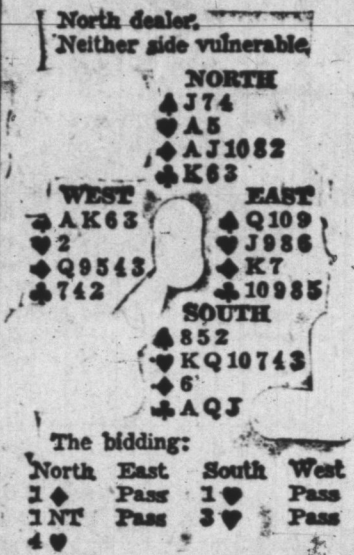

OTTAWA (CP) - RCAF Air Transport Command lifted 21,000,000 pounds of cargo, a 50-per-cent increase over 1958 figures, and 60,000 passengers in 1959, the air force said Saturday in a year-end review.
The command made more than 150 scheduled round trips to Europe. In addition, special flights took 332 Canadian troops to Egypt for service with the United Nations Emergency Force and 475 troops to West Germany for service with the Canadian infantry brigade group.
Late in 1959, the RCAF's new long-range CC-106 turbo-prop transport plane made its first flight. The Canadian aircraft, designed as a replacement for the North Star, can carry 6,000 pounds of freight or 135 passengers.
Delivery of the first of 10 CC-109 medium-range transports on order for the RCAF will take place early in 1960.

showed out and declarer's goose was cooked. He had to lose a trump trick and went down one.
Of course, it is easy to see, after examining the East-West hands, that South could have made the contract by finessing the ten of hearts on the second trump lead. However, this play smacks of hindsight, and can hardly be justified without taking a peek at the adverse holding. Certainly, in the long run, it would not be advisable for declarer to finesse against the jack with his particular heart holding.
But declarer could and should have made the hand. When the club is returned, declarer's only concern is the possible loss of a trump trick. This can occur only if the cards are divided 4-1 (or 5-0). He should take whatever steps are possible to overcome the 4-1 trump break.
If West has the four hearts, nothing can be done; but if East has them, a trump coup can be arranged. So, at trick five, South leads a diamond to the ace and ruffs a diamond. Then he cashes the king of hearts, continues with a heart to the ace, and discovers the trump situation.
The precautions taken pay dividends. Another diamond is ruffed, reducing declarer to the Q-10 of hearts and the Q-J of clubs. Both clubs are cashed, ending in dummy.
When a diamond is then led from dummy, East, holding the J-9 of hearts, must trump, and South wins the last two tricks with the Q-10.
It pays to plan the play.

LONDON (AP) - Tony Brooks, British auto racing driver who finished second in the world championship this year, has bought a garage - and now he is undecided about continuing auto racing.
"I am going to make this garage a personal business," Brooks said. "I've no intention of making a place with my name over it while I work somewhere else.
"I have an open mind at the moment whether to continue in auto racing or give it up." Brooks drove for the Italian Ferrari team this year.

Work To Start On Aswan Dam

CAIRO (AP) - A big ceremony will be held Jan. 10 near the site of the Aswan high dam to signal the start of work on that project in the Nile River.
President Gamal Abdel Nasser of the United Arab Republic will stand at a place about 2 1/2 miles from the dam site. He will push a small button to explode 220 pounds of dynamite beneath the hard granite rocks now occupying the dam position. This will constitute the first positive operation in building the billion-dollar dam.
From seven to 10 years will be needed to construct the dam, which will be 17 times greater than the great Pyramid of Cheops at Giza.
It was because the United States withdrew its pledge to help finance the dam that Nasser in 1956 nationalized the Suez Canal. Then Israeli, British and French forces attacked Egypt.
TWO-STAGE PROJECT
The high-dam project is to be executed in two stages. The first stage will consist of the construction of a coffer-dam and a diversion canal, to be completed in four years. The Soviet Union has lent the U.A.R. 400,000,000 rubles (about \$100,000,000) in equipment and technical aid for this stage.
The second stage will consist of the construction of the rest of the project, including the dam and its hydro-electric tunnels. This will take nearly six years. No announcement has been made yet on whose help will be sought for the second stage.
The advantage of the Aswan dam will be great in the ever-increasing population of the Egyptian region of the U.A.R. The waters held behind the dam, in the world's largest man-made lake, will be used for irrigation to expand the cultivation area by 2,000,000 acres, or 30 per cent.
