SECOND EDITION NEWS BY TELEGRAPH.

The Prussian Diet will meet on the 20th May.

The other day Mr. Huxley found a check for £1,000 in his morning letters, the bequest of a Bolton admirer, Charles Gibbon, the novelist (Author of "Auld Robin Gray"), recently received a legacy of £1,000 from a Scotch lady who had read his books and wished thus to show her appreciation of them. Mr. Wrixley, the famous paper-maker, has just bequeathed £9,000 to the wife and family of James Payn, the novelist.

Mrs. Scott-Siddons is five feet two inches high. She has travelled through the United States for eleven years, and she thinks that American women are better informed than English women and have more grace and ease of manner. She finds that the Southern people are Italian in their enthusiasm and show an extraordinary appreciation of Shakespeare's finest points. Mrs. Siddons was married at sixteen to a naval officer. She will soon return to England.

Right Hon. G. J. Goschen declined today to receive a deputation from Turkish bond holders on the ground that questions of great political importance and of an urgent character, will absorb his whole time previous to his departure for Constantinople. Mr. Goschen is known to entertain very decided and positive views respecting the policy which Turkey should pursue in her financial affairs, and, it is understood, he considers it a mere waste of time to listen to suggestions from others upon the subject.

The Right Hon. W. E. Forster, Chief Secretary for Ireland, has decided upon a renewal of the Coercion Acts as being necessary for the peace of Ireland. The Cabinet will consider the matter. The "Daily News," Ministerial organ, this morning strongly urges the Government not to renew the Coercion Acts, because nothing could be more unfortunate than the effect which the renewal of Coercion legislation would have on public opinion in England and Scotland, as well as in Ireland. The Conservative Government contemplated abolishing these Acts.

The York Tribune estimates that of the 600 delegates to the Republican National Convention, elected up to Tuesday last, Grant will have 224, Blaine 241, Sherman 91, Edmunds 31, and Washburn 13. It also gives the Blaine estimates which credits that politician with 287 votes and Grant 191. The Grant estimate gives the ex-President 317 votes and Blaine 144. The Sherman estimate gives him 184 votes. The Tribune thinks that Blaine will go into the Convention with 301 votes, but 379 are necessary to a choice in a convention of 756 members. The differences in the States of the respective candidates are certainly startling and it is quite clear that some one must be in error.

TOWNS BURNED UP.—This year promises to be famous for the number of disastrous fires occurring in it. A week or two ago, Hull, Quebec, was nearly destroyed, and the press despatches have lately recorded the total, or almost total, destruction of several small towns in the United States and Europe. This morning's despatches inform us that the town of Milton, Penn., was devastated by fire yesterday, and 400 buildings burned, including all the churches and all the business houses—250 families being rendered homeless. The loss is not yet estimated. The fire started in a car shop.—The town of West Liberia, Virginia, of 200 inhabitants, was also burnt down yesterday.

The loss of the Atlanta has been seized upon by Mr. Spurgeon, who has hung upon it a very curious piece of harmonizing. Taking as his text "The sea is His and He made it," Mr. Spurgeon ridiculed the idea of the fear of the ocean which is entertained by so many, as unworthy of Christians. "The Lord, Himself," he said, "and His disciples went to sea. He was Lord High Admiral of the waters and He never gave up his rank. He owned the sea by right of creation, but gave man dominion over it and the fishes thereof. If man ever crossed the deep how could man have dominion there? Man was meant to plough the sea as well as the land; man was God's vicereoy holding under the kind and paying a quit rent of adoration and reverence."

Somewhat of a sensation has been created in political circles and among clubs, by a story that Mr. A. M. Sullivan, Home-Rule member of Parliament for Leith County, has commenced a criminal libel suit against certain Dublin papers for publishing an imputation that the Carlton Club paid his expenses in the late election. It is understood that Mr. Sullivan indignantly denies this accusation, and also denies that there was the slightest foundation for the assumption made by those journals. As a gentleman of his high character, is not a man to be lightly suspected as being a consenting party to any corrupt arrangement, the action of papers against which he has begun proceedings, is believed have been inspired by malice.

OTTAWA, May 14.
The contractor for the Chandlere bridge has been forced to stop operations on the river work owing to high water. The water yesterday rose nine inches in the Ottawa River.

The Toronto 10th Royals have received and invitation from the Kentucky State Fair Committee to be present and take part in the fair. A special train is to be provided to take them there and back, and their expenses paid.

Bennett, who shot Brown, has been in poor health since his confinement in jail, and to-day is seriously ill and confined to his bed. The physician thinks his nervous prostration serious.

ST. PETERSBURG, May 14.
The Government has ordered the ironclad Peter the Great to the Pacific to be in readiness for the breaking out of hostilities between Russia and China. She is the largest and most powerful vessel of the Russian Ironclad Navy. She was constructed in the harbor of Cronstadt, and launched in 1874, and resembled in construction and design, the three great masted turret ships of the British Navy, more especially with an armament of four thirty-five ton guns made of Krupp steel. It is understood here that the Russian Government does not look on war with China as inevitable. Some hope of penable adjustment of the misunderstanding concerning Kuldji Treaty being among the possible good results of Conference between Chinese Ambassador Tsing and Government, on arrival of three of the Ambassadors a few weeks hence.

VIENNA, May 14.
The Albanians are destroying the bridges over the River Drina, hoping thereby to prevent the entry of the Turkish troops into northern Albania.

DUBLIN, May 14.
Mr. Rourke, Home Ruler, to-day attempted to address the County Mayo electors at Ballika, and was very roughly handled, and was compelled to retire.

MILFORD, PA., May 14.
Terrible forest fires continue here. Over three million feet lumber, besides a vast amount of valuable timber, are destroyed. Several houses and barns were burned, and 6,000 acres are on fire this morning. The damage is incalculable. Considerable game was killed by the flames. A light rain is now falling.

ST. PETERSBURG, May 14.
The Granville circular, with regard to the execution of the Treaty of Berlin, has given entire satisfaction in the highest circles here.

The latest advices received by the Russian Government do not confirm the report that the Kuldji treaty was entirely rejected by China, but indicate that the Chinese desire explanations, for which purpose the Chinese Ambassador or Tseng is expected here in a month.

MONTREAL, May 14.
Some English speaking laborers attacked with sticks and stones a few French Canadian stevedores employed in loading one of Allan's ships last evening. On the police hastening to the wharf, the rioters had made good their escape. The authorities are prepared to suppress any attempt at a renewal of such rowdianism.

Three steamers were due here yesterday with 2,100 immigrants on board.

Owing to the great increase of business in shipping here, the steamship agents are erecting additional sheds for freight on the wharves.

LONDON, May 14.
The bravado of the last week manifested by the striking operatives, at Blackburn, has entirely died away and it is not too much to anticipate that the strike will terminate in ten days.

A correspondent of the Times at Paris, discussing the debate on the public meetings bill in the Deputies yesterday, says: the temper of the Chamber leaves but little hope of prolonged political tranquility or of that stability without which the French horizon will again become threatening.

VIENNA, May 14.
The statement that the Albanians had proclaimed independence is authoritatively contradicted.

BERLIN, May 14.
When all the new formations, planned and worked out in their minutest details by the German war ministry, are completed, the total strength of the army will exceed 2,000,000 men.

MILTON, Pa., May 14.
Fire broke out to-day in the car works, and a heavy northwest wind prevailing, it was impossible to check the flames until the entire business portion of the town was destroyed.

It is estimated that 400 buildings were burned, including all the churches.

The fire burned over an area seven squares in length and two in width.

Several bodies have been recovered from the ruins burned beyond recognition.

Two hundred and fifty families rendered homeless are camping out in fields. Supplies, provisions and clothing needed at once. It is impossible yet to estimate the loss.

Governor Herriot has telegraphed to all Cities in the Commonwealth, suggesting immediate action for rendering aid.
