A CURIOUS ARGUMENT.

THE Patriot doesn't attempt to defend the indefensible. How it is that a Government elected to make ends meet has incurred a lamentable series of deficits and heaped up a debt which now amounts to about \$500,000; why road orders, etc., are so plentiful after the Dominion election; why liquor laws and other laws are permitted to be shamelessly violated; why the late Attorney-General continued to hold office after the people voted him out; what the terms of the agreement with the justly celebrated Mr. Pineau,—these and other such questions in the issue now to be submitted to the people of Prince Edward Island, are completely ignored by the chief organ of the Government; and the attention of the people is directed to the Belfast and Murray Harbor Railway,—which is wholly and solely a Dominion work! We are told that—

"It is very important, that these two districts should, at the approaching election, return four supporters of the Liberal party in the Local Legislature; as representatives in accord with the party in power, will be in a much better position to forward the interests of their districts than they could if in opposition. It is very necessary that this great work should be pushed to completion as rapidly as possible, so the people should send men to the Legislature who will have some influence in forwarding the enterprise."

Just before the Dominion election we were told that the Hillsborough Bridge was under contract. That part of the roadbed of the Belfast and Murray Harbor Railway is under contract we know from the fact that many voters in the Dominion election were "worked that way." Moreover it was stated that the remainder of the work would be placed under contract forthwith. How, in these circumstances, the election of four members to the Provincial Legislature can in any way affect the completion of the Belfast and Murray Harbor Railway is a mystery which the Government organ has not explained.

Altogether, the Patriot's argument is a curious and remarkable one. If the people ought to elect supporters of the Provincial Government because the Dominion Government is building a branch railway through Belfast and Murray Harbor, they ought on the same principle, to elect opponents of the Provincial Government because the Dominion Government has failed to build branch railways to Elmira, New London, Crapaud, West Cape, etc., to which the Dominion Government, by reason of the able and persistent advocacy of Senator Ferguson, Mr. Martin and other Conservatives in and out of the Dominion Parliament, stands committed.

ELECTORS of Prince Edward Island, if you had been told, plainly and truly, that the Liberals would, before the end of the century have heaped up a public debt of upwards of \$600,000, would you have placed them in power? If not, turn them out now! Don't be humbugged any longer.

HOW TO VOTE.

As you think right. Let no party dictate. Your conscience is your own, if you are a man and not a machine. If you refrain from voting through fear of consequences—as, to what people say, loss of work, annoyance of professed friends, you are a moral coward. As a man in a free country you have the privilege of using your own judgement; if you do not vote because of undue influence being used you are a moral coward.

If you vote for a man or party because paid to do so or for any consideration other than the good of the country you are a dishonorable citizen. Vote honestly, and if any one questions your right so to do, if any person is displeased at you for so doing, pity their stupidity and go on your way rejoicing. Fear God and do right.—The Truth.

NOTES AND COMMENTS.

So Councillor Whear is going to desert the duty in the City Council Council to which he was last year elected. He is going to necessitate another election. As chairman of the Finance Committee, he ought certainly to render an account of his stewardship in the present year. Councillor Whear must certainly have very lax ideas concerning the duty he owes those who elected him in February last. How can it be expected that a man who will run away from one duty, without saying so much as by your leave, will fulfil another duty?

LA PRESSE, the leading French-Canadian paper, editorially pays a tribute to Sir Charles Tupper. After reviewing his public career and eulogizing his indomitable energy and pluck in face of defeat, and expressing regret at his retirement, the Presse, says: "He has always been exceedingly favorable to the French-Canadians, whom he has always treated with justice, liberality, and generosity. The absence on his part of all national and religious prejudice, which generally has such a hold on public men, is one of the greatest traits of his character."

THE scheme of the British Army reform as foreshadowed by the London Daily Mail, will be studied with universal interest. The army is, apparently, to be modelled after something very like the systems in vogue on the Continent. The British private will become a trained soldier, and instead of an insufficient few weeks' training in the year he will in future have to undergo ten months of most rigorous and scientific training. This is reform with a vengeance and is likely to be well received. In the past the British army manoeuvres have been one of the weakest features in the military system, and have often been ridiculed by French and German experts. Now, however, it is said there will be extensive powers for the holding of manoeuvres on a large scale, and considerable areas of land are to be acquired for the purpose. The scheme, if it should be a genuine one, will mark a new era in England's military history.

BRITISH TARIFF.

Not Unlikely List of Duties Will Be Enlarged.

LONDON, Nov. 14.—If there are any Englishmen who are hoping that the force of competition across the Atlantic might be broken through the suspension of existing policies, they have kept silent. Recent experiences has taught the mercantile classes here that they have nothing to gain from tariff changes in America which involve general depression and loss of purchasing power. Outcries against the protective policy are no longer heard in England. There is a growing feeling that direct taxation here has reached its limit; that income taxpayers cannot be bled further, and that a tariff may become necessary as a means of raising money for naval armaments and for consolidating the empire.
