The St. Dunstan's Varsity hockey team with John Kane at the helm clinched the Maritime Intercollegiate Hockey Championship at the local rink Saturday afternoon with an 8-4 victory over the Mount Allison Mounties.

The Mounties weren't going anywhere in the league standings, but when they took the ice Saturday afternoon they had a good chance of being a stumbling block in the Kanemans' quest for their first Maritime hockey championship since 1947.

The Mount Allison pucksters put up a game fight and they had the capacity crowd wondering about the outcome of the battle right until the dying minutes of the contest.

This observer thought the line of Morell's Mike Kelly at centre with Andre Gelinac and Rex McCarville on the wings formed the backbone of the Red and White machine in the Mt. 'A' tilt. This unit was a constant thorn in the side of the Mounties with their tenacious forechecking and they banged four goals past Chuck Lawrence, who turned in a good performance between the pipes for the visiting pucksters.

McCarville and Gelinac are both hustling wingers with lots of speed and a good shot while Kelly is an excellent playmaker. Mike possesses the best instinct for anticipating plays of any of the college hockey players we have seen, in these parts, and if he was a little faster on the blades we think he could be a real super-star in the college circuit.

Billy MacMillan shone brightly in parts of Saturday's game and the big easy moving pivot man banged home three goals to increase his lead in the individual scoring race.
