## 21st Music Festival Gets Underway Today

The 21st annual Prince Edward Island competitive Music Festival begins today at 9 a.m. at the Confederation Centre, Queens County Civic Auditorium, Prince County. The Montague section begins Thursday, May 5 at 9 a.m. at the Montague Regional Auditorium.

The festival will be officially opened tonight at the Confederation Centre at 8 o'clock and will be performed under the distinguished patronage of Lieutenant-Governor, W.J. MacDonald and Mrs. MacDonald, Premier

Walter R. Shaw and Mrs. Shaw; Hon. Dr. I.G. Dewar, minister of education, and Mrs. Dewar; Mayor W.J. Cox and Mrs. Cox; Mayor George Key and Mrs. Key; Mayor Bruce Yeo and Mrs. Yeo.

The four adjudicators, Earle Terry, London, Ontario; Frances Wickberg, Winnipeg, Manitoba; Wayne K. Riddell, Montreal, Quebec and Lloyd G. Queen, arrived here over the weekend. Mrs. Wickberg, Mr. Queen and Mr. Terry arrived here immediately following their participation as adjudicators in other festivals.

This is the first time in recent years that all four judges have been chosen from Canada. Last year two were from England, one from Ireland and the fourth was from Canada.

### Parade Marks Atlantic Battle

The Battle of the Atlantic Sunday was commemorated by veterans who held a parade in Charlottetown yesterday morning.

The naval parade, formed at the Queen Charlotte Armouries at 10.30, consisted of naval veterans, Sea Cadets from Charlottetown, Summerside and Souris, Navy League cadets and the Prince Edward Island Regiment band.

The salute was taken at the Provincial Building by Lieutenant-Governor W.J. MacDonald.

ALBERTON — Two highway accidents were investigated by Alberton detachment of the RCMP during the weekend.

Early Saturday morning a 1962 Volkswagen went out of control on the highway at Montrose and rolled over with considerable damage. The driver, Edward Allan of Camp Petawawa, Ontario and a passenger were taken to the Western Hospital in Alberton and later to the Prince County Hospital. Neither is believed seriously injured.

About 6.30 Saturday night vehicles driven by Arthur Roy Cornish, Summerside and John Joseph Chaisson, Tignish were in collision at Coleman. No one was injured in the accident in which the total damage was estimated at \$200.

## Local Swimmers Defeat Moncton

The Charlottetown YMCA swim team whipped the best age group swim team in N.B., Moncton, in the return match of a duel meet held at the Charlottetown Y Saturday afternoon. Previous to this win the local team had defeated Moncton 215-147 in Moncton and they downed them 249-158 here.

Jim Evans emerged as the individual star for the local team as he collected 33 points on the basis of three wins, one second and a third. Sandy MacDonald was high point getter for the visitors as she captured two events and was runner up in two more.

The Moncton team had previously taken top honors in the Moncton Invitational and N.B. age class champions and finished up runner-ups in the Maritime Y championships.

### PRINCE COUNTY FISHERMEN GET GOOD START

Calm, sunny weather enabled western Prince County fishermen to run out the greater part of their lobster gear on Saturday as the north side lobster season opened at 8 o'clock. First lobster are expected to be landed today from

the many thousands of traps set out in Tignish and Alberton. Gear setting, about three quarters completed, is expected to be finished today. The larger boats at Alberton, pictured above, were able to carry three hundred traps per

boat and complete setting in only three trips to the fishing grounds. Bait is in short supply with very small herring catches to date and most fishermen had bait trucked in from the mainland. With the exception of minor engine

troubles, 35 boats ran out lines at Alberton without difficulty. The number of traps at Alberton South is estimated to approach 20,000, the greatest number in the history of fishing at Alberton.

## Tignish Co-op Association Shows Increase In Surplus

**TIGNISH** — The annual meeting of the Tignish Co-operative Association Ltd. was held in the high school auditorium during the past week with the president, John Clark of Alma presiding. Mrs. Roy Harper read the minutes of the last annual meeting. Valmore Arsenault, assistant manager, recorded the minutes. One minute silence was given in memory of the late Ray Handrahan, an active member of the executive for a number of years.

Gerald Handrahan, manager of the Co-operative presented the financial statement that showed an increased surplus over other years.

Total assets were \$235,693.40 with a surplus as of Jan. 31st of \$44,468.35. Roy McLeod outlined the inventory breakdown in each department, that showed a total margin of \$181,200.70. Operating expenses was \$137,440.37, with a net surplus of \$42,871.89. A five per cent rebate was voted for groceries, hardware and meat purchases, and 10 per cent on dry goods. This goes toward a five-year revolving capital fund for the members.

The directors report was given by Fred Harper.

It was decided to call a meeting of potato growers to discuss

a way of increasing the volume in this department.

Walter Christopher, chairman of the nominating committee, brought in a slate of three new directors: Austin Kennedy, Earl O'Rourke, and Fred J. Richard. Other directors are: Bernard Keefe, Lloyd Shea, Ulick Arsenault, Leo DesRoches, Fred Harper and Fidele J. Perry.

Ted Sabine of Maritime Co-operative Services and Kenneth

McLean, manager of the P.E.I. league and Cyrus Gallant spoke on the progress of the co-operative enterprise at Tignish. Among the speakers were: Very Rev. M.J. Rooney, Wilson Shea, Emile Gallant, Frank Arsenault, Gregory McInnis, J.J. Arsenault, Roy Clohessey spoke on the possibilities of forming a community pasture in the area. Management and staff workers of the co-operative were accorded very high words of praise.

## Lobster Season Sees Fine Start

Lobster fishermen headed for the fishing grounds on Saturday with one of the largest number of traps recorded for some years and on increase in the fishing fleets.

The sea was calm, free of ice, and the sun was shining. There was a tenseness in the air at Tignish areas as close to 150 boats loaded with traps piled as high as 360 in number waited outside Tignish Harbor for the department of fisheries to sound

the all-clear signal so approximately 70,000 traps could be set by nightfall.

Much the same picture was evident on the north shore and south shores of Kings and Queens counties.

A heavy backlog of lobsters from last year makes it almost certain that prices this year will be considerably lower.

For a few fishermen, the only setback was burst engine blocks caused by last week's cold snap.

### Two Charged In Accident

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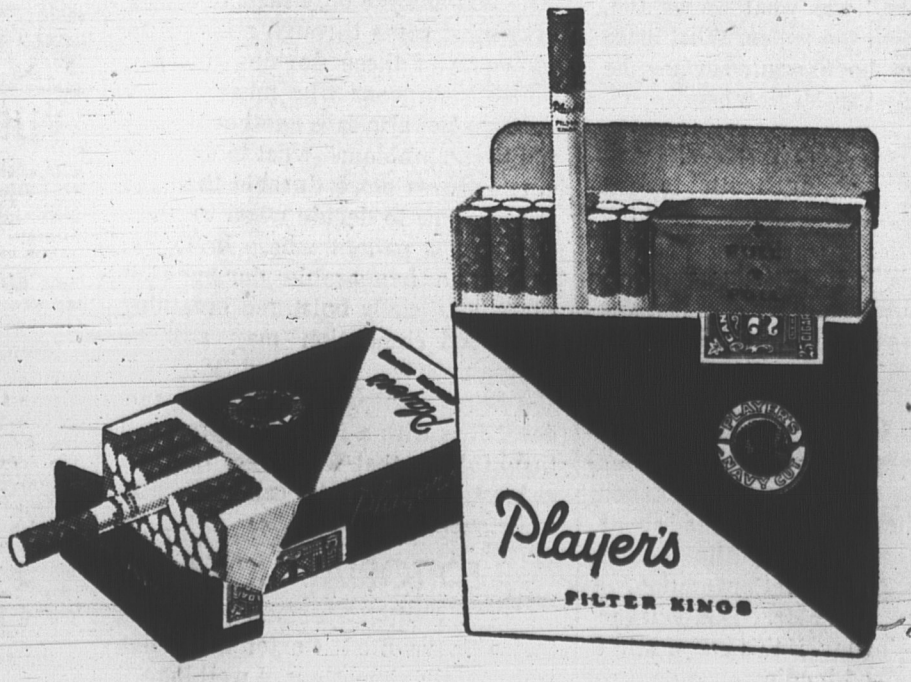
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
