## Donations Received By Montague Legion

MONTAGUE — The Montague branch of the Royal Canadian Legion was the recipient of \$250 in donations for its recently completed building at the regular monthly meeting held in the Legion Home recently.

A donation of \$50 was accepted by the chairman from Allan Cameron of Caledonia, who has been one of the most enthusiastic supporters of the new home and promised a substantial donation in support of the project at the very beginning.

A spontaneous round of applause greeted the announcement of the donation by vice president Stewart Dewar, who acted as chairman in the absence of president L. H. Martin. Mr. Dewar also expressed the appreciation of branch to the members of the Ladies Auxiliary for their donation of a cheque for \$200 to assist the Legion.

Discussion took place regarding the need for track and field training for the youth of the area and a motion endorsing the sponsorship of this by the Montague Branch was passed unanimously.

**TO FORM COMMITTEE**  
The method of procedure in the promotion of track and field will be left until the composition of a committee in charge is determined. The aim is to have the committee formed before the next meeting so it will have time to organize and have personnel facilities and instruction training available when the track and field season arrives.

A. E. Sullivan, representative of the recreational commission, explained that what was required was volunteer organizational and instructional personnel to carry out the program and that financial assistance was not the prime need. The training facilities, when organized and in operation, will be available to all the youth of the area who are interested.

It was decided unanimously that, in keeping with the Legion policy of public service, the banquet hall and kitchen facilities would be made available free of charge to the Retarded Children's Association for its supper. Also, that the board of trade could have use of the meeting room free of charge for its public meeting, called for the formation of a golf club and promotion of the Brudenell Golf Course.

During the opening ceremonies, branch members deceased since the last meeting were remembered by one minute's silence. One of the deceased, former member Pierce Butler of Peter's Road, was a strong Legion supporter and was a faithful attendee at meetings until his illness struck.

One new Legion member was welcomed into the branch at the meeting.

Following discussion of a number of items of business and their disposal, one of which was the promotion of a "Teen-Hop" to be held in the near future, the meeting was adjourned and the members took part in a social evening where lunch served by the members of the Ladies Auxiliary.

Next meeting will be held at Uigg School April 29.

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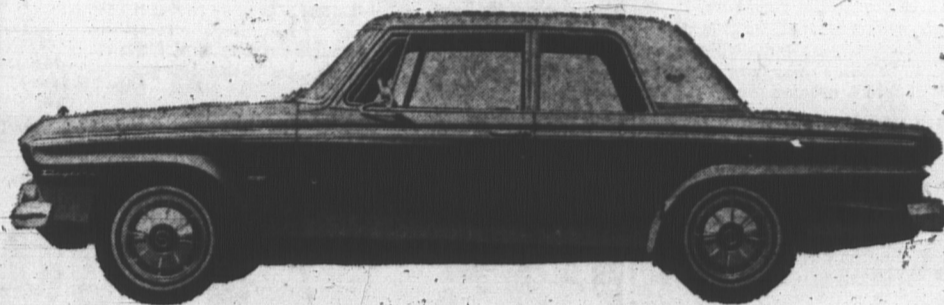

## Football Star Tells Experiences, Urges Aid For Crippled Children

Ron Stewart, star halfback with the Ottawa Rough Riders, told some of the experiences of a football player who was undersized as he was guest speaker at the regular weekly luncheon of the Rotary Club of Charlottetown yesterday on behalf of the Easter Seals campaign.

He said that as a youngster of 12 he was torn between a career in basketball and football.

"I was four foot nine inches tall and weighed 120 pounds. Looking at those tall basketball players I realized that wouldn't do for me. Football was also a sport that called for big hunkies. But I was determined so I tried out."

"It was always necessary for me to convince a skeptical coach that despite my size I could play on his team."

"When I first tried out for the Ottawa Rough Riders I remember trying to impress Bill Smith, the line coach. I was in the backfield and fielded a punt. I remember saying over and over to myself that I must

drop the ball. That was the cardinal sin in all football.

"I was concentrating so hard and I was tearing down the field so that I would come close to him to make the biggest impression. But somehow the ground-keeper that morning had put in fresh lime on the lines marking off the yards. Just as I got opposite Smith I slipped on the fresh lime and wound up on my back. There wasn't anybody near me either."

Mr. Stewart now is five feet eight inches tall and is a compact 180 pounds but he still recalls the comment of Bill Smith who said, "I looked like a dwarf bursting out of a snow-bank."

One of the greats of Canadian football, Mr. Stewart mentioned his deep interest in helping the cause of crippled children as typified in the Easter Seals campaign. He had visited the Rehabilitation Centre Monday morning during his stay in Charlottetown. He recommended that members of the Rotary Club should visit some of these "game youngsters who are happy despite their handicaps."

In Toronto he and Whipper Billy Watson, the famous wrestler and Anne Hegevit, the champion skier, often get together to help the work among crippled children.

**SIZE HANDICAP**  
He mentioned that he, as a youngster handicapped by lack of size and weight, needed lots of support which he received from his coaches in high school and at Queen's University before trying out for the professional career.

He said the crippled children

of P.E.I. needed the same kind of support and intelligent guidance.

Among the head-table guests at the noon luncheon was this year's Timmy, 12-year-old Velda Paynter of Springfield.

Walter Auld, chairman of the Easter Seals, mentioned that the club's annual television show would be held April 9. Co-chairman Jack Davies reported on the results of the campaign to date. He said \$8,140.01 had been received and this was ahead of last year's campaign.

Rotarian Robert Parent reported that the service clubs of Charlottetown were discussing the possibility of an inter-service-club association. Following the fifth-annual inter-club bonspiel, won by the Rotarians, the curlers had met and recommended that the clubs get together to discuss their various services on behalf of the community and foster-club social events.

President A. W. Likely was back from his recent Florida vacation.

The speaker was introduced by chairman Dave Boswell and thanked by co-chairman John Evans.

Guests included Wendall McKay, deputy provincial secretary; Rev. Ross Howard, Jack Kane, J. Frank MacMillan and Ian MacLeod, all of Charlottetown.

**Man Appeals Conviction In Accident**  
HAMPTON, N.B. (CP) — An appeal by Eidon Bryce Wilson, 21, of Lorneville against a conviction by Magistrate G. King Kelley on a charge of criminal negligence in the operation of a motor vehicle was to open here today before Judge Harry N. Jonah in Kings County court.

Wilson was found guilty March 1 in connection with a car crash which resulted in the death Aug. 15 of Floyd Arnold Taylor, 21, of Lancaster.

Wilson was sentenced to three months in jail and fined \$70 by Magistrate Kelley but was released on \$1,000 bail pending the appeal.

The fatality occurred at Evandale, Kings County, when a car driven by Taylor was in collision with a truck operated by Harold Raymond Magee of Hampton.

## Shopping Centre May Include Liquor Store

The new shopping centre to be built on Upper Queen Street may attract a brand new liquor store. Informed sources said yesterday that there is a strong possibility the Liquor Control Commission may build on the new site.

There have been rumors recently that the P.E.I. Liquor Control Commission has been seeking new facilities in the Charlottetown area and one suggestion was that a large grocery store in Parkdale was to be acquired by the commission.

In one of its annual reports, the commission said "the warehouse space in the present premises in Charlottetown will not permit any further expansion and the retail store is inadequate at present. The high rent for the premises is of considerable importance and is also a factor in considering the possibility of erecting a suitable building, which in turn would pay for itself in the rent saved and in future years would be an asset to the community."

**No Reduction In Scotch Cost Is Likely Here**  
No reduction in the price of Scotch Whisky sold by the P.E.I. Liquor Commission is likely to occur, according to a spokesman for the commission.

The spokesman based his opinion on the recent ocean freight increase and high warehousing costs.

Formerly, Scotch came in thirteen- and one-third ounce and twenty-six- and two-third ounce sizes and sold for \$3.29 and \$6.10 per bottle respectively. Now, most Scotch comes in 12 ounce and 25-ounce sizes and sells for \$3.15 and \$6.00 per bottle respectively.

One brand of Scotch is still available in the thirteen- and one-third ounce size and sells at \$3.50. There was no change in size or price of this brand.

The commission spokesman corrected an earlier newspaper report which said the larger-sized pints of Scotch were selling for \$3.15 and remained at the same price when the 12-ounce bottles were introduced. The larger sizes sold for \$3.30 each and dropped to \$3.15 when the bottle size was reduced.
