### Mink Rancher Gives Testimony

TORONTO (CP)—Mink rancher Alvin S. Farmer of nearby Gomeley testified Wednesday that his mink dropped dead last year after being fed whale meat purchased from Canada Packers Ltd. Farmer's suit against the company for \$40,102, which he says was the value of the mink, opened Wednesday before Chief Justice J. C. McRuer of the Supreme Court of Ontario.

Farmer said he agreed to try the whale meat as mink food after talking to a company representative.

The day after the meat was delivered, he said, he received a letter from the company suggesting he make a test feeding to his mink. He continued to do this until 50 pounds were used, with no apparent effects to the mink.

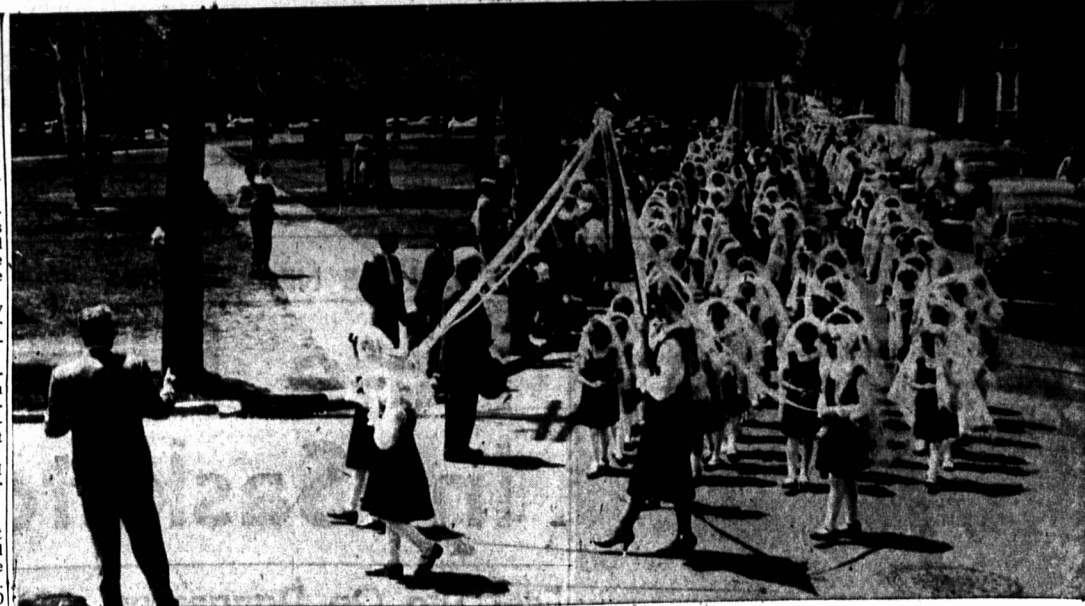
On March 1st, he said, he took another 50-pound block from the freezing room, allowed it to thaw for 48 hours and mixed it with other ingredients.

The next morning, he said, the mink, except one that had not eaten were all "dead as a doornail."

Dwight Payton, counsel for Canada Packers, suggested earlier that the meat had become poisoned because Mr. Farmer left it too long in a warm mixing room.

Mr. Farmer testified the room temperature was never above 45 degrees.

Victor Clouston, of St. John's, Nfld., also a mink rancher, testified he inspected the whale meat on arrival from England, found the meat was odorless and would



### LARGELY ATTENDED CORPUS CHRISTI PROCESSION

What is generally conceded to have been one of the most large-attended Corpus Christi processions ever seen in the city, took place yesterday morning under ideal conditions. The observance began with Solemn High Mass in St. Dunstan's Basilica at 10 a.m. The celebrant was Rev. R. G. Ellsworth, D.D., with Rev. Clarence Roche as Deacon and Rev. Charles MacDonald as Sub-deacon. These members of the clergy were also present in the procession and throughout the solemn and impressive services in connection therewith.

The blessed sacrament was borne by His Excellency Most Rev. Malcolm A. This part of the procession was preceded by a group of young flower boys and girls following directly behind Sir William MacMillan, Knight of

St. Gregory. It is part of a proposed 10-year, \$200,000,000 program involving a series of dams to develop the 710,000 horsepower of the St. John river and its tributaries.

It is expected by 1960 to be producing 125,000 horsepower, one-third of the present output of both the Commission and private generating plants.

The initial development's \$50,000,000 cost will be financed by provincial bond issues, a proposal endorsed by the Liberal opposition.

### I.O.D.E. Brief Favors More Independent TV Stations

A brief from the 32,000-member organization said present federal government policy appears to create a monopoly for the CBC and for the selected private stations.

This policy preserves six major cities for the CBC and allows non-city private broadcasters single stations in other areas. Private operators have been trying to get the field opened up for more licenses.

The IODE recommended that "the question of issuing licenses for telecasting to additional private stations be reopened and that those stations be reopened and a telecasting station be allowed to do so."
