Churches Thronged "Rotten Row" in London's Hyde Park was the smallest in years. In Stockholm, the overnight temperature was 14, coldest April night in the Swedish capital since 1877. In Jerusalem, thousands of Easter pilgrims worshipped at Christendom's holiest shrines. For Catholics, it was the traditional Easter service of the risen Christ. But it was Palm Sunday for Greek Orthodox, Armenian, Egyptian Coptic, Ethiopian and Syrian Orthodox Christians. They follow an older calendar and observe Easter next Sunday. Jerusalem's Latin patriarch led a procession of Roman Catholics into the Church of the Holy Sepulchre, traditional place of Christ's entombment in Arab-held old Jerusalem. Protestants worshipped at a newer shrine, the garden tomb outside the old city's walls. Many Protestants believe that tomb, found late in the 19th century, is where Christ was buried. Easter was observed behind the Iron Curtain too. A broadcast by Peiping radio said Christians in Communist China observed Easter with religious services. The radio said more than 3,000 Catholics attended "the grand mass" in Peiping cathedral and that services were held in several Protestant churches. CHURCHES FILLED The Russian news agency Tass said more Catholic churches in all towns of Lithuania were filled with worshippers coming for confession and Holy Communion. In Spain, Easter hill fights attracted thousands after solemn religious pageants during the week. In Nicosia, capital of Cyprus, Archbishop Makarios of the Greek Orthodox Church, leader of a movement for uniting the British-held Mediterranean island with Greece, said in a sermon marking Palm Sunday that Cypriots are "confident of final victory" in their struggle. Mr. Brown preached on "The Risen Christ and a Living Church". At the evening service the choir sang "This Joyful Easter Tide" (17th Century Dutch Melody). Prayer was by Rev. E. C. Evans and the Minister preached on "A Promise Fulfilled". Mr. Gordon White was organist. Rev. A. Frank MacLean, B.A., and Rev. G. Howard Christie, B.A., B.D., conducted the morning and evening services respectively at Trinity United Church. At the morning service the junior choir sang "Christ the Lord is Risen Today", and the adult choir sang the anthem "Easter again is here." (Claude Means) Pauline Fear was soloist. Rev. U. S. Navy Testing New Flying Platform WASHINGTON (AP)—The navy disclosed Sunday successful experimental flights by a weird looking contraption called a "flying platform" which ascends vertically and hovers in the air. Flights of this "research tool," designed and built by Hiller Helicopters of Palo Alto, Calif., indicate the principle involved may be applicable to larger vertical lift aircraft, the navy said. Unlike a Vertical Takeoff Plane or a conventional helicopter, this circular platform has propellers housed in casings or ducts like big ventilating fans. The two propellers are driven by separate engines, which together develop less than 100 horsepower. The pilot stands in the centre of the platform, which looks like a round dining-room table. To steer the machine, he merely leans in the direction he wants to go. Further research and development "will be necessary before these principles can be applied to the production of military aircraft," the navy said. More extensive testing also will be needed at low altitudes before the present "flying platform" can be taken on altitude and long-distance flights.
