The Bidding:

South West North East 2♥ 2♠ Pass 3♦ 3NT Pass Pass 4♦ 4NT Dble.

Opening lead—king of spades.

The scene was the annual Eastern States tournament held in New York back in 1941. The hand was played in the Open Pair event, Star billing on the deal goes to Helen Sobel.

Helen was South and opened with two hearts. West overcalled with two spades and East raised to three spades.

Mrs. Sobel made the superb and startling bid of three no-trump. Of course, she didn't have the characteristic distribution for notrump play. No textbook would recommend 8-3-1-1 distribution for notrump purposes.

But Helen Sobel didn't achieve her reputation of being the best

woman player in the business by rigidly following textbook principles. Improvisation has always been an outstanding feature of her game, and this hand only serves to demonstrate it.

When East bid four spades, Helen followed through by bidding four no-trump. West doubled but took second money when ten tricks were cashed in succession to score 810 points.

All kinds of results occurred at other tables as the bidding took a variety of turns. Many of the South players, afraid that four spades might be made, went to five hearts and went down one.

At the table the bidding was: South West North East 2♥ 2♠ Pass 3♦ 3NT Pass Pass 4♦ 4NT Dble.

LONDON (AP) — Crime did not pay Thursday in England. It was enough to drive a crook to honest toil.

In suburban Grove Park, a character tried to grab a payroll from James Scott, a construction firm clerk. The case containing the money popped open. A mere £60 of several thousand pounds inside fell to the ground.

The man picked up the £60 and ran. When his left shoe fell off, he hobbled on and made it to a getaway car driven by an accomplice.

Police caught them within minutes. In the borough of Deptford, three armed men undertook to hold up a British railways pay office.

Stationmaster Ernest Knowles recoiled from the guns nervously. One gunman hit Knowles on the head with the pistol. Then all three fled empty-handed. They missed a £5,000 payroll.

In suburban Dalston a gang worked all night on a furniture factory safe, finally touched off the dynamite, and started a fire that nearly burned the place to the ground. The safe was empty.
