Queens MP Outlines Canada's Role At UN

"This has been a very important year for Canada in the United Nations", Heath Macquarrie, MP Queens, said last night on his arrival from New York where he is a member of the Canadian delegation to the UN.

He pointed to the major role played by Canada in settling the dispute over a security council seat going to Turkey. With this country playing a highly important part in negotiations, it was finally agreed that Turkey and Poland would divide the seat.

It was due to this move on Canada's part in settling the issue which gave rise to Hon. Howard Green's remark "no one is twisting our arms".

Other controversial matters in which this country played a lead-

ing part included final agreement by members of the UN to share information on radiation. Mr. Macquarrie said Canada does not believe in further atomic bomb testing and as a result voted against its NATO ally, France, and with Africa on the French bomb testing in Africa.

He said this country had gained world wide appreciation for what it is doing in the way of technical assistance in developing the underdeveloped countries.

Speaking of seriously ill refugees in Europe he remarked that Canada was taking 100 of the tubercular refugees and would look after them.

Mr. Macquarrie is leaving for Ottawa Thursday for two days in the capital but will then return to this province for the Christmas holiday season which he will spend at his home in Victoria.

63 Signalmen Receive First Aid Certificates

Sixty-three members of 5 Signals Regiment received first aid certificates, in ceremonies held at the armouries last night.

The results of the examinations given by three Red Cross instructors were "outstanding", according to Dr. W. R. Stewart, medical director of outpatients clinics at the provincial Sanatorium, who made the presentations.

In his remarks Dr. Stewart encouraged those who failed to make the grade in the exams to try again and to those who were successful he said: "This is probably one of the most important courses you will ever take. It will help you as members of the army and could possibly prove of use in saving someone's life."

Dr. Stewart noted that despite the fact that a tremendous amount of work was involved in the course "the results were outstanding."

The course was given by Red Cross instructors Edward Chinery, Norman MacLeod and Bruce MacLaren.
