Count Von Moltke has refused the title of Prince offered him by the Emperor of Germany.

The statisticians say that \$18,000,000 are now invested in silk manufactures in this country.

Mr. Patrick, Clerk of the House of Commons, has been superannuated—superannuation to date from 1st of January. Mr. Bourionet will probably succeed him.

A fire at Lynn, Mass., this morning destroyed the steam mill of James N. Buffum, Alled & Boyden's paper box factory, Timothy Newell's railroad house, Marshall's woodwork building and a number of small buildings. Loss \$145,000.

Mr. McArthur, the new Lord Mayor of London, is the first Wesleyan, and we believe, the first Irishman who ever held that office. He is an Ulster man, and we believe a relative of M. Gault, Esq., M. P., of Montreal.

The imports into France for the nine months ending on the 30th of September show an increase of 253,000,000f. as compared with the same period last year. Of this increase 189,000,000f. is in food. The exports during the same period increased 69,000,000f.

A valuable horse belonging to Mr. Crawford, agent of Miller Bros., dealer of sewing machines, whilst being driven through the street in Sussex, N. B., on Thursday, fell down and instantly expired. The horse when taken out of the stable seemed as well as usual, and ate heartily in the morning.

Another determined attempt at suicide is reported from Halifax. On Monday night a restaurant keeper on Gettiney street, who has been drinking very heavily for some time, hung himself with a piece of new clothesline to a beam in the cellar. The ceiling was so low that in order to suspend himself and throw his weight on his neck, he had to bend his legs. He was discovered by three young men and cut down. As soon as he became conscious he drew a razor from his pocket and swore that he would cut his throat. Before he could get it open the men disarmed him. They put him to bed and tied him, so that he could not hurt himself during the night.
