## Eight Canadians Reported Being Detained In Hungary

OTTAWA (CP)—Acting Prime Minister Martin said Monday eight Canadians are in jail or under detention in Hungary. He said in a statement that some 6,000 Canadians of Hungarian origin have visited Hungary in the last 18 months. During that time 19 had been arrested and 11 have since been released.

## Western Club Will Receive \$5,280 Of Aid

It was jointly announced yesterday by Howard Waite, president of the Summerside Boys' Club and A. Walther Gaudet, president of the Prince Edward Island United Fund that an agreement had been reached for the participation of the Summerside Boys' Club in the United Fund Campaign. The club is to receive \$5,280 towards its operations budget for 1967 from the United Fund.

The Boys' Club, with spacious new club rooms on Notre Dame Street in Summerside, has an active membership of some 170 boys between the ages of seven to 19. The program is under the direction of a part time director and 12 volunteers.

Activities in the club rooms consists of weight lifting, floor hockey, ping-pong, billiards, chess, dancing classes and record hops, hobby groups and classes in crafts. There are also study groups and monthly visits to the 'Y' pool in Charlottetown for swimming lessons.

## Transport Board Grants Licence

The Clarendon Aviation firm of Clarendon in New Hampshire has been granted a licence by the Air Transport Board in Ottawa to operate a charter air service from its area into Prince Edward Island and into destinations in Quebec, New Brunswick and Nova Scotia.

The ATB approval is usually automatic under an international air agreement for applicants endorsed by the U.S. or Canadian licensing authorities.

The U.S. flying firm is restricted to traffic originating or terminating with 50 miles of its home base of Clarendon, N.H.

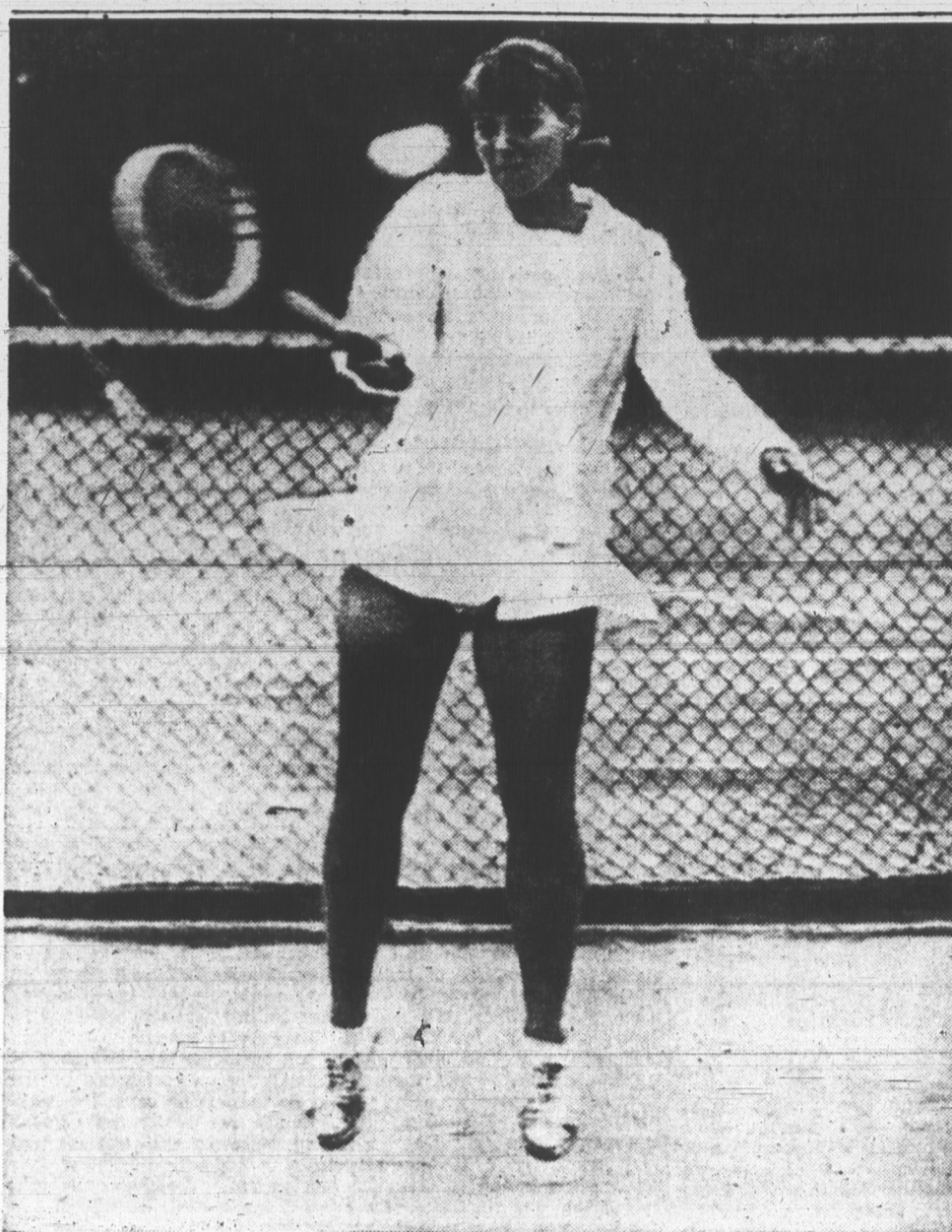

## Summerside's Manager Reports On Collections

### SUMMERSIDE BUREAU OF THE GUARDIAN

Town manager J. A. Brophy told the monthly meeting of the Summerside Town Council yesterday that tax collections up to July 31 of this year total \$498,960.50, which is 80.5 per cent of the tax roll of \$619,787. Further tax collections to last Friday brought the percentage to 82.24, almost exactly the 1965 percentage collections for the same date—82.64 per cent.

Rotting reports took up the main body of the meeting, attended by a bare quorum of councillors—Councillors at the meeting were Herb Schurman, Francis Perry and Ernest Morrison. Mayor George Key presided.

Reports given were police, fire, civic stadium, water and sewage, building inspector's, and electric.

Noteworthy among the reports was Civic Stadium manager Charles Hogan's note that the stadium is running much closer to the budget than last year, is now some \$1,500 ahead of this date's financial situation for last year, and should finish the year within its budget. Last year, when the stadium ran at a small deficit, Mr. Hogan and several councillors noted that no other municipally-owned rink in the Maritimes came close, in their knowledge, to doing as well financially.

The building inspector's report noted that little building had taken place in the past month, but the number of inquiries indicated that much building will take place this fall.

MOTION PASSED

A motion that specifications be prepared and tenders called for installation of a new furnace in the town hall, moved by Councillor Schurman and seconded by Councillor Perry, was passed. It was noted that the old furnace was outdated, that parts were no longer being made for it, and that it caught fire twice in the past winter. A new fur-

Two Witnesses Give Testimony

SUMMERSIDE—A Middle-aged man, Albert McCardle, was charged with obstructing a fisheries officer in the discharge of his duty when he appeared in Prince County Court before Magistrate W. Chester S. MacDonald yesterday.

Evidence was given by two witnesses for the Department of Fisheries, which was represented by G. Bruce MacDonald. The witnesses were fisheries officer Waldo Beck and RCMP Constable Patrick Neary of the Borden detachment. Both witnesses testified that Mr. McCardle had refused to allow Mr. Beck to take a sample of the contents of a potato sprayer which was being used on the accused man's land.

Mr. Beck testified that the sprayer pump was leaking the spray mixture onto the ground.

George R. McMahon, representing the accused, asked for a dismissal on the charge on grounds that a fisheries officer has no authority or duty to take samples of sprayer material unless this material is leaking into a pond or stream.

The case was adjourned to August 18 for a ruling by the magistrate.

Ray Joseph Bernard, Summerside, and John Joseph Auban Gallant, Wellington, pleaded guilty to separate charges of possession of a 1960 Pontiac car, knowing it was obtained unlawfully. The car was the property of A. E. MacLennan Ltd. The cases were adjourned to August 17 for sentencing.
