He took a deep breath and got ready to work on McConvoy once again. Big Willie caught one and away went the ball between the legs and McConvoy's second strike. The third would win on their way with what they hoped were the runs that would win the world series. McConvoy was streaking it down the first base line.

But suddenly there arose between that first and second sack Bobby Richardson who suddenly grabbed the ball for the last out of the 1962 classic.

The Yankees had won and the goat of the 1960 classic became the big hero of the 1962 October series, Ralph Terry had pitched himself and every real sport fan fell good about the performance.

It was that kind of a baseball game.

The 32-year-old fighter has been in a coma since he was knocked out by Johnny Riglin's of San Francisco.

Dr. Fox said it is still impossible to predict when Lavender will come out of his coma. The boxer began moving his arms again shortly after the operation which the surgeon called "a good sign."

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Wm. Weiler America's Greatest Winter Sportsman

TORONTO (CP)—William Weiler, the Canadian Army's outstanding gymnast, has been named winner of the Norton E. Croft Memorial Award for the second year in succession.

Weiler, German-born, now stationed at Camp Borden, defeated track star and Canadian Olympic champion, Kildy of Toronto, Harry Jerome of Vancouver and Gordon Dickson of the Toronto Argonauts at the 68th annual meeting of the Amateur Athletic Union of Canada. The announcement was made Friday night at an AAU banquet sponsored by the provincial government.

The award is presented annually to the Canadian male athlete making the outstanding contribution to any AAU sport taking performance, character and sportsmanship into consideration.

Kildy, Canada's internationally known distance runner, picked up two trophies—the Viscount Alexander Trophy and the Dr. Fred Treloar Memorial Trophy. The Viscount Alexander Trophy goes annually to the outstanding Canadian junior athlete and Kildy has now won it three times in a row. The Treloar Trophy is the outstanding winter sportsman award given to the top field competitor, winner of the 100-metre event.

MARY STEWART WINS
The top woman athlete picked by the AAU is Mary Stewart of Vancouver's U of I, record-holding 15-year-old swimmer who became a two-line winner of the Velma Springstead Rowing Cup.

The Maj J. W. Davies Trophy, presented each year to Canada's outstanding track competitor excluding walking events, was won by Jerome, the first man ever to share the two credit points, (the 100-yard and 100-metre events).

The Longbow award is for an annual competition among Indian athletes.

NEW YORK (AP)—If the Western Conference of the National Football League is going to have a race, it is up to San Francisco 49ers, the first thing about the runaway Green Bay Packers in Sunday's game at Milwaukee.

The 49ers approach this most important game on a high key after winning three in a row from Minnesota, Baltimore and Chicago. With J. D. Smith third among the group, Packers' John Brodie beginning to find his targets, the 49ers hope to be presented to the winners by League President Jerry McComack of St. Louis.

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He will replace Ed Bill Sementko who fractured an ankle in a game against Saskatchewan Roughriders of the Western Conference here last Saturday.

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The announcement was made Friday by promoter Sam Silver.
