

McCluskey-Hall Draw Trainer Decisions Mays

Louis "Cobey" McCluskey of Charlottetown and Young Dick Hall of Boston fought to a gruelling ten round draw at the Sports Arena last night in one of the best boxing matches ever presented in Charlottetown. McCluskey weighed in at 158 pounds and Hall at 155.

Unleashing a blistering attack in the opening half of the tenth round Don "Duck" Trainer 158 pounds of Charlottetown scored a unanimous ten round decision over Billy Mays, 154 pounds of Boston.

Leo "Whipper" Steele, 131 pounds of Charlottetown knocked out George Burns, 132 pounds, of Halifax with a smashing left hook to the mid-section at 1:02 of the fourth round.

Peanuts Arsenault of Summerside scored a fifth round T.K.O. over Freddie Dunn of Halifax, when Dunn failed to answer the bell for the fifth. He was knocked out as the bell ended the fourth round by a right to the jaw. Arsenault weighed 142 pounds and Dunn 142.

In the curtain raiser Bob Dalziel of Charlottetown stopped Roy Diamond also of Charlottetown, with a withering punching attack in the fourth round.

The fight was attended by a large crowd of fans who loudly applauded the action especially in the fast moving main bout between McCluskey and Hall.

For ten solid rounds McCluskey and Hall pounded one another as they punched with amazing speed and showed loads of equally fought one of the finest fights of his career and both fighters were warmly cheered by the crowd as the bell rang to end the bout.

Referee Danny McCormack voted five rounds for Hall, three rounds for McCluskey and two even. Judge Earl Smith voted four rounds for McCluskey, three rounds for Hall and three even. Referee Buddy Lund voted for a re-match and it seems safe to assume that promoter Ivan Doherty would be making a smart and popular move if he could match these two boys here again.

Don Trainer's stinging right hand which caught Billy Mays flush on the jaw in the opening seconds of the tenth probably won the other ten rounds fight for Trainer. The Charlottetown boy followed up with a series of hard lefts and rights that had Mays groggy during the opening minute and swung what had been an even fight in favour of the Charlottetown boxer.

Trainer survived a hard left to the jaw in the third round to come back and earn his victory. For a time in the third it appeared that the capable Mays had Trainer on the way out but "Duck" weathered the storm.

Trainer smashed his way through Mays' defenses in the seventh round with a series of effective combinations to stagger the Bostonian. Trainer also had a good second round. The ninth was about even with Trainer piling up points in the tenth. The Guardian score card had Trainer the winner 97-94.

Whipper Steele threw his left hand out of nowhere and chilled George Burns in the fourth round of a six-rounder. The boys were fighting in close at mid-ring when Steele's crushing left suddenly ended the fight. Burns tried to get up at the count of two but rolled over on his side. He tried again at the count of nine but again rolled over and had to be taken to his corner.

"Peanuts" Arsenault was ahead of Freddie Dunn all the way and his right to the jaw at the end of the fourth clinched matters.

Bob Dalziel simply had too much punching power for young Roy Diamond and referee Wilf McCluskey wisely stopped the fight in the fourth.

The first three fights were handled by Wilf McCluskey and the main bouts by Buddy Lund.

WIMBLEDON, England (AP)—Britain's hopes of keeping one Wimbledon tennis championship at home ended Thursday when Althea Gibson of New York trounced 16-year-old Christine Truman of Britain 6-1, 6-1.
The top-seeded Miss Gibson meets another American, Darlene Hard of California, in the finals of the women's singles on Saturday. Blonde Miss Hard beat Mrs. Dorothy Head Knud of New York, who was 32 Thursday, 6-2, 6-3.
Reigning champion Lew Hoad and Ashley Cooper, 20, will battle for the men's singles tennis title today.
Both husky Australians play tennis the modern way, poked-fisted with a racket, a tigerish rush to the net, an explosive volley and sudden death.
This pair have met three times this year, with the 23-year-old Hoad, an international star for the last five years, getting a 2-1 edge.
Cooper is tanned almost to the color of dark bronze, built like a battleship, with a liking for Calypso music and lots of sleep.
Hoad, blond, fair-skinned and shuncky, also likes a lot of sleep. Neither of them talk much—and it's got to be something more than usually amusing to make them smile.
FIRST SINCE '37
If Hoad takes the singles crown a second time he'll be the first champion to do so since Donald Budge won twice in 1937-38.
Miss Gibson, who first hit a tennis ball on her father's crowded streets, is favored to win the women's singles crown when that match is played Saturday.
Hoad, who had a disabled back earlier in the season, said tersely Thursday: "I'm hoping for the best. Can't say more, but I'm happy about my game."
Cooper, a far more tense player, is handicapped by an ankle injury he got playing football a few years ago. He said: "We'll have to see how the ball bounces. I think I might do it."

Author In Suit For Eight Million

LOS ANGELES (AP)—Author Daniel Fuchs is asking \$8,250,000 in a copyright infringement suit against film star Burt Lancaster and others over the movie "Trapeze."
The suit, filed Monday in federal court, says that before August 1949 Fuchs wrote a magazine story, The Daring Young Man to which he says he retained film rights.
The complaint says Fuchs later retained Harold Hecht as an agent to sell the film rights and changed the title to Trapeze.
About Aug. 15, 1953, the defendant began producing Trapeze without Fuchs' knowledge or consent and it was released in May 1956, the complaint said.
The suit alleges that the film was substantially copied from the original story.

Yankees Jolted But Keep Lead; N.L. Race Tightens

New York Yankees, though jolted off their winning streak by Boston's Mickey Vernon, maintained their three-game American League lead during Thursday's big holiday program. But the hectic National League scramble got tighter than ever with all four contenders capitalizing on front-running Cincinnati's loss to Milwaukee.

Milwaukee picked up a full game with a 10-7 defeat of the Redlegs at Crosley Field. St. Louis and Brooklyn earned doubleheader splits for a half game pickup apiece, and Philadelphia jumped up a game and a half by sweeping New York Giants 2-1 and 6-2.
The standings at the traditional halfway mark of the race show Cincinnati first by a half game and four percentage points over St. Louis, by a half game and six points over Milwaukee, by 2 1/2 games over Brooklyn with Philadelphia fifth, a close-up three games behind.
St. Louis split with Chicago, winning the second 4-3 after dropping the opener 7-6. Brooklyn, beaten by Pittsburgh 5-1 in their first game, won the second 8-2.

THREE SPLITS
All three American League doubleheaders were split. The Yankees defeated Boston 4-1 after Vernon's pinch homer with one on and two out in the ninth had won the first for the Red Sox 3-2. Kansas City rallied for five runs in the ninth to upset second place Chicago 5-4 in the first of a morning-afternoon pair, but the White Sox won the second 8-3. Detroit beat Cleveland 4-3 after losing 3-1, and in a single game, Baltimore edged Washington 3-2 in 11 innings.

BLOOM SINGLE
Joe Demaestri scored all the way from first base on Bus Zernial's bloop single to climax the five-run, four-hit rally by Kansas City, which had been held to three hits for eight innings by Jack Harshman and Josef Paul Lapalme. Wally Burtette won it but Chicago battered Ned Garver and four relievers for 15 hits behind Bob Keegan to get their split.
Cleveland tried relief ace Ray Narleski as a starter after veteran Early Wynn's three-hit pitch-

ing and Rocky Colavito's three run homer had whipped Detroit in the opener. Narleski held a 3-2 lead when he went out for a pinch hitter in the seventh but reliever Bud Daley lost it in the eighth when Frank Bolling singled. Al Kaline doubled and Charlie Maxwell singled for two runs.
Jim Brideweser's single scored Jim Busby with Baltimore's winning run in the 11th after Busby's RBI double tied the score 2-2 in the ninth. Ken Lehman won in relief over Truman Clevenger.

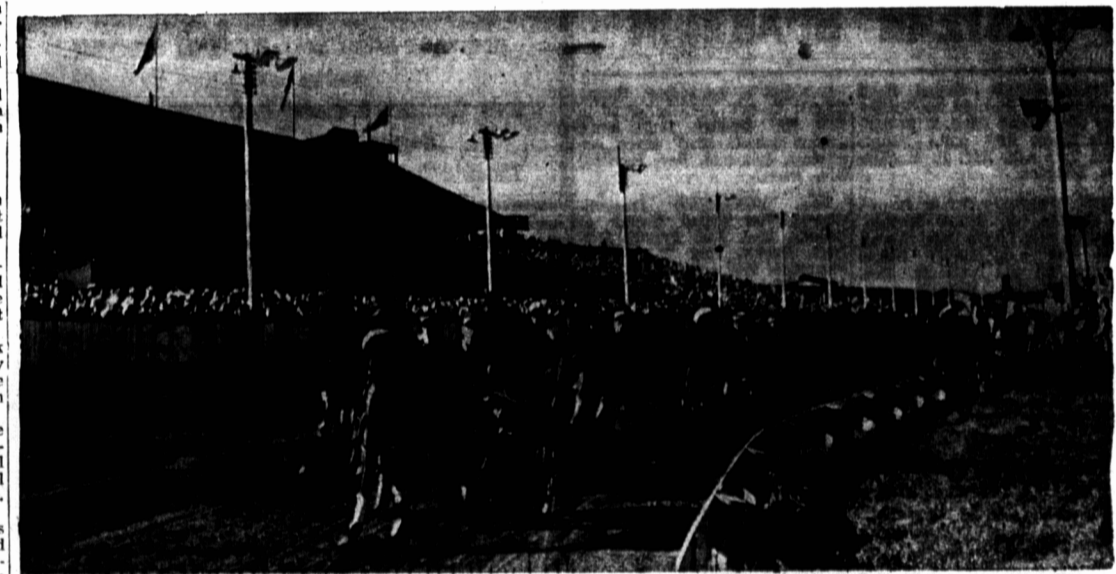
