**THE RESPONSIBLE PARTY.**

From the Guardian's report of the meeting held in Market Hall we quote:

"Mr. Whear discussed the financial situation, claiming the Tories were largely responsible for the present debt."

How can this be so? The Tories left the Province in a better financial position than they found it. This is clear from the fact that in 1880—shortly after they obtained office—the subsidy received by the Province from the Dominion Government was \$153,424.32; while in 1890—shortly before they left office—it was \$183,519.86—twenty thousand dollars of the increase being due to the direct and strong representations of Messrs. Sullivan and Ferguson.

On the 9th of July, 1891—a few months after the Tories left office—the Deputy Treasurer of the Province, Mr. Arthur Newbury, certified that the debt then due the banks amounted to \$53,442.21. How then can Mr. Whear say the Tories are "largely responsible for the present debt"—of over SIX HUNDRED THOUSAND DOLLARS? The party now in office is the responsible party; and it is the party to be punished on the 12th inst.

The electors ought to punish it, by rejecting its candidates.

But the scheme failed. The gentleman whose vote it was thought to influence by the road was not to be seduced. He remains true to his Conservative principles.
