Britain To Construct Atom - Powered Submarines

LONDON (Reuters)—Britain announced today that she is planning to build atom-propelled submarines as a first step toward a possible nuclear-powered navy.

A memorandum accompanying the annual financial estimates said nuclear energy "may well become in the future the main source of propulsion for both naval and merchant ships."

The admiralty's intentions were "to employ nuclear power in the first instance in submarines."

The report said that "for some years scientists and naval officers have been collecting the necessary knowledge of this subject, but it has only recently become possible to start practical work on planning a marine nuclear power plant."

The United States now is building its fourth atom-powered submarine.

NO HELP FROM U. S.

Admiral Earl Mountbatten said in Washington last November that Britain could save two years in construction of an atomic-powered sub if the U. S. would furnish information on its own projects. But the first sea lord said his requests for such information had been turned down with regret because U. S. law did not permit release of such atomic information.

The U. S. Navy now proposes to build a 11,000-ton atom-powered cruiser and six more nuclear powered submarines.

France has announced she is doing research on a nuclear engine to power a submarine and Russia has announced plans to develop atomic-powered icebreakers in a few years.

SMALLER AND FASTER

The official British report today said that the threat of hydrogen bomb warfare demands a reserve fleet more highly prepared for mobilization than before.

Therefore, the reserve fleet is to be smaller, and money and manpower will be concentrated on modernizing ships which could be manned quickly for service on the outbreak of war.

The report said it would be too expensive to bring all ships in reserve up to the most modern standards and keep them up to date. Some are being transferred to the navies of friendly countries and the others will be scrapped eventually.

The estimates put the cost of the navy program for 1956-57 at £401,670,000, an increase of £9,720,000 over the current year.

Much of the increase is due to higher pay and pensions.

● Sift 3/4 c. milk, 3/4 c. granulated sugar, 1 1/2 tps. salt and 3/4 c. shortening; cool to lukewarm. Meanwhile, measure into a large bowl 1/2 c. lukewarm water, 1 tsp. granulated sugar; stir until sugar is dissolved. Sprinkle with 1 envelope Fleischmann's Active Dry Yeast. Let stand 10 mins., THEN stir well.

Add cooled milk mixture and stir in 1 well-beaten egg and 1 tsp. grated lemon rind. Stir in 2 c. once-sifted bread flour; beat until smooth. Work in 2 c. (about) once-sifted bread flour. Knead on lightly-floured board until smooth and elastic. Place in greased bowl and grease top of dough. Cover and set in warm place, free from draught. Let rise until doubled in bulk. Punch down dough and roll out into an oblong about 9" wide and 24" long; loosen dough. Combine 1/2 c. lightly-packed brown sugar and 1/2 c. liquid honey; spread over dough and sprinkle with 3/4 c. broken walnuts. Beginning at a long side, loosely roll up like a jelly roll. Lift carefully into a greased 8 1/2" tube pan and join ends of dough to form a ring. Brush top with melted butter. Cover and let rise until doubled in bulk. Bake in moderately hot oven, 375°, 45-50 minutes. Brush top with honey and sprinkle with chopped walnuts.
