

CARVER SHOTS WINNER IN OVERTIME

Flyers Shade Saints 6-4 To Win Island "B" Ch'ship

The courageous Parkdale Flyers fought off St. Dunstan's University for seventy desperate minutes last night at the Sports Arena to come out with a thrilling 6-4 overtime victory and the Island League Senior Championship.

It was a terrific game and a fitting climax to a tremendous season of hockey. More than 3,000 fans, one of the largest crowds to watch a game locally in a good number of years, roared themselves hoarse as the Parkdale went into successive 2-0, 3-1 leads and held a 4-2 lead late in the third period only to see the fighting Saints come back to notch the count at 4-4 and force overtime.

It only took the Flyers 44 seconds to hit for the winning goal as Willie Dunn set up the puck from the clear on Kip Ready's neat pass and hit home with a Carver Special — a low shot that just caught the corner.

At 2:16 of the overtime Dempe Gregory of the Flyers and right winger Jean Veilleux of Saints tangled and were sent off with majors for fighting. While they were of the Saints came close on many occasions only either to miss on their good chances or be stopped cold by game Frank Roper, who played magnificently.

Kip Ready set up the play when he stole the puck from Miner MacDonald at center ice and his relay to Dunn put Willie in the clear. With a Saints player hanging on from behind Dunn fired from 20 feet out and beat Gillis cleanly.

When the final siren blew the S. D. U. players to a man skated on to the ice and warmly congratulated the Flyers. Like the true sportsmen they are the Saints were gracious in defeat and any of the bitterness that may have been built up as the two teams were locked in a gigantic struggle for the Island

championship vanished as the Flyers came through with the victory.

After the game as the two teams were lined up on the blue line for the various presentations Parkdale playing coach Allie Carver, dog-tired but happy after the fierce battle, said with a note of respect for the tireless Saints: "It was a real tough game..... a real tough one. I wouldn't want to have to go through it again."

Ready fired the third Parkdale goal and set up the fourth, fifth and sixth. Pete Hill shot the opening goal for the Flyers and Bob Hurry got the fourth.

MANTLE CLOUDS 2 HOMERS

Yanks Win; Brooks Lose As Baseball Season Opens

Two prodigious, 475-foot blasts by New York Yankees' Mickey Mantle set a home run tone for the opening of the major league baseball season Tuesday—and the Dodgers proved they're still the "daffy Dodgers."

Brooklyn's proud world champions suffered a lapse of memory, almost forgot to raise their flag and, finally — after an embarrassing 36-minute delay — went down before Philadelphia Phillies at Ebbets Field 8-6.

The majors began another April-to-October marathon on all fronts in generally crisp, footballish weather before turnouts totalling close to a quarter of a million people. Snow flurries at Detroit failed to dissuade a crowd of 40,037.

Mantle became the first batter ever to send two shots over Griffith Stadium's distant centerfield fence in a single game. These two shots, plus a 4-for-4 performance by catcher Yogi Berra, gave the Yankees a 10-4 victory over Washington Senators.

These battling pyrotechnics, which also included two home runs

by Washington's Karl O. Is on a thrilled a crowd of 27,837, including President Eisenhower.

TOSSES FIRST BALL.

The president, garbed in tan overcoat and fedora, followed the chief executive tradition of tossing out the first ball. He cut loose a high, arching pitch, which, after a player scramble, was retrieved by the Yankees' infielder Gil McDougald.

In other American League games, Ted Williams, making his first opening day appearance in four years, slammed two doubles and a single against the "shift" to help lead Boston Red Sox to an 8-1 victory over Baltimore; Chicago White Sox edged Cleveland 2-1 when the Indians' Bob Lemon walked across the winning run, and Kansas City Athletics topped Detroit Tigers 2-1 on a two-run pinch-hit double by Gus Zernial.

In the National League, New York Giants rapped Pittsburgh Pirates 4-3, with Johnny Antonelli pitching a six-hitter and contributing a home run; Milwaukee Braves shut out Chicago Cubs 6-0 largely on home runs by Hank Aaron and Joe Adcock; and Stan

Musial's two-run homer in the top of the ninth gave St. Louis Cardinals a 4-2 decision over Cincinnati.

Altogether, opening day produced a cluster of 18 home runs, six of them at Washington and four at Brooklyn. Pittsburgh's Del Long slapped two in a losing cause.

MIGHTY BLASTS

In a blast which brought even the president to his feet, Mantle sent his first home run at Washington to the left of the Griffith Stadium flagpole onto the roof of a house across the street. His second sailed over the fence at the 438-foot mark. Both were figured to be around 475-footers. The first came with none on base in the first inning, the other in the sixth with two on base.

Berra hit a home run, double and two singles for a profitable afternoon while Dick Tetlebach got the other Senator homer off winner Don Larsen.

At Brooklyn, the Phillies unloaded quickly on the big Don Newcombe, star of the Dodgers' early pennant push a year ago, a homer by Jim Greenengrass sending him to the showers in the third. Robin Roberts managed to stagger through to the victory.

The Dodgers were made uncomfortable during opening ceremonies when, with the signal to sing the national anthem, it was noted that no one had been assigned to raise the Stars and Stripes and world championship flag. Finally, a Marine color guard did the chores while Brooklyn officials stood by, red-faced.

Looks For Big Year As I.L. Opens Doors To 73rd Season

MONTREAL (CP) — The eight-team International League starts its 73rd season today and president Frank Shaughnessy looks for a banner one.

"It should be a scramble," he said Tuesday.

"It looks better balanced all around. Toronto and Havana have exceptionally strong clubs. Buffalo has a new operation and with eight straight rousing victories should be away to a fast start.

"Montreal is strong offensively but may need help with the pitching. Richmond and Miami both have young clubs, but strong."

The league has one new club—Miami—and five managers who will be starting their first full season with their present clubs.

The newcomers, no strangers to baseball, are Phil Cavarretta at Buffalo, Don Osborn at Miami, Eddy Lopat at Richmond and Bruno Betzel at Toronto with his

10th International League team. Dixie Walker at Rochester arrived during last season.

As for attendance, Shaughnessy said, he is looking for a league mark of 2,000,000 this year compared with 1,600,000 last year.

Montreal took the league by a half game over Toronto.

There are three night games in the four scheduled openers today. Columbus will entertain Montreal in the lone day contest before an expected 10,000 persons. At Richmond, another 10,000 are expected to see Toronto try for its first victory.

Havana will be host to Rochester before an anticipated 20,000 and Miami expects 15,000 fans for its debut against Buffalo.
