silliker. Gay of Summerside got three of these and Harris of O'Leary, two.

Rogerson netted the only tally of the opening frame, taking a pass-out from Bernard. The teams scored a brace apiece in the middle session. "Duck" Darby realizing on an end-to-end solo, and getting another within two minutes on a snap shot from a face-off to the right of the O'Leary cage. At the fourteen minute mark, Percy Boulter evened it up on a smooth three-way passing effort which had Gillis badly out of position when the disk went home. Rogerson got his second of the night taking a long forward rink-wide pass from left-winger Baglole, and beating Gillis with a sharp shot. The period ended with O'Leary in command on a 3-2 count.

Gillis did some brilliant stoppings as the Maroons pressed to open the third frame. Laysh Schurman, converted into a defenceman this year, took a clearing pass from Darby that left the O'Leary forwards stranded in the Sum-HI

zone, and Schurman, long known as a cutesy around the net, had little trouble out-guessing MacNeill for the tying counter. The game remained knotted at 3-all until just before the cease-fire bell when Baglole, perched in front of Gillis took a pass from a face-off to the right of the net, and found the twines for the clincher.

Applications Before C. B. G. Board

OTTAWA, Dec. 28 — (CP) — A series of minor applications will be considered by the nine-member CBC board of governors at meetings here Jan. 17 and 18.

Agenda for the meetings, issued today, show that five stations have applied for permission to make transfers of shares. One has applied for a transfer of licence, and two seek routine emergency transmitter licences. Seeking the share transfers are stations CKOX, Woodstock, Ont.; CKRD, Red Deer, Alta.; CKBW, Bridgewater, N.S.; CJFX, Antigonish, N. S., and CKWX, Vancouver.

Ralph T. Snelgrove, operator of station OKBB at Barrie, Ont., applied to transfer his licence from his name to that of the Barrie Broadcasting Company Limited. Stations CUNB in North Battleford, Sask., and CFYJ in Charlottetown want licences to erect emergency transmitters. Stations operated by the Defence Department at Brochet, Man., and at Yellowknife applied for permission to change their broadcasting channels. Station CFBM at Brochet would move to 1460 on the dial from 1340. Station CFYK at Yellowknife would move from 1450 to 1340.

Two Canadian Soldiers Decorated

OTTAWA, Dec. 28 — (CP) — Two Canadian soldiers, one a private and the other a lieutenant, have received military decorations for displaying superb examples of courage in Korean battle-lines.

Pte. Kenneth F. Barwise, 22, of Vancouver, received the Military Medal, the army announced today, for such courage and bravery that he helped make a success of the gallant stand of the 2nd Battalion, Princess Patricia Light Infantry at Kapnyng.

Lieut. Edward J. Mastronardi, 26, of Toronto, platoon commander with the 2nd Battalion, Royal Canadian Regiment, received the Military Cross for holding back a battalion of Chinese Communists, which threatened the battalion and the Canadian brigade force on the night of Nov. 2 last.

Barwise, who some time ago was returned to Canada on rotation leave, was with a "D" Company platoon, when part of the Patricia's were cut off by the enemy last April. The youthful soldier, who formerly was with the merchant navy and the Seaforth Highlanders of Canada reserve force, led a platoon to clean out a segment of the enemy and ran important missions under enemy sniper fire. His complete disregard for personal safety under fire and bravery, read the citation, inspired his comrades and contributed largely to the successful and gallant stand at Kapnyng by the Patricia's.

From the opening whistle the fireworks got under way with both teams handing out stiff body checks, sending opponents reeling into the boards. Cross checking and elbowing banished a few to the cooling pen, and one match penalty was handed out to Ready of the visiting team. Harsh words led to several melees, one bringing aroused fans to the ice before the fireworks were quelled by the players themselves.

It was ideal hockey for the spectators who saw fast passing plays, stick handling, hard checking and stellar goal performances. Walper, net minder for the locals, was outstanding, particularly when his team were two men short, and the visitors shot rubber at him from all angles. Against a faster team, the locals looked very good, and a return engagement might tell a different story.

Kennedy, Glover and Dalziel led the scoring parade for the visitors, combining on plays for every goal scored during the game, and presenting some real dazzling passing to effect the scores.

For the locals, first-stringers at power and MacLean were the goal-getters, only on a breakthrough by Power which caught the visitors napping in the opponent's zone.

Against such a fast team the locals were called on for their best performance this year, and as the season advances local fans are assured of seeing fast, hockey as they engage with visiting teams from other localities.

NEW YORK, Dec. 30 — (CP) — Halifax Sea Gulls, outstanding pee-wee hockey team in the Maritimes, successfully launched a three-game United States tour today by coming from behind to defeat New York Pee-Wee Rovers team at Madison Square Garden.

The Sea Gulls, who are managed by a woman, Mrs. T. P. Lusby, finished strongly as the Rovers tired in the third period. At one point the New York team led 3-1. The score was 1-1 at the end of the first, 3-2 for New York at the end of the second and the Sea Gulls scored three goals without a reply in the third. All periods were 12 minutes long.

The Sea Gulls, all of whom are 16 and under, meet New Haven Pee-Wees in the Connecticut city tomorrow and play Belmont Hill School Pee-Wees in Boston New Year's Day.

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Hectic Session Of Parliament Closes

OTTAWA, Dec. 30 — (CP) — The hectic, three-month fall session of parliament came quietly to a close Saturday night.

It was prorogued at 6:30 P.M. E. S. T. as Chief Justice Thibaudeau Rinfret, deputy governor-general, read in the senate chamber an 800-word speech from the Throne reviewing the legislation adopted by the commons and the senate.

The formal date for the next session was tentatively set at Feb. 7. A firm date for the 1952 meeting will be announced later by the government.

In contrast to some of the bitter debates which marked the tag-end of the session, the commons finished its business with a harmonious discussion on a measure that everyone approved — that endorsing the entry of Greece and Turkey into the North Atlantic Alliance.

The Speech from the Throne referred briefly to the fact the Canadian troops in Korea are fighting with "valor and distinction," to the gratification of the Canadian people at the King's recovery to health and to the transcendent royal tour of Princess Elizabeth and the Duke of Edinburgh.

It then detailed the legislation adopted during the session, which opened Oct. 9 last.

Some of the major bills included measures providing for universal old-age pensions of \$40 a month, setting up a St. Lawrence seaway authority, authorizing Ontario to
