MONCTON, N. B., Sept. 29 (CP)—John Morrow, formerly of the Pacific Coast League, has been signed to a right wing position with Moncton Hawks of the Maritime Senior Hockey League, club officials announced tonight.

Morrow, a native of Montreal, played last season with Tacoma in the P. C. H. L., and the previous season was with Oakland in the same league. He will come to Moncton from Valleyfield, where he attended the Braves' training camp and was scouted by Hawks coach Gordie Drillon.

Signing of the Montreal man raised to 14 the number of players slated to attend Hawks' training camp. Transportation money has been sent to all the players with instructions to report for training next weekend.

Potato Pickers To Begin Arriving At S'side Sunday

The big movement of men from the mainland to the Island for the potato harvest will commence today. Tomorrow evening three bus loads, about 90 men altogether, will arrive at the Summerside office of the Unemployment Insurance Commission and be distributed to waiting growers.

A system has been worked out whereby the buses arrive at intervals and by the time a succeeding bus arrives the men in the one before have been placed. These men will all be from Cape Breton Island and another three bus loads, also from Cape Breton will arrive on Monday night.

On Monday also a bus will come from the Springhill-Amherst area. Already over 100 men have been placed on jobs in Prince County although potato picking has hardly started. Thirty-seven arrived from the Moncton area in small groups and about 90 have been placed locally. Some of these came from the mainland on their own and some are from Summerside and the surrounding area.

Home Of Four Generations



—Pictured above is an old house in Fernwood, the exact date of the erection of which is uncertain, but it had been lived in many years previous to its being moved in 1862 from the shore at Salutation Cove to its present site, one quarter mile distant. This building has been owned and occupied by the MacFarlane family for four generations, having been bequeathed from father to son, from Donald MacFarlane to Malcolm, to George and to Edwin, the present owner.

Within this dwelling is the Indenture, dated September 1, 1799, for 400 acres of land between John Stuart of Hamstead, England, and John Stewart of the Island of St. John, Captain in St. John's Provincial, and Donald MacFarlane of Rustico, when it was leased for 99 years for one peppercorn, if lawfully demanded, to be given each year for the first ten years.

The first owner, Donald MacFarlane, had a most interesting life, and he belonged to the MacFarlane Clan, one of the most ancient descent appearing in history as far back as 1225. Donald was born in Glasgow, Scotland in 1759. His brother, John, who was a medical doctor, sailed for America when Donald was ten years of age. The young lad ran away from home, bareheaded, and hid in the ship his brother was to sail on. When the small stowaway was found, the brother determined to send him back but little Donald stoutly maintained that he was going to America now or on the next ship, so he was allowed to remain.

The doctor located in New York but Donald went to Virginia for a while, and when war broke out between United States and England, he enlisted in the English army. At the end of the war he found himself in Quebec. He had been promoted from a common soldier to a Commissary of a regiment and finally was put in charge of one of the principal prisons where some noted pirates were kept. By his kindly acts to one of them (the only one who was not finally hung), he was given maps, charts and descriptions of one of the West India Islands upon which these pirates had hidden their gold. He made two unsuccessful attempts to locate this treasure and finally decided that the Lord did not want him to have it.

After 1785 Mr. MacFarlane moved to Prince Edward Island, then called the Island of St. John, and settled on a farm near Rustico River. There he married and remained until 1799, when with his family he moved to Bedeque for the property referred to above. He was a member of the Legislature for 17 or more years and died in the above mentioned house at Salutation Cove in 1848.

This historic house, one of the finest in the community, has been kept in perfect condition, the only major changes through the years being the addition in 1928 of a sun porch, a kitchen and a new foundation.
